

flotsam	The floating wreckage of a ship. The room was cleared of boxes and other <b>flotsam</b> .
<u>island</u>	A thing regarded as resembling an island especially in being isolated detached or surrounded in some way. <i>The <b>island</b> of Crete.</i>
lighthouse	A tower with a light that gives warning of shoals to passing ships.
maritime	Living or found in or near the sea. <i>Maritime</i> law.
