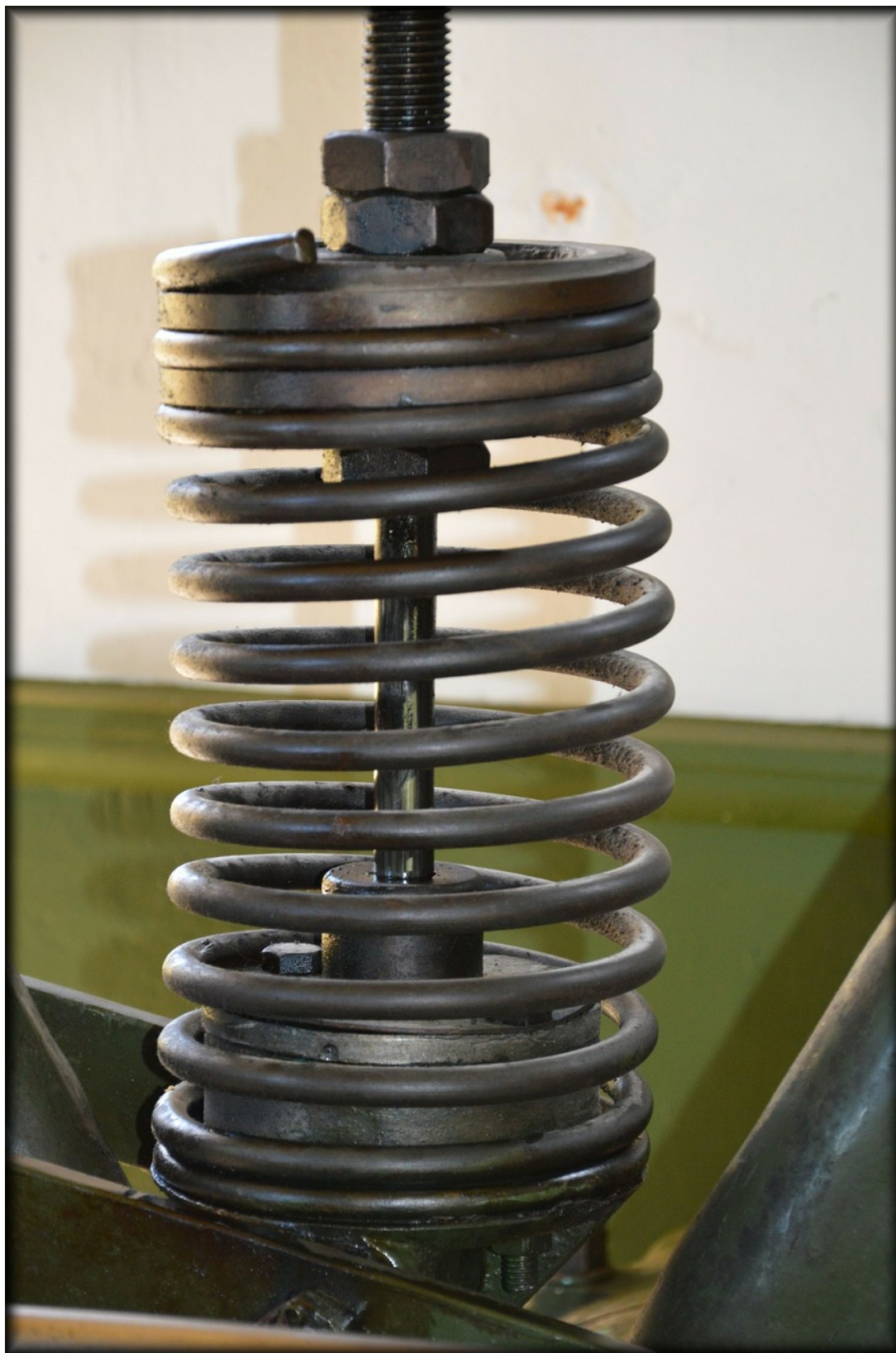
## Buffer as a Noun

<b>polisher</b>	A power tool used to buff surfaces.

- stifle** Impair the respiration of or obstruct the air passage of.  
*She **stifled** a giggle.*
