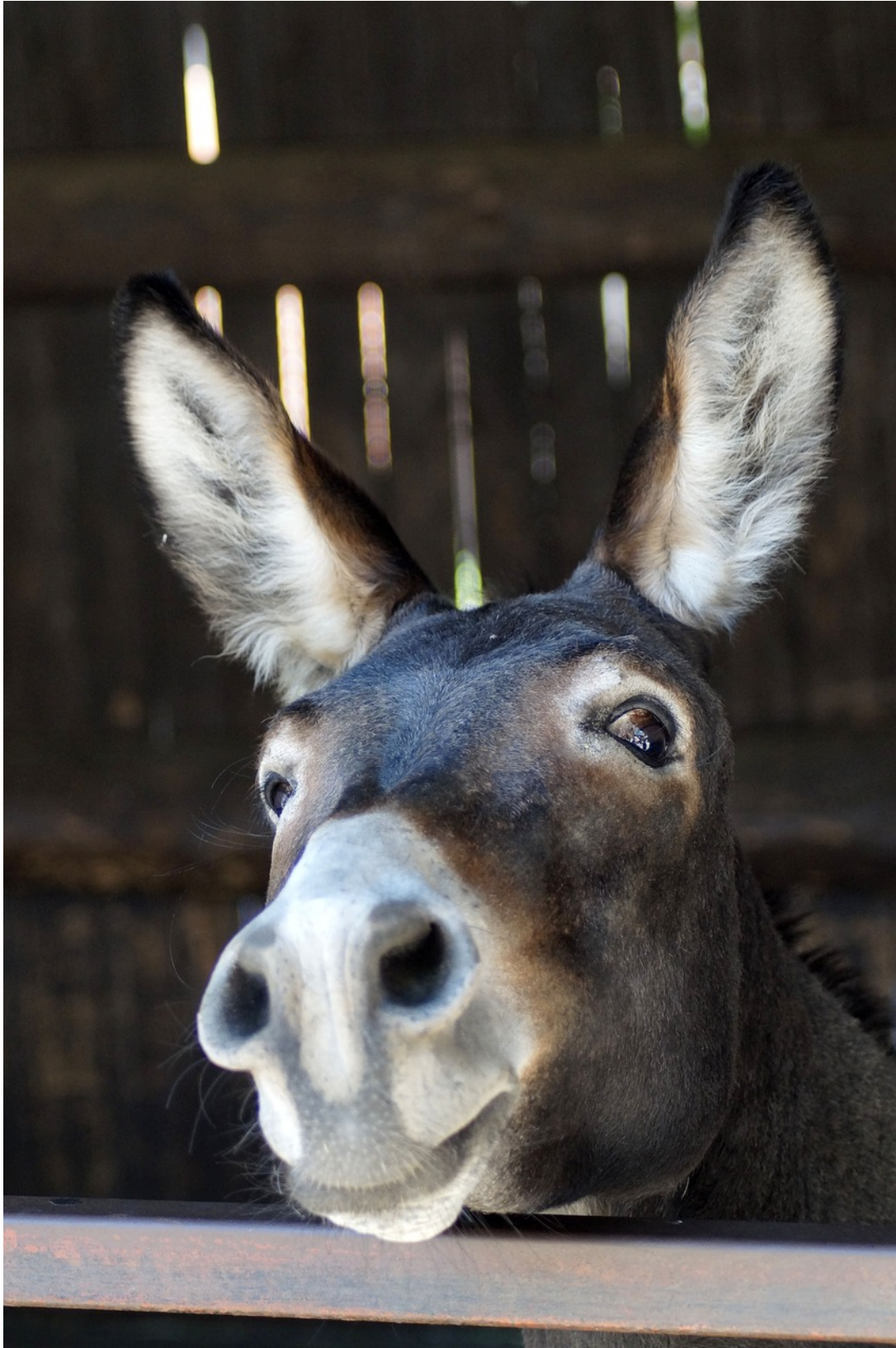

## Synonyms of "Burdened" as an adjective (2 Words)

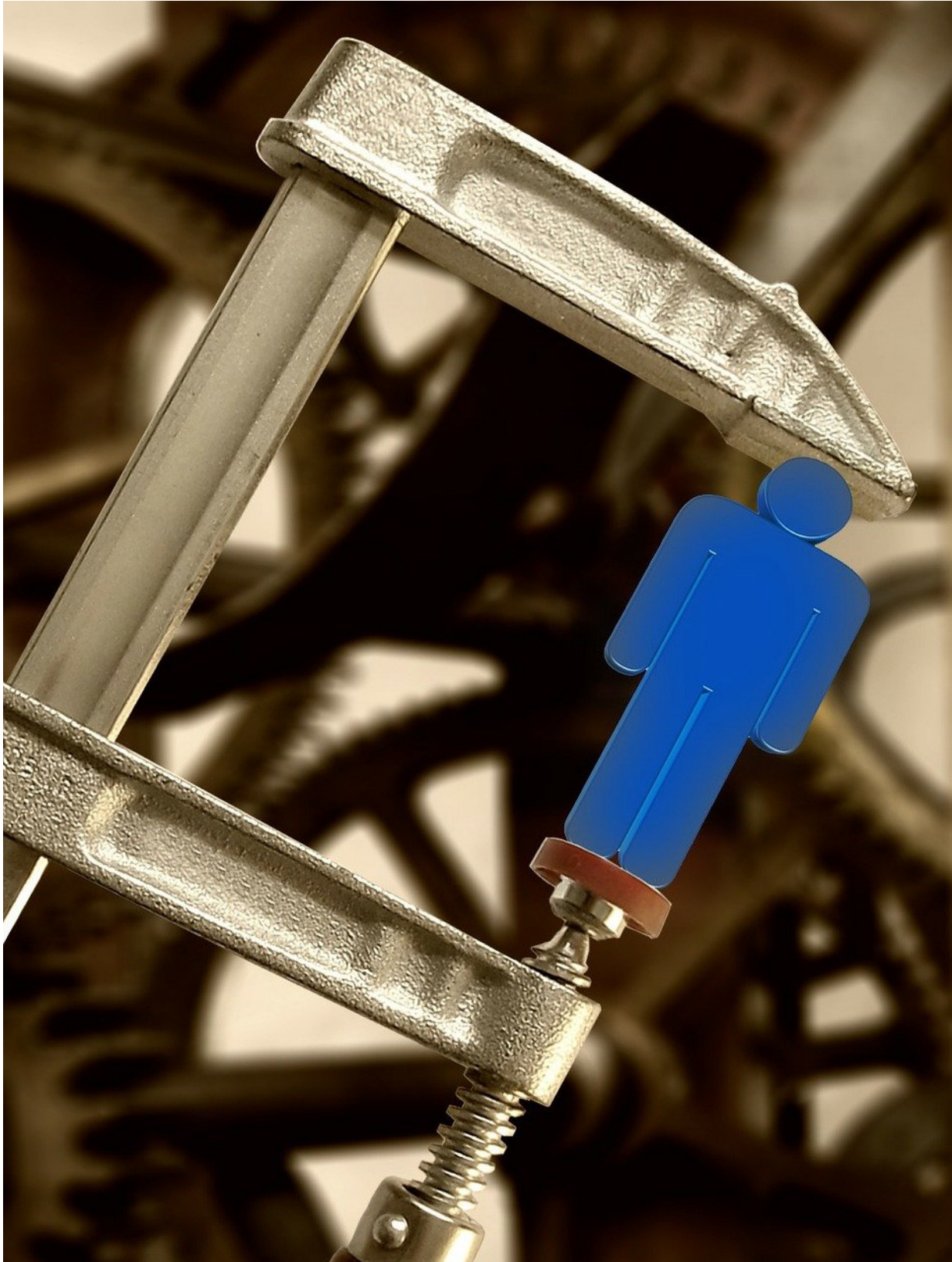
**heavy-laden** Burdened by cares-Matt.11:28.

## Usage Examples of "Burdened" as an adjective

- *She always felt burdened by the load of paper work.*
- *Tree limbs burdened with ice.*



## Associations of "Burdened" (30 Words)

<b>burdensome</b>	Difficult to carry out or fulfil; taxing. <i>Bureaucratically <b>burdensome</b> assessment procedures.</i>
<b>cargo</b>	Goods carried on a ship, aircraft, or motor vehicle. <i>A <b>cargo</b> of oil.</i>
<b>demanding</b>	Requiring more than usually expected or thought due; especially great patience and effort and skill. <i>A baby can be so <b>demanding</b>.</i>
<b>difficult</b>	Characterized by or causing hardships or problems. <i>A <b>difficult</b> economic climate.</i>
<b>encumber</b>	Hold back. <i>They had arrived <b>encumbered</b> with families.</i>
<b>encumbrance</b>	An onerous or difficult concern. <i>The horse raised its hind leg as if to rid itself of an <b>encumbrance</b>.</i>
<b>exacting</b>	Having complicated nutritional requirements; especially growing only in special artificial cultures. <i>Certain highly specialized xerophytes are extremely <b>exacting</b> in their requirements.</i>
<b>expeditionary</b>	(used of military forces) designed for military operations abroad. <i>An <b>expeditionary</b> force.</i>
<b>grueling</b>	Characterized by effort to the point of exhaustion; especially physical effort. <i>A <b>grueling</b> campaign.</i>
<b>heavy</b>	A thing such as a vehicle that is large or heavy of its kind. <i>Iago is the <b>heavy</b> role in Othello.</i>
<b>inequitable</b>	Not equitable or fair. <i><b>Inequitable</b> taxation.</i>
<b>laborious</b>	(of speech or writing style) showing obvious signs of effort and lacking in fluency. <i>She wrote in <b>laborious</b> dictionary assisted English.</i>
<b>lade</b>	Ship (goods) as cargo. <i>Vessels <b>lade</b> there.</i>
<b>laden</b>	Remove with or as if with a ladle. <i><b>Laden</b> with grief.</i>
<b>lading</b>	A cargo.

<b>load</b>	Of a ship or vehicle take on a load. <i>The King and Queen <b>loaded</b> Columbus with wealth and honours.</i>
<b>loaded</b>	Having an abundant supply of money or possessions of value. <i>A tray <b>loaded</b> with dishes.</i>
<b>luggage</b>	Suitcases or other bags in which to pack personal belongings for travelling. <i>Upon landing we waited and waited for our <b>luggage</b>.</i>
<b>onerous</b>	Not easily borne; wearing. <i>My duties weren't <b>onerous</b> I only had to greet the guests.</i>
<b>onus</b>	Something that is one's duty or responsibility. <i>The <b>onus</b> is on you to show that you have suffered loss.</i>
<b>oppress</b>	Come down on or keep down by unjust use of one's authority. <i>A system which <b>oppressed</b> working people.</i>
<b>packing</b>	The action or process of packing something. <i>2 plus postage and <b>packing</b>.</i>
<b>shipment</b>	The action of shipping goods. <i>The <b>shipment</b> arrived at Liverpool.</i>
<b>taxing</b>	Physically or mentally demanding. <i>They find the work too <b>taxing</b>.</i>
<b>tricky</b>	Marked by skill in deception. <i>Applying eyeliner can be a <b>tricky</b> business.</i>
<b>troublesome</b>	Difficult to deal with. <i>A <b>troublesome</b> situation.</i>
<b>uncomfortable</b>	Conducive to or feeling mental discomfort. <i>He began to feel <b>uncomfortable</b> at the man's hard stare.</i>
<b>unload</b>	Leave or unload. <i><b>Unload</b> the cargo.</i>
<b>wearing</b>	Geology the mechanical process of wearing or grinding something down as by particles washing over it. <i>A plan of action will make the whole event a less <b>wearing</b> experience.</i>
<b>weight</b>	Weight down with a load. <i>He placed two <b>weights</b> in the scale pan.</i>
