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## Associations of "Broken down" (30 Words)

<b>blighted</b>	Affected by blight; anything that mars or prevents growth or prosperity. <i><b>Blighted</b> urban districts.</i>
<b><a href="#">collapse</a></b>	Cause a lung or blood vessel to collapse. <i>The <b>collapse</b> of a railway bridge.</i>
<b><a href="#">curtail</a></b>	Place restrictions on. <i>Civil liberties were further <b>curtailed</b>.</i>
<b>debase</b>	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>War <b>debases</b> people.</i>
<b>declension</b>	A class of nouns or pronouns or adjectives in Indo-European languages having the same (or very similar) inflectional forms. <i>The first <b>declension</b> in Latin.</i>
<b>declivity</b>	A downward slope or bend. <i>A thickly wooded <b>declivity</b>.</i>
<b>decrease</b>	The amount by which something decreases. <i>The population of the area has <b>decreased</b> radically.</i>
<b>demoralize</b>	Corrupt the morals of (someone). <i>The General Strike had <b>demoralized</b> the trade unions.</i>
<b>descend</b>	(of night or darkness) begin to occur. <i>Groups of visiting supporters <b>descended</b> on a local pub.</i>
<b>descending</b>	Moving or sloping downwards. <i>The categories are listed in <b>descending</b> order of usefulness.</i>
<b><a href="#">descent</a></b>	An unexpected visit. <i>The plane had gone into a steep <b>descent</b>.</i>
<b>destroyed</b>	Destroyed physically or morally. <i>Alzheimer s is responsible for her <b>destroyed</b> mind.</i>

<b>downturn</b>	A worsening of business or economic activity. <i>A <b>downturn</b> in the housing market.</i>
<b>downward</b>	Towards a lower place, point, or level. <i>The <b>downward</b> pull of gravity.</i>
<b>drop</b>	An instance of falling or dropping. <i>I got to the depot and made the <b>drop</b>.</i>
<b>fall</b>	An act of falling or collapsing. <i>A <b>fall</b> from virtue.</i>
<b>falling</b>	Coming down freely under the influence of gravity. <i><b>Falling</b> temperatures.</i>
<b>flop</b>	With a flopping sound. <i>He landed on the bed with a great <b>flop</b>.</i>
<b>irremediable</b>	Impossible to remedy or correct or redress. <i><b>Irremediable</b> marital breakdowns.</i>
<b>irreparable</b>	Impossible to repair, rectify, or amend. <i>They were doing <b>irreparable</b> damage to my heart and lungs.</i>
<b>irreparably</b>	In an irreparable manner or to an irreparable degree. <i>His eye had been damaged <b>irreparably</b>.</i>
<b>low</b>	Of a vowel pronounced with the tongue held low in the mouth open. <i>The weatherman talked about highs and <b>lows</b>.</i>
<b>lower</b>	Move something or somebody to a lower position. <i><b>Lower</b> expectations.</i>
<b>reduction</b>	The amount by which something is made smaller, less, or lower in price. <i>We must see if the fracture requires <b>reduction</b>.</i>
<b>rundown</b>	(of a company or industry) in a poor economic state. <i>He gave his teammates a <b>rundown</b> on the opposition.</i>
<b>shattered</b>	Exhausted. <i>He was said to be absolutely <b>shattered</b> after losing his job.</i>
<b>sink</b>	Cause a ship to sink. <i>The doctor concluded that the lad was <b>sinking</b> fast.</i>
<b>submergence</b>	Sinking until covered completely with water. <i>Politicians may be blamed for <b>submergence</b> of principle.</i>
<b>substrate</b>	Any stratum or layer lying underneath another. <i>The Celtic languages of Britain are a <b>substrate</b> for English.</i>
<b>under</b>	Under water. <i>An <b>under</b> secretary.</i>
