- *(of a marriage or other long-term relationship) having ended.*
- *Having breaks or gaps in continuity.*
- *Topographically very uneven.*
- *Discontinuous.*
- *Having an uneven and rough surface.*
- *(of a language) spoken falteringly and with many mistakes, as by a foreigner.*
- *Physically and forcibly separated into pieces or cracked or split.*

- *Thrown into a state of disarray or confusion.*
- *Weakened and infirm.*
- *Subdued or brought low in condition or status.*
- *(especially of promises or contracts) having been violated or disregarded.*
- *Having been violated or disregarded.*
- *Having been broken.*
- *Out of working order ('busted' is an informal substitute for 'broken).*
- *Tamed or trained to obey.*
- *Destroyed financially.*
- *Imperfectly spoken or written.*

Having been beaten or struck.

*Magnificent howdahs covered with **beaten** gold and silver.*

broken in

Thrown into a state of disarray or confusion.

bumpy	(of a surface) uneven, with many patches raised above the rest. <i>A bumpy country road.</i>
busted	Out of working order busted is an informal substitute for broken. <i>The coke machine is busted.</i>
confused	Having lost your bearings confused as to time or place or personal identity. <i>A confused expression crossed her face.</i>
crushed	Deformed, pulverized, or forced inwards by compression. <i>Crushed trousers and a crumpled jacket.</i>
damaged	Harmed or injured or spoiled. <i>The storm left a wake of badly damaged buildings.</i>
defeated	Beaten or overcome; not victorious. <i>The defeated enemy.</i>
disconnected	Music marked by or composed of disconnected parts or sounds cut short crisply. <i>I drove away feeling disconnected from the real world.</i>
discontinuous	Having intervals or gaps. <i>The landscape was a discontinuous mosaic of fields and forest areas.</i>
disjointed	Separated at the joint. <i>Piecing together disjointed fragments of information.</i>
disordered	Not arranged in order. <i>A patient who is mentally disordered.</i>
disrupted	Marked by breaks or gaps. <i>Many routes are unsafe or disrupted.</i>
disturbed	Afflicted with or marked by anxious uneasiness or trouble or grief. <i>Disturbed grass showed where the horse had passed.</i>
ended	Having come or been brought to a conclusion. <i>The affair is over ended finished.</i>
erratic	Not even or regular in pattern or movement; unpredictable. <i>An erratic comet.</i>
failed	(of a mechanism) not functioning properly. <i>A failed writer.</i>
faltering	Moving unsteadily or hesitantly. <i>His faltering career.</i>
fitful	Active or occurring spasmodically or intermittently; not regular or steady. <i>Fitful bursts of energy.</i>

fractured	(of an organization or other abstract thing) split or broken and unable to function or exist. <i>It s going to take some time to rebuild their fractured relationship.</i>
fragmentary	Consisting of small disconnected parts. <i>Excavations have revealed fragmentary remains of masonry.</i>
fragmented	Having been divided; having the unity destroyed. <i>A fragmented coalition.</i>
halting	Fragmentary or halting from emotional strain. <i>Uttered a few halting words of sorrow.</i>
hesitating	Tentative, unsure, or slow in acting or speaking. <i>His hesitating delivery.</i>
humbled	Low or inferior in station or quality.
<u>humiliated</u>	Subdued or brought low in condition or status. <i>Humiliated that his wife had to go out to work.</i>
<u>imperfect</u>	(of a gift, title, etc.) transferred without all the necessary conditions or requirements being met. <i>Had only an imperfect understanding of his responsibilities.</i>
<u>impoverished</u>	(of a person or area) made poor. <i>An impoverished and debased language.</i>
in bits	Holding office.
in pieces	Currently fashionable.
<u>incomplete</u>	Not yet finished. <i>His thesis is still incomplete.</i>
injured	Harmed, damaged, or impaired. <i>His injured pride.</i>
<u>intermittent</u>	Occurring at irregular intervals; not continuous or steady. <i>Intermittent rain.</i>
interrupted	Discontinued temporarily. <i>Fitful or interrupted sleep.</i>
<u>irregular</u>	Deviating from normal expectations; somewhat odd, strange, or abnormal. <i>Irregular troops.</i>
<u>low</u>	Used of sounds and voices low in pitch or frequency. <i>Low back pain.</i>
maimed	Having a part of the body crippled or disabled.
rough	(of an area or occasion) characterized by violent behaviour. <i>Rough manners.</i>

rugged	(of ground or terrain) having a broken, rocky, and uneven surface. <i>A rugged coastline.</i>
separated	Separated at the joint. <i>A separated shoulder.</i>
severed	Having been cut or sliced off. <i>The heartbreak of severed relationships.</i>
shattered	Exhausted. <i>He was said to be absolutely shattered after losing his job.</i>
smashed	Violently or badly broken or shattered. <i>When they go back to the barracks the single men get smashed.</i>
spasmodic	Caused by, subject to, or in the nature of a spasm or spasms. <i>A spasmodic cough.</i>
sporadic	Occurring at irregular intervals or only in a few places; scattered or isolated. <i>Sporadic fighting broke out.</i>
stammering	Uttered with a stammer. <i>A stammering confession of guilt.</i>
stumbling	Tripping or losing balance while walking; moving with difficulty. <i>Mike s stumbling pursuit of success.</i>
stuttering	Progressing in a hesitant or irregular way. <i>A stuttering voice.</i>
subdued	In a softened tone. <i>Subdued lights and soft music.</i>
torn	Having edges that are jagged from injury. <i>Torn by religious dissensions.</i>
troubled	Showing distress or anxiety. <i>These troubled areas.</i>
uneven	Not level or smooth. <i>The uneven distribution of resources.</i>
unkept	Not tidy or cared for. <i>Unkept appointments and broken promises.</i>
unsettled	Liable to change; unpredictable. <i>An unsettled state of mind.</i>
upset	Thrown into a state of disarray or confusion. <i>With everything so upset.</i>

breach	A break in relations. <i>A widening breach between government and Church.</i>
break	Break down literally or metaphorically. <i>Break a promise.</i>
burnt	Ruined by overcooking. <i>Burnt sienna.</i>
cracked	Of paint or varnish; having the appearance of alligator hide. <i>The captain was screaming orders in a cracked baritone.</i>

damage	Inflict damage upon. <i>She damaged the car when she hit the tree.</i>
demolition	The action or process of demolishing or being demolished. <i>The demolition of the huge tower was quite a spectacle.</i>
destroy	Destroy completely damage irreparably. <i>The customs agents destroyed the dog that was found to be rabid.</i>
destroyed	Destroyed physically or morally. <i>Alzheimer's is responsible for her destroyed mind.</i>
<u>destruction</u>	The action or process of killing or being killed. <i>The destruction of the rainforest.</i>
dissonant	Not in accord. <i>Irregular dissonant chords.</i>
<u>fatal</u>	Leading to failure or disaster. <i>A fatal accident.</i>
iconoclasm	The rejection or destruction of religious images as heretical; the doctrine of iconoclasts.
irremediable	Impossible to remedy or correct or redress. <i>Irremediable marital breakdowns.</i>
irreparable	(of an injury or loss) impossible to rectify or repair. <i>They were doing irreparable damage to my heart and lungs.</i>
irreparably	In a way that is impossible to rectify or repair. <i>Our international image has been irreparably tarnished.</i>
irreversibly	In a way that cannot be undone or altered. <i>Our landscape will be irreversibly damaged.</i>
kaput	Destroyed or killed. <i>The water pump's broken kaput.</i>
<u>mishap</u>	An instance of misfortune. <i>Although there were a few minor mishaps none of the pancakes stuck to the ceiling.</i>
piece	Assemble something from parts or pieces. <i>He wrote an interesting piece on Iran.</i>
raspy	Unpleasantly harsh or grating in sound. <i>His voice was raspy from days of non stop campaigning.</i>
raze	Completely destroy (a building, town, or other settlement). <i>Villages were razed to the ground.</i>
<u>revitalize</u>	Imbue (something) with new life and vitality. <i>A package of spending cuts to revitalize the economy.</i>

- rough** With roughness or violence rough is an informal variant for roughly.
*The nomad life is **rough** and hazardous.*
- rugged** Topographically very uneven.
*With a house full of boys you have to have **rugged** furniture.*
- ruined** Having been irreparably damaged or harmed.
*A **ruined** castle.*
- shattered** Exhausted.
*I usually feel too **shattered** to do more than crawl into bed.*
- surprised** Taken unawares or suddenly and feeling wonder or astonishment.
***Surprised** that he remembered my name.*
- zig** A sharp change of direction in a zigzag course.
*He went round and round in **zigs** and zags.*
