- A cleaning implement for sweeping; bundle of straws or twigs attached to a long handle.
- Any of various shrubs of the genera Cytisus or Genista or Spartium having long slender branches and racemes of yellow flowers.

<u>cleaner</u>	A device for cleaning such as a vacuum cleaner. She s one of the office <b>cleaner</b> s.
cleaning	The act of making something clean. <i>He gave his shoes a good <b>cleaning</b>.</i>
cobweb	Something resembling a cobweb in delicacy or intricacy. <i>The wooden carvings were almost obliterated by</i> <b>cobweb</b> s.
<u>debris</u>	The remains of something that has been destroyed or broken up. <i>Leaves and garden debris.</i>



detritus	Organic matter produced by the decomposition of organisms. <i>The streets were foul with <b>detritus</b></i> .
dirt	Not leveled or drained; unsuitable for all year travel. Michael threw a handful of <b>dirt</b> on to the coffin.
<u>dust</u>	Rub the dust over a surface so as to blur the outlines of a shape. A number of aircraft will be <b>dust</b> ed off and returned to flight.
extensive	Large in amount or scale. They suffered <b>extensive</b> damage.
haired	Having hair of a specified kind. A curly <b>haired</b> boy.
<u>janitor</u>	A person employed to look after a building; a caretaker.
<u>maid</u>	A virgin. Mary eventually managed to find a job as a <b>maid</b> .
mite	A minute arachnid which has four pairs of legs when adult, related to the ticks. Many kinds live in the soil and a number are parasitic on plants or animals.
mop	To wash or wipe with or as if with a mop. <i>Mop</i> and mow.
mote	A tiny piece of anything. The tiniest <b>mote</b> of dust.
mow	Cut with a blade or mower. Mop and <b>mow</b> .
particle	Any of numerous subatomic constituents of the physical world that interact with each other including electrons neutrinos photons and alpha particles. <i>Tiny</i> <b>particles</b> of dust.
<u>scrub</u>	An act of scrubbing something or someone. Don t use facial <b>scrub</b> s if your skin is sensitive.
soot	Cover or clog something with soot. You have previously <b>soot</b> ed the underside of their plate by holding it over a candle.
stained	(of a material or object) coloured by application of a penetrative dye or chemical. <i>Her ink <b>stained</b> fingers.</i>
sweep	Move with sweeping effortless gliding motions. A <b>sweep</b> of his arm.
<u>sweeping</u>	Dirt or refuse collected by sweeping. A smooth <b>sweeping</b> motion.



tatter	A small piece of cloth or paper.	
toothbrush Small brush; has long handle; used to clean teeth.		
vacuum	Clean with a vacuum cleaner. Without their support he ll be ruling in a <b>vacuum</b> .	
wag	Move (an upwards-pointing finger) from side to side to signify disapproval. <i>His tail began to <b>wag</b>.</i>	
<u>wash</u>	An act of washing something or an instance of being washed. An oil slick <b>wash</b> ed up on the beaches.	
<u>witch</u>	A woman who is bewitchingly attractive. <i>He can marry the old <b>witch</b> for all I care.</i>
