Definitions of "Bullets" as a noun

bullet train A projectile that is fired from a gun.

fastball A pitch thrown with maximum velocity.
*He swung late on the **fastball**.*

heater A pitch thrown with maximum velocity.
*A gas water **heater**.*

hummer (baseball) a pitch thrown with maximum velocity.

slug (boxing) a blow with the fist.
*He took a **slug** of hard liquor.*

smoke A hot vapor containing fine particles of carbon being produced by combustion.
*He went outside for a **smoke**.*



Associations of "Bullets" (30 Words)

<u>ammunition</u>	A supply or quantity of bullets and shells. <i>Guns ammunition and explosives.</i>
<u>arrow</u>	A projectile with a straight thin shaft and an arrowhead on one end and stabilizing vanes on the other intended to be shot from a bow. <i>His ability to launch an arrow accurately.</i>
ballistic	Relating to projectiles or their flight.
breech	Dress a boy in breeches after he had been in petticoats since birth. <i>In those days it wasn't customary to breech a boy until he was about four.</i>
caliber	A degree or grade of excellence or worth. <i>An executive of low caliber.</i>
cannon	Make a cannon. <i>They would cross at the Town ford under cover of the defending cannon.</i>

cartridge	Ammunition consisting of a cylindrical casing containing an explosive charge and a bullet; fired from a rifle or handgun. <i>He loaded a cartridge of fresh tape into the tape deck.</i>
firearm	A rifle, pistol, or other portable gun. <i>Jones pleaded guilty to possessing a firearm with criminal intent.</i>
firing	The act of firing weapons or artillery at an enemy. <i>The recent firing of the head of the department.</i>
foam	A lightweight form of rubber or plastic made by solidifying liquid foam. <i>Shaving foam.</i>
fusillade	Attack with fusillade. <i>Our fusillade from the left flank caught them by surprise.</i>
grenade	A glass receptacle containing chemicals which are released when the receptacle is thrown and broken, used for testing drains and extinguishing fires.
gun	Shoot with a gun. <i>The boom of the one o clock gun echoed across the river.</i>
gunshot	The act of shooting a gun. <i>We bore down and came nearly within gunshot.</i>
holster	Put a gun into its holster. <i>He holstered the Browning before walking back.</i>
misfire	(especially of a plan) fail to produce the intended result. <i>As these nerves misfire and die the muscles begin to shrink.</i>
missile	A rocket carrying a warhead of conventional or nuclear explosives; may be ballistic or directed by remote control. <i>The plane disintegrated after being hit by a missile launched from the ground.</i>
musket	An infantryman's light gun with a long barrel, typically smooth-bored and fired from the shoulder. <i>A volley of musket fire.</i>
muzzle	Put a muzzle on an animal. <i>Muzzle the dog to prevent it from biting strangers.</i>
pistol	Shoot someone with a pistol. <i>When we first met he was a pistol full of ideals and a natural leader.</i>
projectile	Denoting or relating to a projectile. <i>A projectile force.</i>
revolver	A door consisting of four orthogonal partitions that rotate about a central pivot; a door designed to equalize the air pressure in tall buildings.

rifle	Troops armed with rifles. <i>He lifted the rifle to his shoulder and fired.</i>
salvo	A simultaneous discharge of artillery or other guns in a battle. <i>The pardons provoked a salvo of accusations.</i>
<u>shoot</u>	The act of shooting at targets. <i>Claudia felt a pain shoot through her chest.</i>
shooting	The sport or pastime of shooting with a gun. <i>The events that led up to the shooting of the man.</i>
shot	A ball of stone or metal used as a missile shot from a large gun or cannon. <i>I caught him with a solid shot to the chin.</i>
shotgun	Shoot at or kill with a shotgun. <i>Many companies use the shotgun approach aiming advertising at the widest possible audience.</i>
<u>trajectory</u>	The path followed by an object moving through space. <i>The missile s trajectory was preset.</i>
whizz	Move or go quickly. <i>A computer whizz.</i>
