### Definitions of "Bulging" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “bulging” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Curving or bulging outward.*
- *Swelling outwards; protruding.*
- *Full or distended.*
- *Curving outward.*

<b>bellied</b>	Curving outward. <i>Fat <b>bellied</b> men.</i>
<b>bellying</b>	Curving outward.
<b>bulbous</b>	Shaped like a bulb. <i>The <b>bulbous</b> buttercup.</i>
<b>bulgy</b>	Curving outward. <i>Ugly creatures with <b>bulgy</b> eyes.</i>
<b>convex</b>	Curving or bulging outward. <i>A <b>convex</b> lens.</i>
<b>protuberant</b>	Protruding; bulging. <i>His <b>protuberant</b> eyes fluttered open.</i>

- *My bulging suitcase is sitting by the door.*

<b>bump</b>	In a race gain a bump against. <i>If no one responds after 24 hours you can <b>bump</b> your thread.</i>
<b>contain</b>	Include or contain have as a component. <i>Since <b>F contains</b> the factor <b>Q</b> it disappears from both sides of the equation.</i>
<b>entire</b>	Constituting the undiminished entirety lacking nothing essential especially not damaged. <i>An <b>entire</b> town devastated by an earthquake.</i>

<b>fill</b>	Any material that fills a space or container. <i>Elinor s eyes <b>filled</b> with tears.</i>
<b>filled</b>	Of purchase orders that have been filled. <i>Theirs was a house <b>filled</b> with laughter.</i>
<b>forward</b>	Of the transmission gear causing forward movement in a motor vehicle. <i>I look <b>forward</b> to seeing you.</i>
<b>fulfill</b>	Put in effect.
<b>full</b>	The state or time of full moon. <i><b>Full</b> grown.</i>
<b>gamut</b>	The lowest note in the gamut scale. <i>A face that expressed a <b>gamut</b> of emotions.</i>
<b>jut</b>	Something that bulges out or is protuberant or projects from its surroundings. <i>She put up her head and <b>jutted</b> out her chin with determination.</i>
<b>laden</b>	Burdened psychologically or mentally. <i><b>Ladened</b> is not current usage.</i>
<b>occupied</b>	Having ones attention or mind or energy engaged. <i>Not all the <b>occupied</b> or tenanted apartments were well kept up.</i>
<b>overcrowd</b>	Cause to crowd together too much. <i>Try not to <b>overcrowd</b> the leaflet with text.</i>
<b>projection</b>	The projection of an image from a film onto a screen. <i>The band use stage <b>projections</b> featuring moon shots.</i>
<b>protrude</b>	Of an animal cause a body part to protrude. <i>Something like a fin <b>protruded</b> from the water.</i>
<b>protrusion</b>	Something that protrudes; a protuberance. <i>A <b>protrusion</b> of rock jutted from the mountainside.</i>
<b>protuberance</b>	A thing that protrudes from something else. <i>The occipital <b>protuberance</b> was well developed.</i>
<b>replete</b>	Filled to satisfaction with food or drink. <i>Sensational popular fiction <b>replete</b> with adultery and sudden death.</i>
<b>restock</b>	Stock again. <i>Work began at once to <b>restock</b> the fishery.</i>
<b>sate</b>	Fill to satisfaction. <i>He was <b>sated</b> with flying.</i>



<b>satiety</b>	The feeling or state of being sated. <i>A molecule that seems to regulate <b>satiety</b>.</i>
<b>satisfy</b>	Fill satisfy or meet a want or need or condition or restriction. <i>The whole team is working flat out to <b>satisfy</b> demand.</i>
<b>stuffed</b>	Of a toy made of fabric stuffed with a soft filling. <i>The pickles are splendid you'll be <b>stuffed</b> by the time the meal arrives.</i>
<b>suffice</b>	Be sufficient; be adequate, either in quality or quantity. <i>A B grade doesn't <b>suffice</b> to get me into medical school.</i>
<b>sufficiency</b>	Self sufficiency or independence of character especially of an arrogant or imperious sort. <i>Her father questioned the young suitor's <b>sufficiency</b>.</i>
<b>superabundance</b>	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<b>whole</b>	To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent whole is often used informally for wholly. <i>A <b>whole</b> loaf of bread.</i>
