- *Cause to form bubbles.*
- *Expel gas from the stomach.*
- *Form, produce, or emit bubbles.*
- *Flow in an irregular current with a bubbling noise.*
- *Rise in bubbles or as if in bubbles.*



Synonyms of "Bubbles" as a verb (8 Words)

- babble** Utter something rapidly and incoherently.
*He **babbled** to another convict while he was in jail.*
- belch** Expel gas from the stomach.
*A factory chimney **belches** out smoke.*
- burble** Flow in an irregular current with a bubbling noise.
*He **burbled** on about annuities.*
- burp** Make (a baby) belch after feeding, typically by patting its back.
*Please don't **burp** at the table.*
- eruct** Emit stomach gas noisily through the mouth; belch.
- guggle** Drink from a flask with a gurgling sound.
- gurgle** Drink from a flask with a gurgling sound.
*The rain **gurgled** along the gutters.*

ripple Stir up water so as to form ripples.
A cool wind **rippled** the surface of the estuary.



Usage Examples of "Bubbles" as a verb

- *Bubble gas through a liquid.*
- *Bubble to the surface.*



Associations of "Bubbles" (30 Words)

- ablution** An act of washing oneself.
*The women performed their **ablutions**.*
- bath** A soaking and washing in a bathtub.
*She took a long hot **bath**.*
- bathe** Cleanse the entire body.
*A **bathe** in the cold North Sea.*
- bathtub** A relatively large open container that you fill with water and use to wash the body.
- borax** A white compound which occurs as a mineral in some alkaline salt deposits and is used in making glass and ceramics, as a metallurgical flux, and as an antiseptic.
- churn** Produce butter by churning milk or cream.
*The women were **churning** butter and making cheese.*

cleanse	Rid of something unpleasant or defiling. <i>I recommend doing a cleanse when your social calendar is event free because you might feel a bit more tired than usual.</i>
conditioner	A trainer of athletes. <i>Farm work can be a good conditioner.</i>
dampen	Make moist. <i>Slider switches on the mixers can dampen the drums.</i>
drizzle	(in cooking) a thin stream of a liquid ingredient trickled over food. <i>Scotland will be cloudy with patchy drizzle.</i>
effervescence	Vivacity and enthusiasm. <i>The effervescence of sparkling wine.</i>
excite	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Excite the audience.</i>
fizz	The quality of being fizzy effervescence. <i>The champagne had lost its fizz.</i>
froth	Make froth or foam and become bubbly. <i>The angry man was frothing at the mouth.</i>
frothy	Emitting or filled with bubbles as from carbonation or fermentation. <i>Steaming mugs of frothy coffee.</i>
lather	Form or cause to form a lather. <i>She rinsed off the lather and dried her hands.</i>
launder	Conceal the origins of (money obtained illegally), typically by transfers involving foreign banks or legitimate businesses. <i>We began to notice attempts to launder the data retrospectively.</i>
lave	Wash or flow against. <i>The sea below laved the shore with small agitated waves.</i>
moisten	Moisten with fine drops. <i>The dew moistened the meadows.</i>
oxygenation	The process of providing or combining or treating with oxygen. <i>The oxygenation of the blood.</i>
plumbing	The work of installing and maintaining a plumbing system. <i>The kitchen has a gas cooker point and plumbing for an automatic washing machine.</i>
restroom	A room in a public building for people to relax or recover in.
rinse	Rinse one's mouth and throat with mouthwash. <i>The medication is used as a rinse twice a day after breakfast and dinner.</i>

shampoo	An act of washing or cleaning something especially the hair with shampoo. <i>The foyer smelled of dusty plants and carpet shampoo.</i>
shiny	Having a shiny surface or coating. <i>Saw the moon like a shiny dime on a deep blue velvet carpet.</i>
shower	Of a mass of small things fall or be thrown in a shower. <i>You should shower after vigorous exercise.</i>
soap	Wash with soap. <i>She soaped her face.</i>
toilet	Assist or supervise someone especially an infant or invalid in using a toilet. <i>Most patients with the disease are incontinent although this may be minimized with regular toileting.</i>
tub	The amount that a tub will hold. <i>She s revolting she doesn t tub.</i>
wash	A quantity of clothes needing to be or just having been washed. <i>Floods washed away the bridges.</i>
