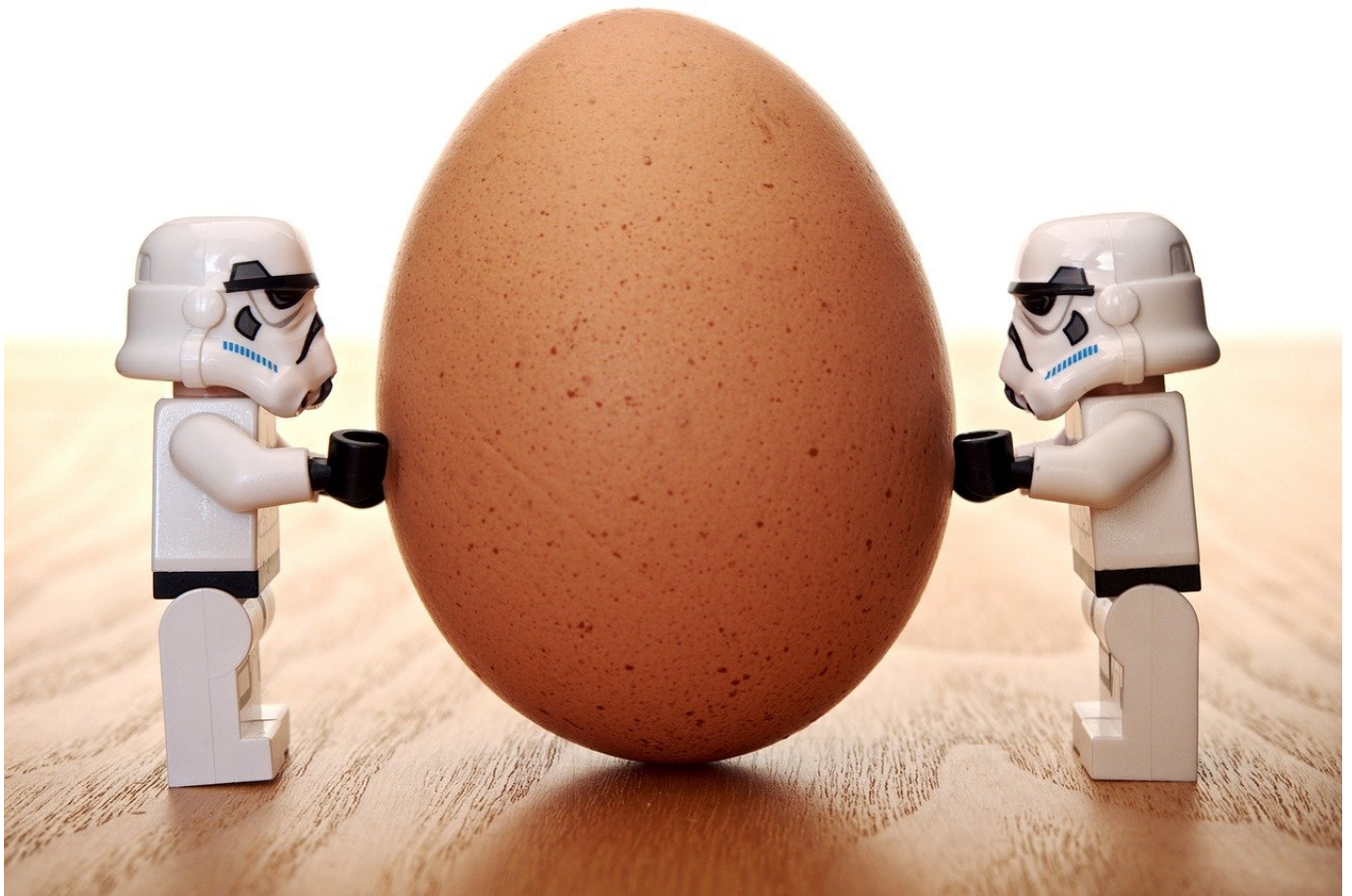

Buddy as a Noun

Definitions of "Buddy" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “buddy” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Used as a form of address to a man whose name is not known.*
- *A close friend.*
- *A person who befriends and helps another with an incapacitating disease, typically AIDS.*
- *A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities.*
- *A working companion with whom close cooperation is required.*



Synonyms of "Buddy" as a noun (13 Words)

boon companion A desirable state.

brother (Roman Catholic Church) a title given to a monk and used as form of address.

*None of his **brothers** would betray him.*

chum A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities.
*It s your own fault **chum**.*

companion A member of the lowest grade of certain orders of knighthood.
*His travelling **companion**.*

comrade Used as a term of address for those male persons engaged in the same movement.
***Comrades** in arms.*

confidant

Someone to whom private matters are confided.
*A close **confidante** of the princess.*

crony

A close friend or companion.
He went gambling with his cronies.

familiar

A friend who is frequently in the company of another.
*Her **familiars** were her two little griffons that nested in her skirts.*

friend

A contact on a social networking website.
*We are **friends** of the family.*

intimate

Someone to whom private matters are confided.
*His circle of **intimates**.*

pal

Used as a form of address, especially to indicate anger or aggression.
*We've been **pals** for a long time.*

second self

A 60th part of a minute of arc.

sidekick

A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities.
*Sherlock Holmes bumbling **sidekick** Watson.*



Usage Examples of "Buddy" as a noun

- *They had become the best of buddies.*
- *Gay male counsellors, buddies, and helpline volunteers are available upon request.*
- *I'm working on it, buddy.*



Associations of "Buddy" (30 Words)

- acquaintance** Acquaintances considered collectively.
*His extensive **acquaintance** included Oscar Wilde and Yeats.*
- amicability** A disinclination to quarrel.
- aunt** The sister of one's father or mother or the wife of one's uncle.
*She was brought up by her **aunt** and uncle.*

<u>brother</u>	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>The machine is almost identical to its larger brother.</i>
classmate	An acquaintance that you go to school with.
colleague	A person with whom one works in a profession or business. <i>The surgeon consulted his colleagues.</i>
<u>companion</u>	Be a companion to somebody. <i>My companions in misfortune.</i>
companionship	A feeling of fellowship or friendship. <i>The love and companionship of marriage.</i>
<u>comrade</u>	(among men) a colleague or a fellow member of an organization. <i>An old college comrade.</i>
comradeship	The quality of affording easy familiarity and sociability. <i>His greatest joy came from comradeship with others in the team.</i>
<u>confidant</u>	Someone to whom private matters are confided. <i>A close confidante of the princess.</i>
cousin	A thing related or analogous to another. <i>Our American cousins.</i>
<u>crony</u>	A close friend or companion. <i>He went gambling with his cronies.</i>
<u>fellow</u>	A friend who is frequently in the company of another. <i>He was learning with a rapidity unique among his fellows.</i>
folk	Relating to folk music. <i>Meanwhile folks why not relax and enjoy the atmosphere.</i>
fraternal	(of twins) developed from separate ova and therefore genetically distinct and not necessarily of the same sex or more similar than other siblings. <i>A network of political clubs and fraternal organizations.</i>
friend	Add someone to a list of friends or contacts on a social networking website. <i>The woman got married and you still used to friend with she.</i>
<u>friendship</u>	The state of being friends (or friendly). <i>She formed close friendships with women.</i>
grader	A wheeled machine for levelling the ground, especially in making roads. <i>A first grader.</i>
mate	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>A sock without its mate.</i>

<u>neighbor</u>	Live or be located as a neighbor. <i>Pakistan neighbors India.</i>
neighbour	Any person in need of one's help or kindness (after biblical use). <i>The square neighbours the old quarter of the town.</i>
<u>pal</u>	A friend. <i>We got acquainted but we never really palled around.</i>
<u>partner</u>	Act as a partner. <i>Arrange the children in pairs so that each person has a partner.</i>
<u>sibling</u>	A person's brother or sister.
<u>sister</u>	A female friend or associate, especially a female fellow member of a trade union or other organization. <i>A sister ship.</i>
sisterhood	A religious society of women who live together as sisters (especially an order of nuns). <i>Canadian feminists acknowledge their sisterhood with women around the globe.</i>
<u>twin</u>	A twin bedded room. <i>Twin crystals.</i>
uncle	The brother of your father or mother; the husband of your aunt. <i>He visited his uncle.</i>
workmate	A person with whom one works.
