become more numerous Enter or assume a certain state or condition.

boom

Be the case that thunder is being heard.
*Stop right there **boomed** the Headmaster.*

escalate

Increase in extent or intensity.
*The Allies **escalated** the bombing.*

expand

Expand the influence of.
*His business **expanded** rapidly.*

explode

Undergo a violent expansion in which much energy is released as a shock wave.
*He **exploded** with rage.*

grow rapidly

Come to have or undergo a change of (physical features and attributes).

increase exponentially

Become bigger or greater in amount.

increase rapidly

Become bigger or greater in amount.

multiply

Propagate (plants).
***Multiply** 10 by 15.*

mushroom	Pick or gather mushrooms. <i>These are high performance bullets which mushroom upon impact.</i>
proliferate	Cause (cells, tissue, structures, etc.) to reproduce rapidly. <i>We must not proliferate nuclear arms.</i>
put on a spurt	Formulate in a particular style or language.
rocket	Propel with a rocket. <i>She showed the kind of form that rocketed her to the semi finals last year.</i>
run riot	Direct or control; projects, businesses, etc.
shoot up	Run or move very quickly or hastily.
skyrocket	Shoot up abruptly, like a rocket. <i>Prices skyrocketed.</i>
snowball	Throw snowballs at. <i>I made sure the other kids stopped snowballing Celia.</i>
spring up	Develop into a distinctive entity.
swell	Come up (as of feelings and thoughts, or other ephemeral things). <i>The bellies of the starving children are swelling.</i>



Usage Examples of "Burgeon" as a verb

- *The burgeoning administration.*
- *The city's suburbs have burgeoned, sprawling out from the centre.*
- *The burgeoning population.*

abound	Be abundant or plentiful; exist in large quantities. <i>This area abounds with caravan sites.</i>
affluence	Abundant wealth. <i>A sign of our growing affluence.</i>
<u>affluent</u>	An affluent person a person who is financially well off. <i>An affluent banker.</i>
<u>bloom</u>	The state or period of greatest beauty, freshness, or vigour. <i>The bloom on a plum.</i>
<u>blossom</u>	The period of greatest prosperity or productivity. <i>Fruit trees in blossom.</i>
bonanza	An especially rich vein of precious ore. <i>The festive feature film bonanza.</i>

bonus	An extra and unexpected advantage. <i>Good weather is an added bonus but the real appeal is the landscape.</i>
boom	Hit hard. <i>The deep boom of the bass drum.</i>
booming	Used of the voice. <i>The booming economy of the 1920s.</i>
daisy	Used in names of other plants of the daisy family e g Michaelmas daisy Shasta daisy.
ding	Go ding dong like a bell. <i>Cash registers were dinging softly.</i>
efflorescence	The formation of a powdery deposit on the surface of brickwork, rock, or other material as a result of loss of moisture on exposure to air. <i>Cover the brickwork to minimize efflorescence.</i>
fanfare	Media attention or elaborate ceremony. <i>A specially composed fanfare announced the arrival of the Duchess.</i>
flourish	Be working or at the height of one's career during a specified period. <i>Wild plants flourish on the banks of the lake.</i>
flourishing	Developing rapidly and successfully; thriving. <i>Flourishing businesses.</i>
grow	Cultivate by growing often involving improvements by means of agricultural techniques. <i>Morels grow in a variety of places.</i>
growth	A process of becoming larger or longer or more numerous or more important. <i>Some additives slow down the growth of microorganisms.</i>
inflation	The act of filling something with air. <i>The inflation of a balloon.</i>
metropolis	The capital or chief city of a country or region. <i>By the late eighteenth century Edo had grown to a metropolis with a population of nearly one million.</i>
opulence	Great wealth or luxuriousness. <i>Rooms of spectacular opulence.</i>
palmy	Covered with palms. <i>The palmy days of the 1970s.</i>
prosper	Make successful. <i>The state hopes to prosper from free trade with the United States.</i>

prosperous	Marked by peace and prosperity. <i>We wish you a Merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year.</i>
rich	Marked by richness and fullness of flavor. <i>Many fond hopes are pinned on rich uncles.</i>
successful	Having achieved fame, wealth, or social status. <i>A successful attack on the town.</i>
teem	Be teeming be abuzz. <i>Every garden is teeming with wildlife.</i>
<u>thrive</u>	Make steady progress; be at the high point in one's career or reach a high point in historical significance or importance. <i>The new baby thrived.</i>
thriving	Very lively and profitable. <i>Did a thriving business in orchids.</i>
well-to-do	Travel or traverse (a distance).
<u>windfall</u>	A sudden happening that brings good fortune (as a sudden opportunity to make money). <i>Members are to get an average 520 cash windfall for voting yes to the merger.</i>
