## Synonyms of "Burgeon" as a verb (19 Words)

- become more numerous** Enter or assume a certain state or condition.
- boom** Be the case that thunder is being heard.  
*Stop right there **boomed** the Headmaster.*
- escalate** Increase in extent or intensity.  
*The Allies **escalated** the bombing.*
- expand** Expand the influence of.  
*His business **expanded** rapidly.*
- explode** Undergo a violent expansion in which much energy is released as a shock wave.  
*He **exploded** with rage.*
- grow rapidly** Come to have or undergo a change of (physical features and attributes).
- increase exponentially** Become bigger or greater in amount.
- increase rapidly** Become bigger or greater in amount.
- multiply** Propagate (plants).  
***Multiply** 10 by 15.*

<b>mushroom</b>	Pick or gather mushrooms. <i>These are high performance bullets which <b>mushroom</b> upon impact.</i>
<b>proliferate</b>	Cause (cells, tissue, structures, etc.) to reproduce rapidly. <i>We must not <b>proliferate</b> nuclear arms.</i>
<b>put on a spurt</b>	Formulate in a particular style or language. Propel with a rocket.
<b><u>rocket</u></b>	<i>She showed the kind of form that <b>rocketed</b> her to the semi finals last year.</i>
<b>run riot</b>	Direct or control; projects, businesses, etc.
<b>shoot up</b>	Run or move very quickly or hastily.
<b>skyrocket</b>	Shoot up abruptly, like a rocket. <i>Prices <b>skyrocketed</b>.</i>
<b>snowball</b>	Throw snowballs at. <i>I made sure the other kids stopped <b>snowballing</b> Celia.</i>
<b>spring up</b>	Develop into a distinctive entity.
<b>swell</b>	Come up (as of feelings and thoughts, or other ephemeral things). <i>The bellies of the starving children are <b>swelling</b>.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Burgeon" as a verb

- *The city's suburbs have burgeoned, sprawling out from the centre.*
- *The burgeoning population.*

<b>abound</b>	Be abundant or plentiful; exist in large quantities. <i>This area <b>abounds</b> with caravan sites.</i>
<b>affluence</b>	Abundant wealth. <i>A sign of our growing <b>affluence</b>.</i>
<b>affluent</b>	An affluent person a person who is financially well off. <i>An <b>affluent</b> banker.</i>
<b>bloom</b>	The state or period of greatest beauty, freshness, or vigour. <i>The <b>bloom</b> on a plum.</i>
<b>blossom</b>	The period of greatest prosperity or productivity. <i>Fruit trees in <b>blossom</b>.</i>
<b>bonanza</b>	An especially rich vein of precious ore. <i>The festive feature film <b>bonanza</b>.</i>

<b>bonus</b>	An extra and unexpected advantage. <i>Good weather is an added <b>bonus</b> but the real appeal is the landscape.</i>
<b>boom</b>	Hit hard. <i>The deep <b>boom</b> of the bass drum.</i>
<b>booming</b>	Used of the voice. <i>The <b>booming</b> economy of the 1920s.</i>
<b>daisy</b>	Used in names of other plants of the daisy family e.g. Michaelmas daisy Shasta daisy.
<b>ding</b>	Go ding dong like a bell. <i>Cash registers were <b>dinging</b> softly.</i>
<b>efflorescence</b>	The formation of a powdery deposit on the surface of brickwork, rock, or other material as a result of loss of moisture on exposure to air. <i>Cover the brickwork to minimize <b>efflorescence</b>.</i>
<b>fanfare</b>	Media attention or elaborate ceremony. <i>A specially composed <b>fanfare</b> announced the arrival of the Duchess.</i>
<b>flourish</b>	Be working or at the height of one's career during a specified period. <i>Wild plants <b>flourish</b> on the banks of the lake.</i>
<b>flourishing</b>	Developing rapidly and successfully; thriving. <i><b>Flourishing</b> businesses.</i>
<b>grow</b>	Cultivate by growing often involving improvements by means of agricultural techniques. <i>Morels <b>grow</b> in a variety of places.</i>
<b>growth</b>	A process of becoming larger or longer or more numerous or more important. <i>Some additives slow down the <b>growth</b> of microorganisms.</i>
<b>inflation</b>	The act of filling something with air. <i>The <b>inflation</b> of a balloon.</i>
<b>metropolis</b>	The capital or chief city of a country or region. <i>By the late eighteenth century Edo had grown to a <b>metropolis</b> with a population of nearly one million.</i>
<b>opulence</b>	Great wealth or luxuriousness. <i>Rooms of spectacular <b>opulence</b>.</i>
<b>palmy</b>	Covered with palms. <i>The <b>palmy</b> days of the 1970s.</i>
<b>prosper</b>	Make successful. <i>The state hopes to <b>prosper</b> from free trade with the United States.</i>

<b>prosperous</b>	Marked by peace and prosperity. <i>We wish you a Merry Christmas and a <b>prosperous</b> New Year.</i>
<b>rich</b>	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>Many fond hopes are pinned on <b>rich</b> uncles.</i>
<b>successful</b>	Having achieved fame, wealth, or social status. <i>A <b>successful</b> attack on the town.</i>
<b>teem</b>	Be teeming be abuzz. <i>Every garden is <b>teeming</b> with wildlife.</i>
<b><u>thrive</u></b>	Make steady progress; be at the high point in one's career or reach a high point in historical significance or importance. <i>The new baby <b>thrived</b>.</i>
<b>thriving</b>	Very lively and profitable. <i>Did a <b>thriving</b> business in orchids.</i>
<b>well-to-do</b>	Travel or traverse (a distance).
<b><u>windfall</u></b>	A sudden happening that brings good fortune (as a sudden opportunity to make money). <i>Members are to get an average 520 cash <b>windfall</b> for voting yes to the merger.</i>
