Definitions of "Bulging" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “bulging” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Curving or bulging outward.*
- *Swelling outwards; protruding.*
- *Full or distended.*
- *Curving outward.*



Synonyms of "Bulging" as an adjective (6 Words)

bellied	Curving outward. <i>Fat bellied men.</i>
bellying	Curving outward.
bulbous	Shaped like a bulb. <i>The bulbous buttercup.</i>
bulgy	Curving outward. <i>Ugly creatures with bulgy eyes.</i>
convex	Curving or bulging outward. <i>A convex lens.</i>
protuberant	Protruding; bulging. <i>His protuberant eyes fluttered open.</i>



Usage Examples of "Bulging" as an adjective

- *He stared with bulging eyes.*
- *My bulging suitcase is sitting by the door.*

all	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>All parties are welcome.</i>
bump	In a race gain a bump against. <i>If no one responds after 24 hours you can bump your thread.</i>
contain	Include or contain have as a component. <i>Since F contains the factor Q it disappears from both sides of the equation.</i>
entire	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged. <i>An entire town devastated by an earthquake.</i>
entirety	The state of being total and complete. <i>She would have to stay in her room for the entirety of the weekend.</i>

excrescence	A distinct outgrowth on a body or plant, resulting from disease or abnormality. <i>The males often have a strange excrescence on the tip of the snout.</i>
fill	Any material that fills a space or container. <i>Elinor s eyes filled with tears.</i>
filled	Of purchase orders that have been filled. <i>Theirs was a house filled with laughter.</i>
forward	Of the transmission gear causing forward movement in a motor vehicle. <i>I look forward to seeing you.</i>
fulfill	Put in effect.
full	The state or time of full moon. <i>Full grown.</i>
gamut	The lowest note in the gamut scale. <i>A face that expressed a gamut of emotions.</i>
jut	Something that bulges out or is protuberant or projects from its surroundings. <i>She put up her head and jutted out her chin with determination.</i>
laden	Burdened psychologically or mentally. <i>Ladened is not current usage.</i>
occupied	Having ones attention or mind or energy engaged. <i>Not all the occupied or tenanted apartments were well kept up.</i>
overcrowd	Cause to crowd together too much. <i>Try not to overcrowd the leaflet with text.</i>
projection	The projection of an image from a film onto a screen. <i>The band use stage projections featuring moon shots.</i>
protrude	Of an animal cause a body part to protrude. <i>Something like a fin protruded from the water.</i>
protrusion	Something that protrudes; a protuberance. <i>A protrusion of rock jutted from the mountainside.</i>
protuberance	A thing that protrudes from something else. <i>The occipital protuberance was well developed.</i>
replete	Filled to satisfaction with food or drink. <i>Sensational popular fiction replete with adultery and sudden death.</i>
restock	Stock again. <i>Work began at once to restock the fishery.</i>
sate	Fill to satisfaction. <i>He was sated with flying.</i>

- satiety** The feeling or state of being sated.
*A molecule that seems to regulate **satiety**.*
- satisfy** Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction.
*The whole team is working flat out to **satisfy** demand.*
- stuffed** Of a toy made of fabric stuffed with a soft filling.
*The pickles are splendid you'll be **stuffed** by the time the meal arrives.*
- suffice** Be sufficient; be adequate, either in quality or quantity.
*A B grade doesn't **suffice** to get me into medical school.*
- sufficiency** Self-sufficiency or independence of character especially of an arrogant or imperious sort.
*Her father questioned the young suitor's **sufficiency**.*
- superabundance** A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
- whole** To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly.
*A **whole** loaf of bread.*
