<b>duty</b>	Performance of prescribed church services by a priest or minister. <i>She was determined to do her <b>duty</b> as a citizen.</i>
<b>effect</b>	Having legal validity. <i>Gentle music can have a soothing <b>effect</b>.</i>
<b>encumbrance</b>	An impediment or burden. <i>The horse raised its hind leg as if to rid itself of an <b>encumbrance</b>.</i>
<b>endeavour</b>	An enterprise or undertaking. <i>Enthusiasm is a vital ingredient in all human <b>endeavour</b>.</i>
<b>engagement</b>	An arrangement to do something or go somewhere at a fixed time. <i>A dinner <b>engagement</b>.</i>
<b>enterprise</b>	Entrepreneurial economic activity. <i>An economic environment which encourages <b>enterprise</b>.</i>

<b>errand</b>	The purpose or object of an errand. <i>She knew that if she stated her <b>errand</b> she would not be able to see him.</i>
<b>essence</b>	The intrinsic nature or indispensable quality of something, especially something abstract, which determines its character. <i>Conflict is the <b>essence</b> of drama.</i>
<u><a href="#">exercise</a></u>	The act of using. <i>An <b>exercise</b> in cheap talk.</i>
<b>freight</b>	A freight train. <i>We pay the <b>freight</b>.</i>
<b>function</b>	Mathematics a mathematical relation such that each element of a given set the domain of the function is associated with an element of another set the range of the function. <i>It was a black tie <b>function</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">gist</a></u>	The substance or general meaning of a speech or text. <i>Damage is the <b>gist</b> of the action and without it the plaintiff must fail.</i>
<b>implication</b>	A meaning that is not expressly stated but can be inferred. <i>The expectation was spread both by word and by <b>implication</b>.</i>
<u><a href="#">import</a></u>	An imported person brought from a foreign country. <i>The <b>import</b> of his announcement was ambiguous.</i>
<b>incumbrance</b>	Any obstruction that impedes or is burdensome.
<u><a href="#">intention</a></u>	Conceptions formed by directing the mind towards an object. <i><b>Intention</b> is just one of the factors that will be considered.</i>
<b>job</b>	A workplace as in the expression on the job. <i>She wants to be left alone to get on with the <b>job</b>.</i>
<b>labour</b>	Workers considered as a social class or political force. <i>The <b>labour</b> movement.</i>
<u><a href="#">liability</a></u>	The state of being legally obliged and responsible. <i>Once you contact the card protection scheme your <b>liability</b> for any loss ends.</i>
<b>load</b>	The power output of a generator or power plant. <i>He got a <b>load</b> on and started a brawl.</i>
<b>loading</b>	Weight to be borne or conveyed. <i>The <b>loading</b> took 2 hours.</i>
<b>meaning</b>	Important or worthwhile quality; purpose. <i>This can lead to new <b>meaning</b> in the life of older people.</i>

<b><u>mission</u></b>	A building or group of buildings used by a Christian mission. <i>NASA has approved a <b>mission</b> to investigate the atmosphere of Mars.</i>
<b><u>obligation</u></b>	A binding agreement committing a person to a payment or other action. <i>I have an <b>obligation</b> to look after her.</i>
<b><u>occupation</u></b>	A way of spending time. <i>A game of cards is a pretty harmless <b>occupation</b>.</i>
<b>onus</b>	An onerous or difficult concern. <i>The <b>onus</b> is on you to show that you have suffered loss.</i>
<b>piece of business</b>	An artistic or literary composition.

<b>signification</b>	The message that is intended or expressed or signified. <i>Film comes closer than other forms of <b>signification</b> to resemblance of reality.</i>
<b>spirit</b>	The attitude or intentions with which someone undertakes or regards something. <i>He was a leading <b>spirit</b> in the conference.</i>
<b>strain</b>	An intense or violent exertion. <i>She's under considerable <b>strain</b>.</i>

<b>substance</b>	Material of a particular kind or constitution. <i>He was suspended for using a banned <b>substance</b>.</i>

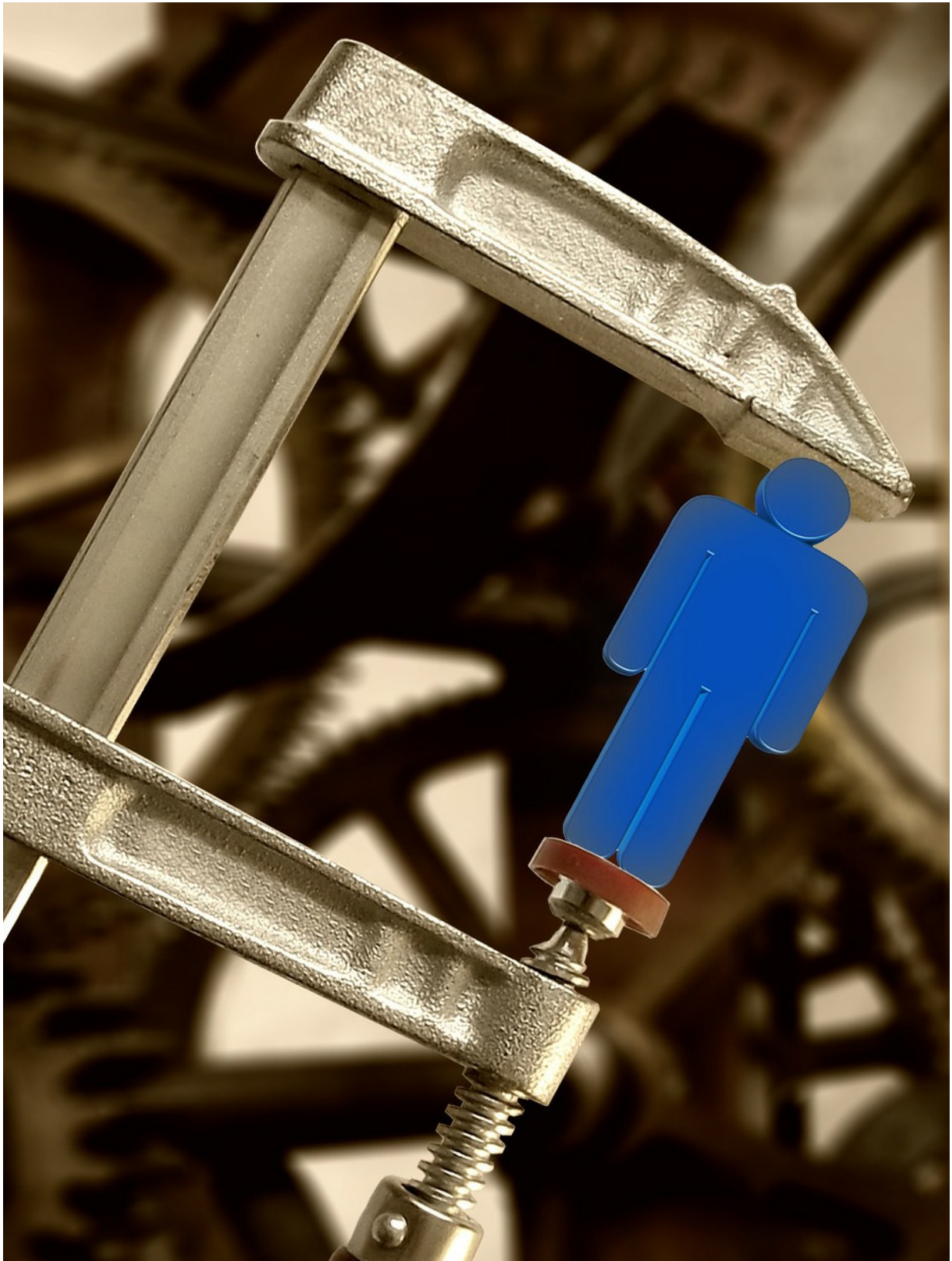
# Burden as a Verb

- *Cause (someone) worry, hardship, or distress.*





## Synonyms of "Burden" as a verb (10 Words)

<b>burthen</b>	Weight down with a load.
<b>cause suffering to</b>	Give rise to; cause to happen or occur, not always intentionally.
<b>cause trouble to</b>	Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.
<b><u>charge</u></b>	Cause formation of a net electrical charge in or on. <i>He <b>charged</b> his weapon at me.</i>
<b>load</b>	Of a ship or vehicle take on a load. <i>The King and Queen <b>loaded</b> Columbus with wealth and honours.</i>
<b><u>oppress</u></b>	Come down on or keep down by unjust use of one's authority. <i>A system which <b>oppressed</b> working people.</i>
<b>saddle</b>	Put a saddle on a horse. <i>He <b>saddled</b> me with that heavy responsibility.</i>

<b>grueling</b>	Characterized by effort to the point of exhaustion; especially physical effort. <i>A <b>grueling</b> campaign.</i>
<b>heavy</b>	Large and powerful especially designed for heavy loads or rough work. <i><b>Heavy</b> traffic.</i>
<b>inequitable</b>	Unfair; unjust. <i><b>Inequitable</b> taxation.</i>
<b>laborious</b>	Characterized by effort to the point of exhaustion; especially physical effort. <i>The work is very slow and <b>laborious</b>.</i>
<b>lade</b>	Ship (goods) as cargo. <i>Vessels <b>lade</b> there.</i>
<b>laden</b>	Fill or place a load on. <i>Table <b>laden</b> with food.</i>
<b>lading</b>	A cargo.
<b>load</b>	Fill or place a load on. <i>The increased <b>load</b> on the heart caused by a raised arterial pressure.</i>
<b>loaded</b>	(of statements or questions) charged with associative significance and often meant to mislead or influence. <i>It s Friday night and we want to get <b>loaded</b>.</i>
<b>luggage</b>	Suitcases or other bags in which to pack personal belongings for travelling. <i>Upon landing we waited and waited for our <b>luggage</b>.</i>
<b>onerous</b>	Not easily borne; wearing. <i>My duties weren t <b>onerous</b> I only had to greet the guests.</i>
<b>onus</b>	An onerous or difficult concern. <i>The <b>onus</b> is on you to show that you have suffered loss.</i>
<b>oppress</b>	Cause distress or anxiety to. <i>The government <b>oppresses</b> political activists.</i>

<b>packing</b>	A charge made when delivering goods to cover the cost of packing them. <i>Polystyrene <b>packing</b>.</i>
<b>shipment</b>	The act of sending off something. <i>Logs waiting for <b>shipment</b>.</i>
<b>taxing</b>	Not easily borne; wearing. <i>A <b>taxing</b> schedule.</i>
<b>tricky</b>	Not to be trusted. <i><b>Tricky</b> Dick.</i>
<b>troublesome</b>	Difficult to deal with. <i>A <b>troublesome</b> infection.</i>
<b>uncomfortable</b>	Conducive to or feeling mental discomfort. <i>An <b>uncomfortable</b> way of surprising me just when I felt surest.</i>
<b>unload</b>	Leave or unload. <i>She hadn t finished <b>unloading</b> the car.</i>
<b>wearing</b>	The mechanical process of wearing or grinding something down as by particles washing over it. <i>The visit was especially <b>wearing</b>.</i>
<b>weight</b>	Assign a handicap weight to a horse. <i>The progression implied an increasing <b>weightiness</b> of the items listed.</i>
