Associations of "Broader" (30 Words)

<u>diffuse</u>	Spread or diffuse through. <i>The second argument is more diffuse.</i>
<u>diffusion</u>	The property of being diffused or dispersed. <i>The rapid diffusion of ideas and technology.</i>
disperse	Denoting a phase dispersed in another phase as in a colloid. <i>Emulsions should be examined after storage for droplet size of the disperse phase.</i>
dispersed	Distributed or spread over a considerable extent. <i>Has ties with many widely dispersed friends.</i>
<u>dispersion</u>	The act of dispersing or diffusing something. <i>The study looks at the dispersion of earnings with OECD member countries.</i>
<u>disseminate</u>	Cause to become widely known. <i>There is a subset of these low grade tumours that can disseminate and migrate.</i>
dissemination	The opening of a subject to widespread discussion and debate. <i>The dissemination of public information.</i>
dissipate	Move away from each other. <i>The concern she d felt for him had wholly dissipated.</i>
distributed	(of a term) used to include every individual of the class to which it refers. <i>The distributed supplies are meticulously monitored to make sure everyone gets their share.</i>
distribution	The action of sharing something out among a number of recipients. <i>The government released about 74 000 tonnes of rice for distribution among people affected by the cyclone.</i>
diversify	Enlarge or vary the range of products or the field of operation of (a business). <i>Diversify a course of study.</i>

exponentially	(with reference to an increase) more and more rapidly. <i>The coefficients show an exponentially decaying trend.</i>
extended	Fully extended or stretched forth. <i>Refused to accept the extended hand.</i>
extensive	Covering or affecting a large area. <i>They suffered extensive damage.</i>
intersperse	Introduce one's writing or speech with certain expressions. <i>The debate was interspersed with angry exchanges.</i>
outspread	Fully extended in width. <i>Outspread wings.</i>
perfuse	Supply (an organ or tissue) with a fluid, typically treated blood or a blood substitute, by circulating it through blood vessels or other natural channels. <i>Perfuse a liver with a salt solution.</i>
permeate	Penetrate mutually or be interlocked. <i>The aroma of soup permeated the air.</i>
pervade	Be present and apparent throughout. <i>A smell of stale cabbage pervaded the air.</i>
pervasiveness	The quality of filling or spreading throughout. <i>The pervasiveness of violence on television.</i>
prevalence	The quality of prevailing generally; being widespread. <i>The prevalence of obesity in adults.</i>
proliferate	Increase rapidly in number; multiply. <i>Electromagnetic radiation can only proliferate cancers already present.</i>
proliferation	Growth by the rapid multiplication of parts. <i>A continuing threat of nuclear proliferation.</i>
propagate	Cause to propagate as by grafting or layering. <i>The French propagated the idea that the English were drunkards.</i>
scatter	Sow by scattering. <i>She waved her hand and scattered the crowds.</i>
scattered	Occurring or distributed over widely spaced and irregular intervals in time or space. <i>The forecast is for scattered showers.</i>
spread	Spread across or over. <i>The green spread of the park.</i>
spreading	Act of extending over a wider scope or expanse of space or time.

suffuse

Cause to spread or flush or flood through, over, or across.

*Her cheeks were **suffused** with colour.*

unfold

Develop or come to a promising stage.

*Eva **unfolded** her secret exploits to Mattie.*
