curtail	Reduce in extent or quantity; impose a restriction on. <i>Civil liberties were further curtailed.</i>
debase	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>The King was forced to debase the coinage.</i>
declension	A downward slope or bend. <i>The declension of the new generation.</i>
decline	Bend down; droop. <i>The birth rate continued to decline.</i>
declivity	A downward slope. <i>A thickly wooded declivity.</i>
decrease	The amount by which something decreases. <i>The aisles were decreased in height.</i>
decrement	The amount by which something decreases. <i>The dose was reduced by 10 mg weekly decrements.</i>
demoralize	Lower someone's spirits; make downhearted. <i>The General Strike had demoralized the trade unions.</i>
depletion	Reduction in the number or quantity of something. <i>The depletion of the ozone layer.</i>
depress	Lower someone's spirits; make downhearted. <i>The rising inflation depressed the economy.</i>
descend	Make a sudden attack on. <i>The militia descended on Rye.</i>
descending	Moving down a scale of quality. <i>A passage of descending chords.</i>
descent	Properties attributable to your ancestry. <i>A steep badly eroded descent.</i>

diminish	Decrease in size, extent, or range. <i>The trial has aged and diminished him.</i>
downgrade	A downward gradient on a railway or road. <i>Some jobs had gradually been downgraded from skilled to semi skilled.</i>
<u>downturn</u>	A worsening of business or economic activity. <i>The market took a downturn.</i>
downward	Towards a lower place, point, or level. <i>The downward pull of gravity.</i>
drop	An act of dropping supplies or troops by parachute. <i>The light dropped from the ceiling.</i>
fall	A controlled act of falling especially as a stunt or in martial arts. <i>Fall into a strange way of thinking.</i>
<u>falling</u>	Moving from a higher to a lower level, typically rapidly and without control. <i>Falling standards.</i>
lessen	Wear off or die down. <i>The warmth of the afternoon lessened.</i>
<u>low</u>	Of a vowel pronounced with the tongue held low in the mouth open. <i>His popularity ratings are at an all time low.</i>
<u>lower</u>	Set lower. <i>Land of a lower quality.</i>
reduce	Reduce in size reduce physically. <i>She has been reduced to near poverty.</i>
reduction	The action of remedying a dislocation or fracture by returning the affected part of the body to its normal position. <i>We must see if the fracture requires reduction.</i>
<u>rundown</u>	A concluding summary (as in presenting a case before a law court). <i>A rundown in the business would be a devastating blow to the local economy.</i>
sink	Fall or sink heavily. <i>They agreed to sink their differences.</i>
submergence	The process or state of being submerged in or covered with water. <i>Total submergence of plants results in heavy crop losses.</i>
<u>substrate</u>	A material which provides the surface on which something is deposited or inscribed, for example the silicon wafer used to manufacture integrated circuits. <i>Optical disk substrates.</i>
