- *Used to refer to a significant, usually rapid, increase in asset prices that is soon*

*followed by a collapse in prices and typically arises from speculation or enthusiasm rather than intrinsic increases in value.*

- *A hollow globule of gas (e.g., air or carbon dioxide).*
- *A transparent domed cover or enclosure.*
- *A thin sphere of liquid enclosing air or another gas.*
- *A dome-shaped covering made of transparent glass or plastic.*
- *A marine mollusc that typically has a thin scroll-like shell.*

<b><u>fantasy</u></b>	A fantasia. <i>The notion of being independent is a child's ultimate <b>fantasy</b>.</i>
<b>globe</b>	A spherical or rounded object. <i>A female figure holding a sceptre and <b>globe</b>.</i>
<b>globule</b>	A small round particle of a substance; a drop. <i><b>Globules</b> of fat.</i>
<b>house of cards</b>	The management of a gambling house or casino.
<b>illusion</b>	An erroneous mental representation. <i>They have the <b>illusion</b> that I am very wealthy.</i>
<b>orb</b>	An object with a spherical shape. <i>A pale <b>orb</b> of hazy reddish light.</i>
<b>pipe dream</b>	A tube with a small bowl at one end; used for smoking tobacco.
<b><u>round</u></b>	The amount of ammunition needed to fire one shot. <i>They enjoyed singing <b>rounds</b>.</i>
<b>spheroid</b>	A solid generated by a half revolution of an ellipse about its major axis prolate spheroid or minor axis oblate spheroid. <i>It looked like a sphere but on closer examination I saw it was really a <b>spheroid</b>.</i>

<b>effervesce</b>	(of a liquid) give off bubbles. <i>Managers are supposed to <b>effervesce</b> with praise and encouragement.</i>
<b>eruct</b>	Expel gas from the stomach.
<b>fizz</b>	Become bubbly or frothy or foaming. <i>His lemonade was still <b>fizzing</b> at the top of the glass.</i>
<b>foam</b>	Become bubbly or frothy or foaming. <i>The river was <b>foaming</b>.</i>
<b>froth</b>	Make froth or foam and become bubbly. <i>The red blood <b>frothed</b> at his lips.</i>
<b>guggle</b>	Make a sound like a liquid that is being poured from a bottle.
<b>gurgle</b>	Make a hollow bubbling sound like that made by water running out of a bottle. <i>My stomach <b>gurgled</b>.</i>
<b><u>gush</u></b>	Gush forth in a sudden stream or jet. <i>The tanker began to <b>gush</b> oil from its damaged hull.</i>
<b><u>hum</u></b>	Sound with a monotonous hum. <i>She <b>hummed</b> a melody.</i>
<b><u>murmur</u></b>	Express one's discontent about (someone or something) in a subdued manner. <i>How interesting he <b>murmured</b> quietly.</i>
<b>overflow</b>	Overflow with a certain feeling. <i>Boxes <b>overflowing</b> with bright flowers.</i>
<b>purl</b>	Knit with a purl stitch. <i>Knit one <b>purl</b> one.</i>
<b>purr</b>	Indicate pleasure by purring characteristic of cats. <i>The car engine <b>purred</b>.</i>
<b><u>ripple</u></b>	Stir up water so as to form ripples. <i>Applause <b>rippled</b> around the tables.</i>
<b><u>rumble</u></b>	(of a dispute) continue in a persistent but low-key way. <i>He <b>grumbled</b> a rude response.</i>
<b>run over</b>	Travel a route regularly.
<b>seethe</b>	(of a liquid) boil or be turbulent as if boiling. <i>We cascaded down the stairs and <b>seethed</b> across the station.</i>
<b>simmer</b>	Show or feel barely suppressed anger or other strong emotion. <i>She was <b>simmering</b> with resentment.</i>

- sparkle** Be vivacious and witty.  
*The musical performance **sparkled**.*
- spume** Make froth or foam and become bubbly.  
*Water was **spuming** under the mill.*
- whir** Make a soft swishing sound.  
*The motor **whirred**.*

<b>dampen</b>	Check; keep in check (a fire). <i>The fine rain <b>dampened</b> her face.</i>
<b>drizzle</b>	Very light rain; stronger than mist but less than a shower. <i>A steady <b>drizzle</b> has been falling since 3 a m.</i>
<b>effervescence</b>	The process of bubbling as gas escapes. <i>He was filled with such <b>effervescence</b>.</i>
<b>excite</b>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>The energy of an electron is sufficient to <b>excite</b> the atom.</i>
<b>fizz</b>	The quality of being fizzy effervescence. <i>The <b>fizz</b> of 300 sparklers.</i>
<b>froth</b>	Become bubbly or frothy or foaming. <i>Her skirt swirled in a <b>froth</b> of black lace.</i>
<b>frothy</b>	Light and entertaining but of little substance. <i>Foamy or <b>frothy</b> beer.</i>
<b>lather</b>	Exude sweat or lather. <i>My mother caught me by the back of the neck and <b>lathered</b> me up the steps.</i>
<b>launder</b>	A channel for conveying molten metal from a furnace or container to a ladle or mould. <i>We began to notice attempts to <b>launder</b> the data retrospectively.</i>
<b>lave</b>	Wash. <i>The sea below <b>laved</b> the shore with small agitated waves.</i>
<b>moisten</b>	Moisten with fine drops. <i>Her eyes <b>moistened</b>.</i>
<b>oxygenation</b>	The process of providing or combining or treating with oxygen. <i>The <b>oxygenation</b> of the blood.</i>
<b>plumbing</b>	The work of installing and maintaining a plumbing system. <i>The kitchen has a gas cooker point and <b>plumbing</b> for an automatic washing machine.</i>
<b>restroom</b>	A toilet in a public building.
<b>rinse</b>	Rinse one's mouth and throat with mouthwash. <i>A coloured <b>rinse</b>.</i>

<b>shampoo</b>	Wash something in or out of the hair using shampoo. <i>Dolly was sitting in the bath <b>shampooing</b> her hair.</i>
<b>shiny</b>	Having a shiny surface or coating. <i><b>Shiny</b> hair.</i>
<b>shower</b>	Cause a mass of small things to fall in a shower. <i>Her friends organized a baby <b>shower</b> for her when she was expecting.</i>
<b>soap</b>	A soap opera. <i>She <b>soaped</b> her face.</i>
<b>toilet</b>	A room building or cubicle containing a toilet or toilets. <i>Most patients with the disease are incontinent although this may be minimized with regular <b>toileting</b>.</i>
<b>tub</b>	Plant in a tub. <i>A margarine <b>tub</b>.</i>
<b>wash</b>	Wash or flow against. <i>She hung out her Tuesday <b>wash</b>.</i>
