Of the relatively near future.  
*He was the **coming** man of French racing.*

**future**

Effective in or looking toward the future.  
*He was preparing for **future** employment opportunities.*

**in the making**

Directed or bound inward.

**promising**

Likely to turn out well in the future.  
*A **promising** young man.*

**prospective**

Likely to happen at a future date.  
***Prospective** earnings.*

- rising** Newly come into prominence.  
A **rising** trend.
- up-and-coming** Of the relatively near future.
- with potential** Expected to become or be; in prospect.

<b>childhood</b>	The state or period of being a child. <i>The idealized world of <b>childhood</b>.</i>
<b>commencement</b>	The act of starting something. <i>The date of <b>commencement</b>.</i>
<b>early</b>	Early shifts. <i>The <b>early</b> inhabitants of Europe.</i>
<b>embryonic</b>	Relating to an embryo. <i>The plan is still in its <b>embryonic</b> stages.</i>

<b>first</b>	The first element in a countable series. <i>Her <b>first</b> baby.</i>
<b>freshly</b>	In an impudent or impertinent manner. <i>A <b>freshly</b> cleaned floor.</i>
<b>inchoate</b>	Confused or incoherent. <i><b>Inchoate</b> proletarian protest.</i>
<b>inchoative</b>	An inchoative verb. <i><b>Inchoative</b> stages.</i>
<b><u>nascent</u></b>	(especially of a process or organization) just coming into existence and beginning to display signs of future potential. <i>The <b>nascent</b> space industry.</i>
<b>natal</b>	A port city in northeastern Brazil. <i>He was living in the south many miles from his <b>natal</b> city.</i>
<b><u>native</u></b>	Used in names of animals or plants resembling others familiar elsewhere e.g native bee. <i>A ceremonial <b>native</b> dance from Fiji.</i>
<b>new</b>	Newly recently. <i>Errors of someone <b>new</b> to the job.</i>
<b>newborn</b>	A recently born child or animal. <i>With <b>newborn</b> fears.</i>
<b>newly</b>	Only just; recently. <i>We have to make ourselves <b>newly</b> aware of each text.</i>
<b><u>novelty</u></b>	Originality by virtue of being new and surprising. <i>In 1914 air travel was still a <b>novelty</b>.</i>
<b>pacesetter</b>	A leading instance in its field. <i>These centres are the <b>pacesetters</b> for the nation.</i>
<b><u>premature</u></b>	Occurring or done before the usual or proper time; too early. <i>The child was three weeks <b>premature</b>.</i>
<b>primeval</b>	Of the earliest time in history. <i>Mile after mile of <b>primeval</b> forest.</i>
<b>recency</b>	A time immediately before the present.
<b>recently</b>	In the recent past. <i>I <b>recently</b> bought a CD player.</i>

<b>settler</b>	A person who settles in a new colony or moves into new country. <i>The early European <b>settlers</b> in America were often fleeing from religious persecution.</i>
<b><u>unfamiliar</u></b>	Not known or well known. <i>A name <b>unfamiliar</b> to most.</i>
<b>untimely</b>	Too soon; in a premature manner. <i>His <b>untimely</b> death in military action.</i>
<b><u>unused</u></b>	Not in active use. <i><b>Unused</b> to spicy food she took a long mouthful of water.</i>
<b>urgency</b>	An earnest and persistent quality; insistence. <i>The <b>urgency</b> of his need.</i>
<b>young</b>	Used to denote the younger of two people of the same name. <i>A <b>young</b> hand at plowing.</i>
