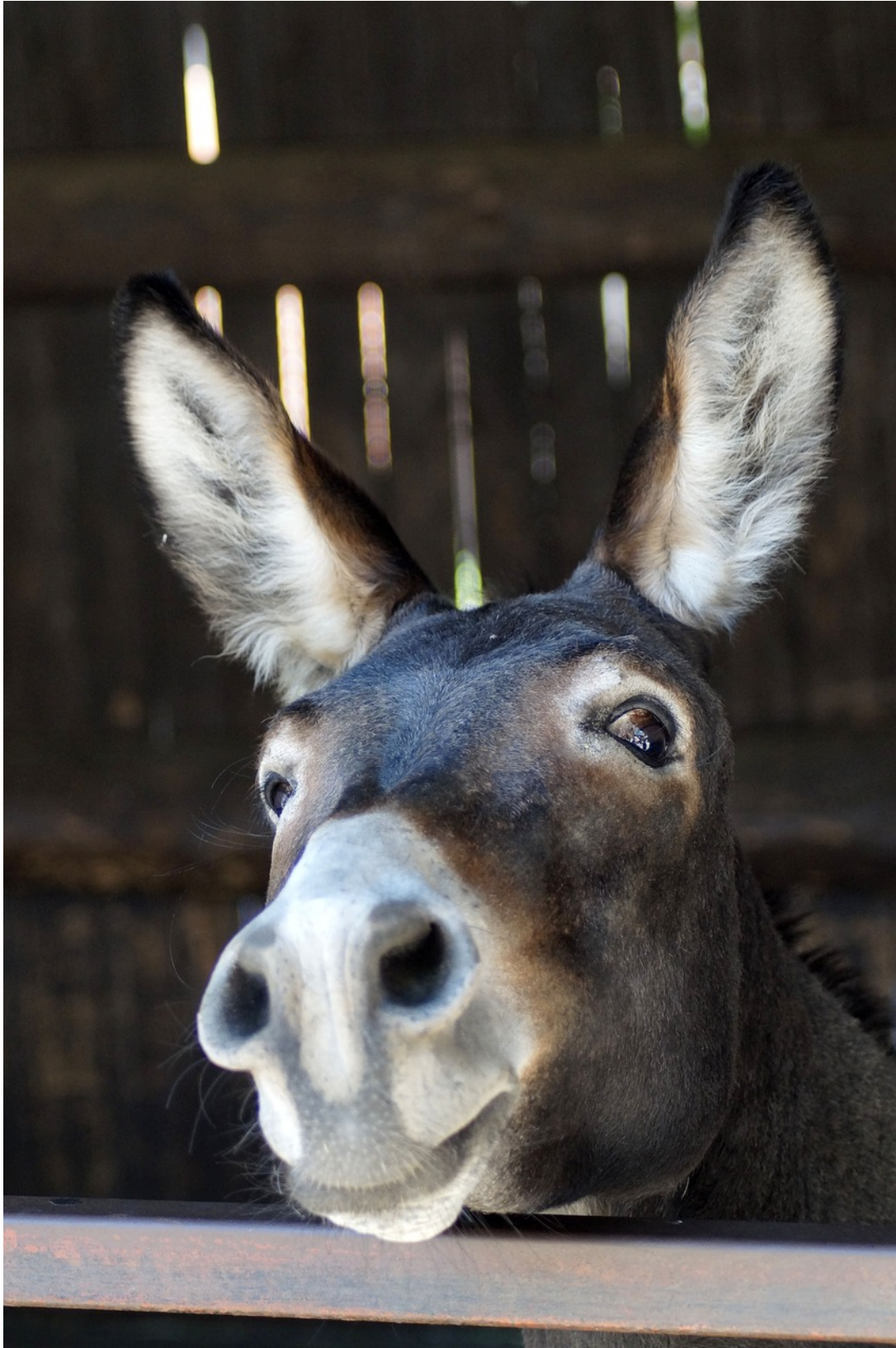

Synonyms of "Burdened" as an adjective (2 Words)

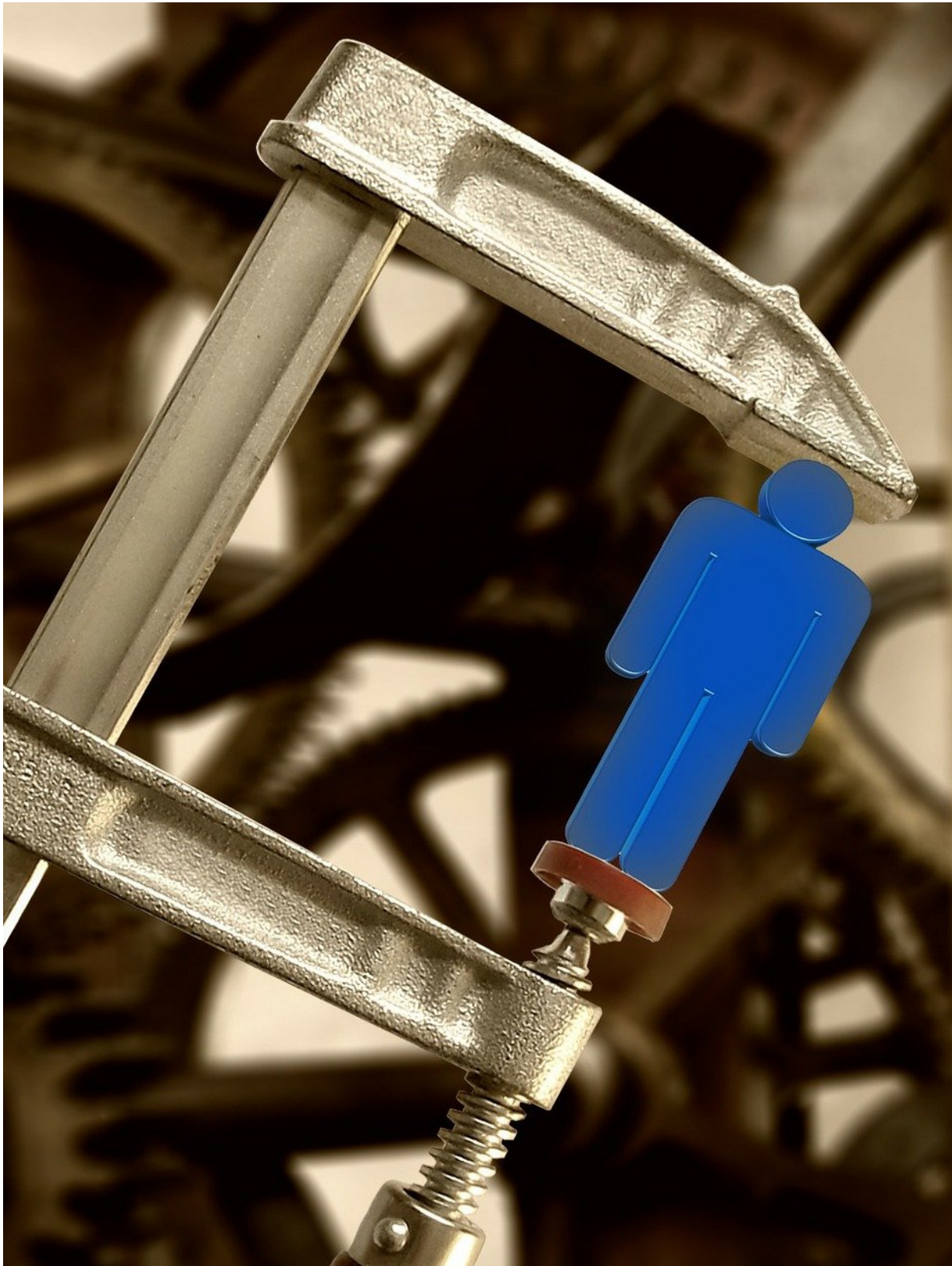
heavy-laden Burdened by cares-Matt.11:28.

Usage Examples of "Burdened" as an adjective

- *She always felt burdened by the load of paper work.*
- *Tree limbs burdened with ice.*



Associations of "Burdened" (30 Words)

burdensome	Difficult to carry out or fulfil; taxing. <i>Bureaucratically burdensome assessment procedures.</i>
cargo	Goods carried on a ship, aircraft, or motor vehicle. <i>A cargo of oil.</i>
demanding	Requiring more than usually expected or thought due; especially great patience and effort and skill. <i>A baby can be so demanding.</i>
difficult	Characterized by or causing hardships or problems. <i>A difficult economic climate.</i>
encumber	Hold back. <i>They had arrived encumbered with families.</i>
encumbrance	An onerous or difficult concern. <i>The horse raised its hind leg as if to rid itself of an encumbrance.</i>
exacting	Having complicated nutritional requirements; especially growing only in special artificial cultures. <i>Certain highly specialized xerophytes are extremely exacting in their requirements.</i>
expeditionary	(used of military forces) designed for military operations abroad. <i>An expeditionary force.</i>
grueling	Characterized by effort to the point of exhaustion; especially physical effort. <i>A grueling campaign.</i>
heavy	A thing such as a vehicle that is large or heavy of its kind. <i>Iago is the heavy role in Othello.</i>
inequitable	Not equitable or fair. <i>Inequitable taxation.</i>
laborious	(of speech or writing style) showing obvious signs of effort and lacking in fluency. <i>She wrote in laborious dictionary assisted English.</i>
lade	Ship (goods) as cargo. <i>Vessels lade there.</i>
laden	Remove with or as if with a ladle. <i>Laden with grief.</i>
lading	A cargo.

load	Of a ship or vehicle take on a load. <i>The King and Queen loaded Columbus with wealth and honours.</i>
loaded	Having an abundant supply of money or possessions of value. <i>A tray loaded with dishes.</i>
luggage	Suitcases or other bags in which to pack personal belongings for travelling. <i>Upon landing we waited and waited for our luggage.</i>
onerous	Not easily borne; wearing. <i>My duties weren't onerous I only had to greet the guests.</i>
onus	Something that is one's duty or responsibility. <i>The onus is on you to show that you have suffered loss.</i>
oppress	Come down on or keep down by unjust use of one's authority. <i>A system which oppressed working people.</i>
packing	The action or process of packing something. <i>2 plus postage and packing.</i>
shipment	The action of shipping goods. <i>The shipment arrived at Liverpool.</i>
taxing	Physically or mentally demanding. <i>They find the work too taxing.</i>
tricky	Marked by skill in deception. <i>Applying eyeliner can be a tricky business.</i>
troublesome	Difficult to deal with. <i>A troublesome situation.</i>
uncomfortable	Conducive to or feeling mental discomfort. <i>He began to feel uncomfortable at the man's hard stare.</i>
unload	Leave or unload. <i>Unload the cargo.</i>
wearing	Geology the mechanical process of wearing or grinding something down as by particles washing over it. <i>A plan of action will make the whole event a less wearing experience.</i>
weight	Weight down with a load. <i>He placed two weights in the scale pan.</i>
