<b>intimidating</b>	Discouraging through fear. <i>The <b>intimidating</b> defence barrister.</i>
<b>meditative</b>	Deeply or seriously thoughtful. <i><b>Meditative</b> techniques.</i>
<b>musings</b>	Deeply or seriously thoughtful. <i>The sad <b>musings</b> gaze.</i>
<b>ominous</b>	Presaging ill fortune. <i>A dead and <b>ominous</b> silence prevailed.</i>
<b>pensive</b>	Showing pensive sadness. <i>A <b>pensive</b> mood.</i>
<b>pondering</b>	Deeply or seriously thoughtful.
<b><u>reflective</u></b>	Capable of physically reflecting light or sound. <i>A <b>reflective</b> surface.</i>
<b>ruminative</b>	Expressing or involving deep thought. <i>A deeply <b>ruminative</b> mysterious lament.</i>
<b><u>sinister</u></b>	Evil or criminal. <i>There was something <b>sinister</b> about that murmuring voice.</i>
<b><u>terrifying</u></b>	Causing extreme terror. <i>A <b>terrifying</b> wail.</i>
<b>threatening</b>	Threatening or foreshadowing evil or tragic developments. <i>She was a type he found <b>threatening</b>.</i>
<b>thunderous</b>	Very powerful or intense. <i>A <b>thunderous</b> grey cloud.</i>
<b>warning</b>	Serving to warn.

<b>cogitate</b>	Use or exercise the mind or one's power of reason in order to make inferences, decisions, or arrive at a solution or judgments. <i>He stroked his beard and retired to <b>cogitate</b>.</i>
<b>consider</b>	Show consideration for take into account. <i>The judge <b>considered</b> the offender's youth and was lenient.</i>
<b>considerable</b>	Large or relatively large in number or amount or extent or degree. <i>Spent a <b>considerable</b> amount of time on the problem.</i>
<b>contemplate</b>	Think intently and at length, as for spiritual purposes. <i><b>Contemplate</b> one's navel.</i>
<b>contemplation</b>	Deep reflective thought. <i>Substantial fitting work is in <b>contemplation</b>.</i>



<b>deep</b>	A deep part of the sea. <b>Deep</b> concentration.
<b><u>deliberate</u></b>	Unhurried and with care and dignity. She <b>deliberated</b> over the menu.
<b><u>flock</u></b>	Of birds congregate in a flock. A <b>flock</b> of gulls.
<b>introspect</b>	Examine one's own thoughts or feelings. What they don't do is <b>introspect</b> much about the reasons for their plight.
<b><u>introspection</u></b>	The examination or observation of one's own mental and emotional processes. Quiet <b>introspection</b> can be extremely valuable.
<b><u>meditate</u></b>	Reflect deeply on a subject. He went off to <b>meditate</b> on the new idea.
<b>meditative</b>	Deeply or seriously thoughtful. <b>Meditative</b> techniques.
<b>mirror</b>	Reflect as if in a mirror. His own views <b>mirrored</b> those of his followers.
<b>mirrored</b>	Having a surface like a mirror; reflective. The room has wall to wall <b>mirrored</b> wardrobes.
<b>mull</b>	An island in western Scotland in the Inner Hebrides. I <b>mulled</b> over the events of the afternoon.
<b><u>muse</u></b>	Reflect deeply on a subject. Euterpe was his <b>muse</b> .
<b>pensive</b>	Showing pensive sadness. A <b>pensive</b> mood.
<b><u>ponder</u></b>	Think about (something) carefully, especially before making a decision or reaching a conclusion. I <b>pondered</b> the question of what clothes to wear for the occasion.
<b>ponderable</b>	Capable of being thought about. Something <b>ponderable</b> from the outer world something of which we can say that its weight is so and so.
<b><u>reconsider</u></b>	Consider again (a bill) that had been voted upon before, with a view to altering it. Won't you <b>reconsider</b> your decision.
<b><u>reflect</u></b>	Reflect deeply on a subject. The mess in his dorm room <b>reflects</b> on the student.



<u>reflective</u>	Capable of physically reflecting light or sound. <i>The <b>reflective</b> type.</i>
<b>resonate</b>	Produce electrical or mechanical resonance. <i>The crystal <b>resonates</b> at 16 MHz.</i>
<u>retrospect</u>	A survey or review of a past course of events or period of time. <i>A full <b>retrospect</b> of the battle.</i>
<u>ruminate</u>	Chew the cuds. <i>Goats <b>ruminated</b> nonchalantly around them.</i>
<u>speculate</u>	Invest in stocks, property, or other ventures in the hope of gain but with the risk of loss. <i>Philosophers have <b>speculated</b> on the question of God for thousands of years.</i>
<b>think</b>	An instance of deliberate thinking. <i>Any writer who so rarely produces a book is not <b>thinking</b> deep thoughts.</i>
<b>thoughtful</b>	Taking heed giving close and thoughtful attention. <i>A <b>thoughtful</b> paper.</i>
<u>thoughtfully</u>	Showing consideration and thoughtfulness. <i>The government <b>thoughtfully</b> offered to foot part of the bill.</i>
