Associations of "Bring back" (30 Words)

<u>anachronism</u>	The action of attributing something to a period to which it does not belong. <i>The town is a throwback to medieval times an anachronism that has survived the passing years.</i>
backslide	Drop to a lower level, as in one’s morals or standards. <i>There are many things that can cause slimmers to backslide.</i>
backward	(of a fielding position) behind an imaginary line passing through the stumps at the batsman’s end at right angles to the wicket. <i>An economically backward country.</i>
backwards	(of a movement) in the direction of one’s back. <i>A step backwards for the economy.</i>
behind	A kick that sends the ball over a behind line or a touch that sends it between the inner posts scoring one point. <i>England were still 382 runs behind.</i>
come	Come to pass arrive as in due course. <i>Melons come from a vine.</i>
degeneracy	The state of being degenerate in mental or moral qualities. <i>Moral degeneracy followed intellectual degeneration.</i>
degeneration	The state of being degenerate in mental or moral qualities. <i>Overgrazing has caused serious degeneration of grassland.</i>
inverse	Opposite in nature or effect or relation to another quantity. <i>A term is in inverse proportion to another term if it increases or decreases as the other decreases or increases.</i>
later	At or toward an end or late period or stage of development. <i>Later on it will be easier.</i>
posthumous	(of a child) born after the death of its father. <i>A posthumous collection of his articles.</i>

<u>regress</u>	Calculate the coefficient or coefficients of regression of a variable against or on another variable. <i>I regressed Sylvia to early childhood.</i>
<u>regression</u>	A defense mechanism in which you flee from reality by assuming a more infantile state. <i>It is easy to blame unrest on economic regression.</i>
regressive	(of a tax) taking a proportionally greater amount from those on lower incomes. <i>Indirect taxes are as a group regressive.</i>
<u>relapse</u>	Return to (a less active or a worse state). <i>He relapsed into silence.</i>
<u>restitution</u>	The act of restoring something to its original state. <i>Restitution of the damaged mucosa.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The altar paintings seem in need of restoration.</i>
retrace	Trace (something) back to its source or beginning. <i>He began to retrace his steps to the station car park.</i>
retreat	Make a retreat from an earlier commitment or activity. <i>The bugle sounded a retreat.</i>
retrieval	The cognitive operation of accessing information in memory. <i>Online information retrieval.</i>
retrieve	Run after, pick up, and bring to the master. <i>Train the dog to retrieve.</i>
<u>retroactive</u>	Affecting things past. <i>Retroactive tax increase.</i>
retrograde	Show retrograde motion. <i>The retrograde form of these inscriptions.</i>
retrogression	The process of returning to an earlier state, typically a worse one. <i>A retrogression to 19th century attitudes.</i>
<u>retrospect</u>	Look back upon (a period of time, sequence of events); remember. <i>In retrospect.</i>
retrospective	Concerned with or related to the past. <i>Retrospective pay awards.</i>
return	A returning officer's announcement of an election result. <i>Return a kickback.</i>

reversion A property to which someone has the right of reversion.
*A problem applicable to most variegated plants is that of **reversion**.*

revert Undergo reversion, as in a mutation.
*If interested kindly **revert** with your updated resume.*

throwback An organism that has the characteristics of a more primitive type of that organism.
*The eyes could be an ancestral **throwback**.*
