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• Associations of "Broken down" (30 Words)

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blighted	Affected by blight; anything that mars or prevents growth or prosperity. <i>Blighted</i> urban districts.
<u>collapse</u>	Cause a lung or blood vessel to collapse. The collapse of a railway bridge.
<u>curtail</u>	Place restrictions on. Civil liberties were further curtail ed.
debase	Corrupt debase or make impure by adding a foreign or inferior substance often by replacing valuable ingredients with inferior ones. <i>War debases people.</i>
declension	A class of nouns or pronouns or adjectives in Indo-European languages having the same (or very similar) inflectional forms. <i>The first declension in Latin.</i>
declivity	A downward slope or bend. A thickly wooded declivity .
decrease	The amount by which something decreases. The population of the area has decrease d radically.
demoralize	Corrupt the morals of (someone. The General Strike had demoralize d the trade unions.
descend	(of night or darkness) begin to occur. Groups of visiting supporters descend ed on a local pub.
descending	Moving or sloping downwards. The categories are listed in descending order of usefulness.
<u>descent</u>	An unexpected visit. The plane had gone into a steep descent .
destroyed	Destroyed physically or morally. Alzheimer s is responsible for her destroyed mind.



<u>downturn</u>	A worsening of business or economic activity. A downturn in the housing market.
downward	Towards a lower place, point, or level. <i>The downward pull of gravity.</i>
drop	An instance of falling or dropping. I got to the depot and made the drop .
fall	An act of falling or collapsing. A fall from virtue.
<u>falling</u>	Coming down freely under the influence of gravity. <i>Falling</i> temperatures.
flop	With a flopping sound. <i>He landed on the bed with a great</i> flop .
irremediable	Impossible to remedy or correct or redress. <i>Irremediable</i> marital breakdowns.
irreparable	Impossible to repair, rectify, or amend. They were doing irreparable damage to my heart and lungs.
irreparably	In an irreparable manner or to an irreparable degree. <i>His eye had been damaged irreparably.</i>
low	Of a vowel pronounced with the tongue held low in the mouth open. The weatherman talked about highs and low s.
<u>lower</u>	Move something or somebody to a lower position. <i>Lower</i> expectations.
reduction	The amount by which something is made smaller, less, or lower in price. <i>We must see if the fracture requires reduction.</i>
<u>rundown</u>	(of a company or industry) in a poor economic state. <i>He gave his teammates a rundown on the opposition.</i>
<u>shattered</u>	Exhausted. <i>He was said to be absolutely</i> shattered <i>after losing his job.</i>
sink	Cause a ship to sink. The doctor concluded that the lad was sink ing fast.
submergence	Sinking until covered completely with water. Politicians may be blamed for submergence of principle.
<u>substrate</u>	Any stratum or layer lying underneath another. The Celtic languages of Britain are a substrate for English.
<u>under</u>	Under water. An under secretary.
