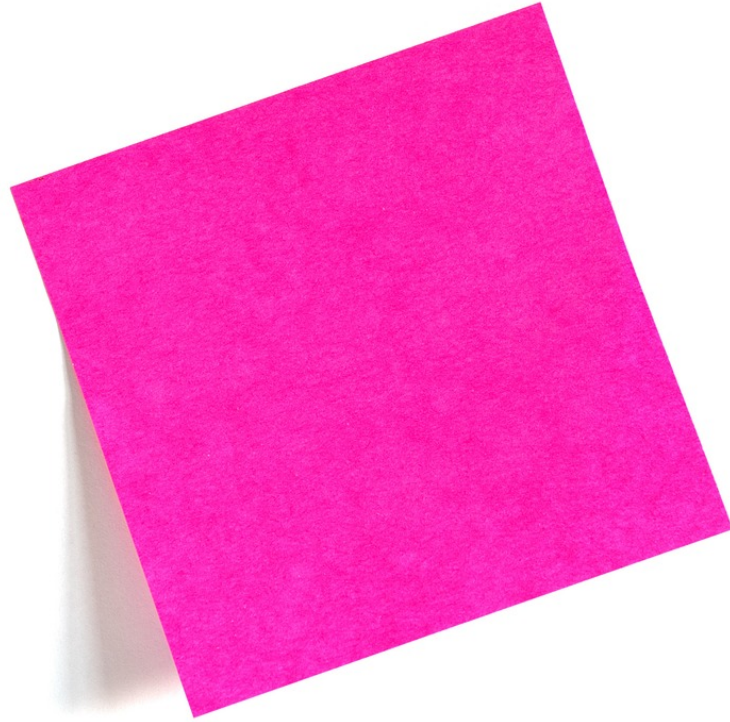

### **Definitions of "Bulletin" as a noun**

- *A brief report (especially an official statement issued for immediate publication or broadcast).*
- *A short official statement or broadcast summary of news.*
- *A regular newsletter or report issued by an organization.*

<b>account</b>	The department of a company that deals with financial accounts. <i>They send me an <b>accounting</b> every month.</i>
	The action of making an announcement.
<b>announcement</b>	<i>The government made an <b>announcement</b> about changes in the drug war.</i>
<b>communication</b>	Something that is communicated by or to or between people or groups. <i>A city providing excellent road and rail <b>communications</b>.</i>
<b>communiqué</b>	An official report (usually sent in haste).
<b>digest</b>	A substance or mixture obtained by digestion. <i>A <b>digest</b> of cloned DNA.</i>
<b>dispatch</b>	The act of sending off something. <i>The situation might change so he should proceed with <b>dispatch</b>.</i>
<b>flash</b>	A newsflash. <i>If I had the chance I d do it in a <b>flash</b>.</i>

<b>gazette</b>	A journal or newspaper. <i>An announcement in Tuesday's London <b>Gazette</b> will make clear that he is being stripped of the honour.</i>
<b>headlines</b>	The heading or caption of a newspaper article.
<b>journal</b>	A record of the daily proceedings in the Houses of Parliament. <i>Medical <b>journals</b>.</i>
<b>magazine</b>	A business firm that publishes magazines. <i>You can program only the playback sequence of the discs in the <b>magazine</b> not individual tracks.</i>
<b>message</b>	Things bought on an errand; shopping. <i>Select an option to delete your mail <b>messages</b>.</i>
<b>news</b>	The quality of being sufficiently interesting to be reported in news bulletins. <i>The <b>news</b> of my death was greatly exaggerated.</i>
<b>news report</b>	The quality of being sufficiently interesting to be reported in news bulletins.
<b>newscast</b>	A radio or television broadcast of news reports.
<b>newsflash</b>	A short news announcement concerning some on-going news story.
<b>newsletter</b>	Report or open letter giving informal or confidential news of interest to a special group.
<b>newspaper</b>	The physical object that is the product of a newspaper publisher. <i>He read his <b>newspaper</b> at breakfast.</i>
<b>notification</b>	The action of notifying someone or something. <i>We have yet to receive formal <b>notification</b> of the announcement.</i>
<b>periodical</b>	A publication that appears at fixed intervals.
<b>piece</b>	A portable gun. <i>He needed a <b>piece</b> of granite.</i>
<b>press release</b>	A machine used for printing.
<b>proceedings</b>	A published report of a set of meetings or a conference. <i>Criminal <b>proceedings</b> were brought against him.</i>
<b>report</b>	An employee who reports to another employee. <i><b>Reports</b> were circulating that the chairman was about to resign.</i>
<b>review</b>	A formal or official examination. <i>His case comes up for <b>review</b> in January.</i>
<b>statement</b>	A nonverbal message. <i>She made a <b>statement</b> to the police.</i>

**story** A plot or storyline.  
*The **story** of exposure to lead.*



## Associations of "Bulletin" (30 Words)

**acquaint** Make someone aware of or familiar with.  
*Permit me to **acquaint** you with my son.*

**broadcast** Broadcast over the airwaves as in radio or television.  
*We don't want to **broadcast** our unhappiness to the world.*

**broadcasting** The transmission of programmes or information by radio or television.  
*The state monopoly on **broadcasting**.*

**commentary** A set of explanatory or critical notes on a text.  
*A live **commentary** on radio.*

<b>communication</b>	Social contact. <i>A telephone <b>communication</b>.</i>
<b>consignee</b>	The person to whom merchandise is delivered over.
<b>convey</b>	Make (an idea, impression, or feeling) known or understandable. <i>No application for registration is required when the property is <b>conveyed</b> following a court order.</i>
<b>email</b>	Send an email to someone. <i>Reading <b>email</b> has become the first task of the morning.</i>
<b>informing</b>	To furnish incriminating evidence to an officer of the law (usually in return for favors).
<b>journalism</b>	The product of the activity of journalism. <i>A collection of <b>journalism</b>.</i>
<b>letter</b>	Set down or print with letters. <i>Your personality matters far more than <b>letters</b> after your name.</i>
<b>letterhead</b>	A sheet of stationery with name and address of the organization printed at the top. <i>Write to the company's registered office which you can normally get from their <b>letterhead</b>.</i>
<b>mail</b>	Send someone email. <i>I'll <b>mail</b> you the check tomorrow.</i>
<b>mailbox</b>	A public box with a slot into which mail is placed for collection by the post office; a postbox.
<b>mailing</b>	The action or process of sending something by mail. <i>The postmark indicates the time of <b>mailing</b>.</i>
<b>message</b>	Send as a message. <i>She <b>messaged</b> the committee.</i>
<b>notify</b>	Give notice of or report (something) formally or officially. <i>You will be notified of our decision as soon as possible.</i>
<b>philatelist</b>	A collector and student of postage stamps.
<b>philately</b>	The collection and study of postage stamps.
<b>post</b>	Publicize with or as if with a poster. <i><b>Post</b> a warning.</i>
<b>receiver</b>	A piece of radio or television apparatus that detects broadcast signals and converts them into visible or audible form. <i>He picked up the <b>receiver</b>.</i>
<b>recipient</b>	A person or thing that receives or is awarded something. <i>A <b>recipient</b> country.</i>

<b>report</b>	An employee who reports to another employee. <i>He heard <b>reports</b> that they were causing trouble.</i>
<b>send</b>	Send a message or letter. <i><b>Send</b> your document as a PDF attachment.</i>
<b>sender</b>	Set used to broadcast radio or tv signals. <i><b>Senders</b> of unwanted emails.</i>
<b>spam</b>	A canned meat made largely from pork. <i>An autogenerated <b>spam</b> website.</i>
<b>stamp</b>	Affix a stamp to. <i>His style <b>stamps</b> him as a player to watch.</i>
<b>telegraph</b>	A device for transmitting messages by telegraph. <i>She would rush off to <b>telegraph</b> news to her magazine.</i>
<b>tidings</b>	News; information. <i>The bearer of glad <b>tidings</b>.</i>
<b>transmit</b>	Transmit or serve as the medium for transmission. <i>Knowledge is <b>transmitted</b> from teacher to pupil.</i>
