**peasant** An ignorant, rude, or unsophisticated person.

***Peasants** left the farms to work in industry.*

**provincial** An official in charge of an ecclesiastical province acting under the superior general of a religious order.

*The general of the Jesuits receives monthly reports from the **provincials**.*

<b>outdoor</b>	Pertaining to or concerning the outdoors or outdoor activities. <i>A rugged <b>outdoor</b> type.</i>
<b>pastoral</b>	(of a work of art) portraying or evoking country life, typically in a romanticized or idealized form. <i>A <b>pastoral</b> economy.</i>

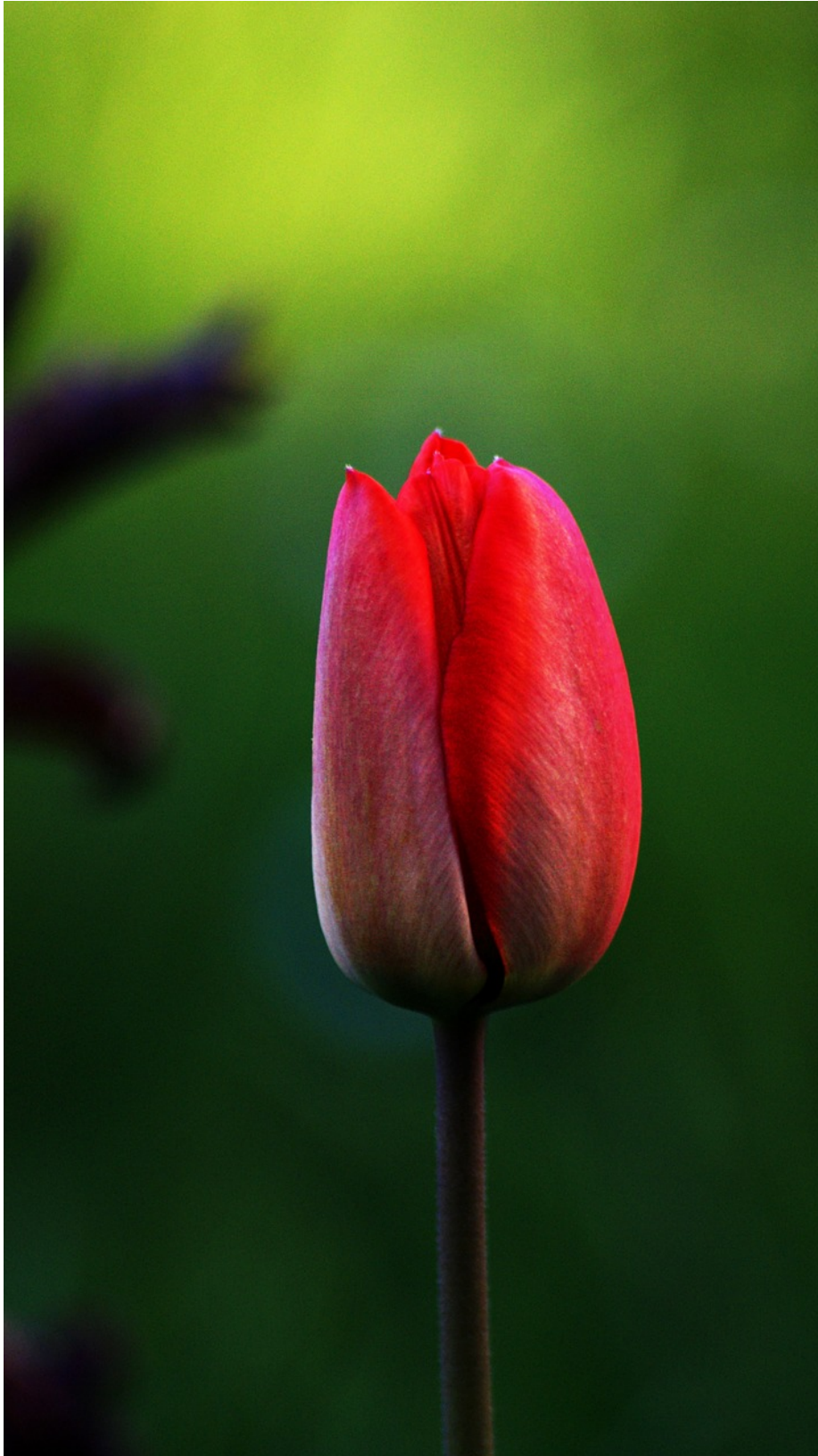
- rural** In, relating to, or characteristic of the countryside rather than the town.  
*Unpaved **rural** roads.*
- rustic** Lacking the sophistication of the city; backward and provincial.  
***Rustic** awkwardness.*
- unspoiled** Not spoiled, in particular (of a place) not marred by development.  
*One of the best stretches of **unspoiled** coastline in the UK.*

<b>agricultural</b>	Relating to or used in or promoting agriculture or farming. <i><b>Agricultural</b> land.</i>
<b>agriculture</b>	The practice of cultivating the land or raising stock.
<b>botanist</b>	A biologist specializing in the study of plants. <i>A <b>botanist</b> announced he d bred a new and beautiful variety of orchid.</i>
<b>countryside</b>	The inhabitants of countryside areas. <i>They explored the surrounding <b>countryside</b>.</i>
<b>cowhand</b>	A person employed to tend cattle or to run a ranch.
<b><u>crop</u></b>	Prepare for crops. <i>The main <b>crops</b> were oats and barley.</i>
<b>cultivator</b>	A mechanical implement for breaking up the ground and uprooting weeds. <i>They were herders of cattle and <b>cultivators</b> of corn.</i>
<b>dairy</b>	A farm where dairy products are produced. <i>Local <b>dairy</b> foods.</i>
<b>depopulate</b>	Reduce in population. <i>The epidemic <b>depopulated</b> the countryside.</i>
<b><u>farmer</u></b>	A person who owns or manages a farm.
<b>intelligentsia</b>	An educated and intellectual elite. <i>A distrust of the <b>intelligentsia</b> and of theoretical learning.</i>
<b>laity</b>	Lay people, as distinct from the clergy.
<b><u>local</u></b>	A local branch of an organization especially a trade union. <i>The <b>local</b> post office.</i>
<b>localization</b>	(physiology) the principle that specific functions have relatively circumscribed locations in some particular part or organ of the body. <i>Differences in <b>localization</b> of growth control molecules in carcinoma.</i>
<b>parochial</b>	Relating to or supported by or located in a parish. <i>Little sympathy with <b>parochial</b> mentality.</i>
<b>pasture</b>	Feed as in a meadow or pasture. <i>She left the office for <b>pastures</b> new.</i>
<b><u>peasant</u></b>	A poor smallholder or agricultural labourer of low social status (chiefly in historical use or with reference to subsistence farming in poorer countries). <i><b>Peasant</b> farmers.</i>
<b><u>peon</u></b>	A bullfighter who uses banderillas (darts thrust into a bull's neck or shoulders); a banderillero. <i>The elder son is a <b>peon</b> at a nearby school.</i>

<b><u>provincial</u></b>	An inhabitant of the regions outside the capital city of a country, especially when regarded as unsophisticated or narrow-minded. <b><i>Provincial</i></b> towns.
<b>rancher</b>	A person who owns or operates a ranch.
<b>reaper</b>	A person or machine that harvests a crop.
<b><u>rural</u></b>	Of or relating to the countryside as opposed to the city. <b><i>Rural</i></b> people.
<b><u>rustic</u></b>	Awkwardly simple and provincial. <i>Bare plaster walls and terracotta floor give a <b>rustic</b> feel.</i>
<b><u>serf</u></b>	(Middle Ages) a person who is bound to the land and owned by the feudal lord.
<b>serfdom</b>	The state of being a serf or feudal labourer. <i>The liberation of the peasants from <b>serfdom</b>.</i>
<b>shopkeeper</b>	A merchant who owns or manages a shop.
<b>suburban</b>	Of or characteristic of a suburb. <b><i>Suburban</i></b> life.
<b>vassalage</b>	The state of a serf.
<b><u>village</u></b>	A self contained district or community within a town or city regarded as having features characteristic of village life. <i>All the <b>village</b> could do was listen.</i>
<b>yeoman</b>	A member of the yeomanry force.
