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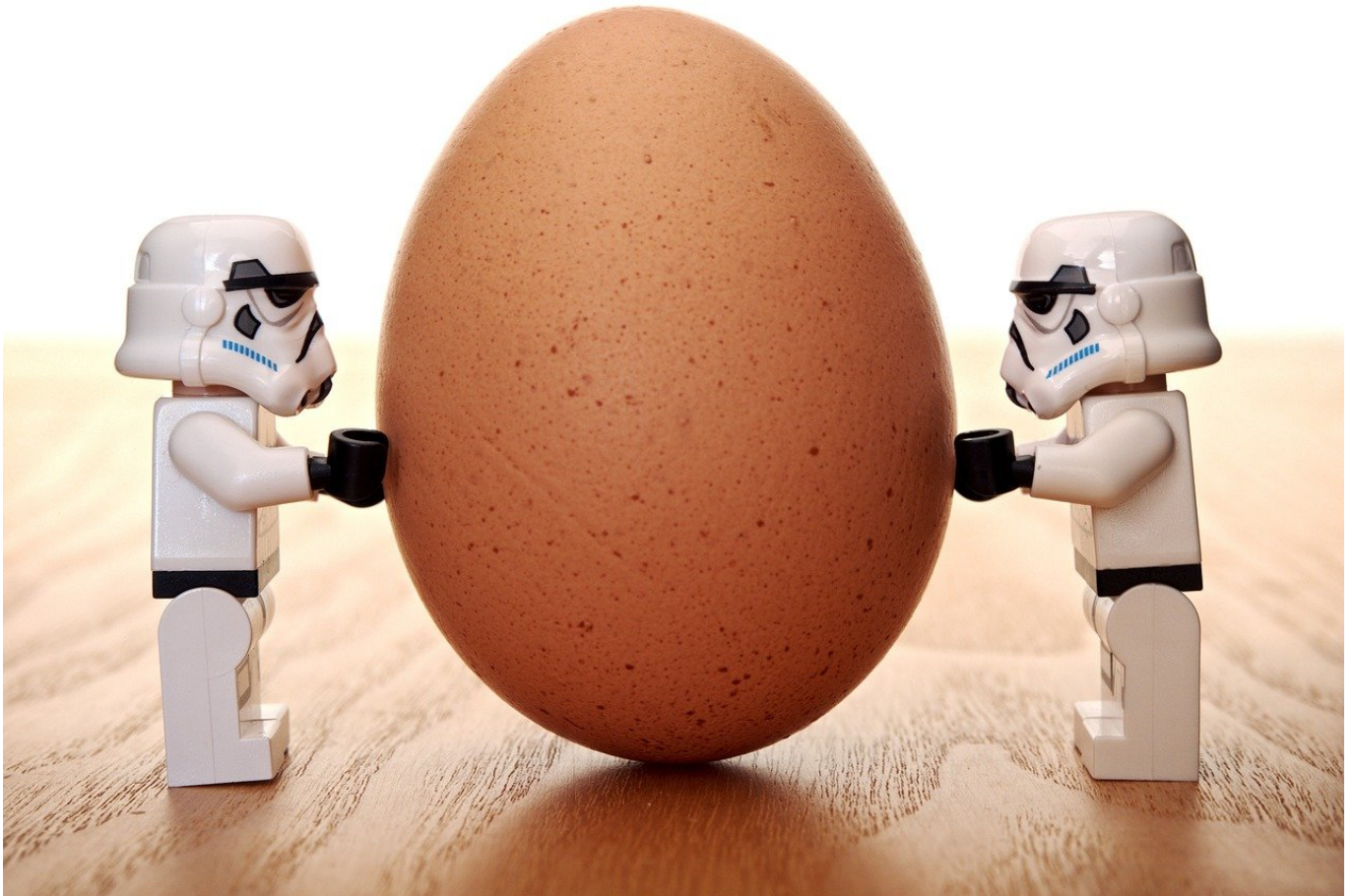

## Buddy as a Noun

### Definitions of "Buddy" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “buddy” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Used as a form of address to a man whose name is not known.*
- *A close friend.*
- *A person who befriends and helps another with an incapacitating disease, typically AIDS.*
- *A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities.*
- *A working companion with whom close cooperation is required.*



## Synonyms of "Buddy" as a noun (13 Words)

**boon companion** A desirable state.

**brother** (Roman Catholic Church) a title given to a monk and used as form of address.

*None of his **brothers** would betray him.*

**chum** A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities.

*It s your own fault **chum**.*

**companion** A member of the lowest grade of certain orders of knighthood.

*His travelling **companion**.*

**comrade** Used as a term of address for those male persons engaged in the same movement.

***Comrades** in arms.*

| <b><u>crony</u></b>     | A close friend or companion.<br><i>He went gambling with his cronies.</i>  |
| <b><u>familiar</u></b>  | A friend who is frequently in the company of another.<br><i>Her <b>familiars</b> were her two little griffons that nested in her skirts.</i> |
| <b>friend</b>           | A contact on a social networking website.<br><i>We are <b>friends</b> of the family.</i>   |
| <b>intimate</b>         | Someone to whom private matters are confided.<br><i>His circle of <b>intimates</b>.</i>  |
| <b><u>pal</u></b>       | Used as a form of address, especially to indicate anger or aggression.<br><i>We've been <b>pals</b> for a long time.</i>                     |
| <b>second self</b>      | A 60th part of a minute of arc.  |
| <b><u>sidekick</u></b>  | A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities.<br><i>Sherlock Holmes bumbling <b>sidekick</b> Watson.</i>                   |

- *Gay male counsellors, buddies, and helpline volunteers are available upon request.*
- *I'm working on it, buddy.*

- acquaintance** Acquaintances considered collectively.  
*His extensive **acquaintance** included Oscar Wilde and Yeats.*
- amicability** A disinclination to quarrel.
- aunt** The sister of one's father or mother or the wife of one's uncle.  
*She was brought up by her **aunt** and uncle.*

| <b>cousin</b>        | A thing related or analogous to another.<br><i>Our American <b>cousins</b>.</i>   |
| <b>crony</b>         | A close friend or companion.<br><i>He went gambling with his <b>cronies</b>.</i>  |
| <b>fellow</b>        | A friend who is frequently in the company of another.<br><i>He was learning with a rapidity unique among his <b>fellows</b>.</i>  |
| <b>folk</b>          | Relating to folk music.<br><i>Meanwhile <b>folks</b> why not relax and enjoy the atmosphere.</i>  |
| <b>fraternal</b>     | (of twins) developed from separate ova and therefore genetically distinct and not necessarily of the same sex or more similar than other siblings.<br><i>A network of political clubs and <b>fraternal</b> organizations.</i> |
| <b>friend</b>        | Add someone to a list of friends or contacts on a social networking website.<br><i>The woman got married and you still used to <b>friend</b> with she.</i>  |
| <b>friendship</b>    | The state of being friends (or friendly).<br><i>She formed close <b>friendships</b> with women.</i>   |
| <b>grader</b>        | A wheeled machine for levelling the ground, especially in making roads.<br><i>A first <b>grader</b>.</i>  |
| <b>mate</b>          | South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate.<br><i>A sock without its <b>mate</b>.</i>   |

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| <b><u>neighbor</u></b> | Live or be located as a neighbor.<br><i>Pakistan <b>neighbors</b> India.</i>   |
| <b>neighbour</b>       | Any person in need of one's help or kindness (after biblical use).<br><i>The square <b>neighbours</b> the old quarter of the town.</i>   |
| <b><u>pal</u></b>      | A friend.<br><i>We got acquainted but we never really <b>palled</b> around.</i>  |
| <b><u>partner</u></b>  | Act as a partner.<br><i>Arrange the children in pairs so that each person has a <b>partner</b>.</i>  |
| <b><u>sibling</u></b>  | A person's brother or sister.  |
| <b><u>sister</u></b>   | A female friend or associate, especially a female fellow member of a trade union or other organization.<br><i>A <b>sister</b> ship.</i>  |
| <b>sisterhood</b>      | A religious society of women who live together as sisters (especially an order of nuns).<br><i>Canadian feminists acknowledge their <b>sisterhood</b> with women around the globe.</i> |
| <b><u>twin</u></b>     | A twin bedded room.<br><i><b>Twin</b> crystals.</i>  |
| <b>uncle</b>           | The brother of your father or mother; the husband of your aunt.<br><i>He visited his <b>uncle</b>.</i>   |
