- *A dish consisting of a flat round cake of minced beef, or sometimes another savoury ingredient, that is fried or grilled and served in a split bun or roll with various condiments and toppings.*
- *A sandwich consisting of a fried cake of minced beef served on a bun, often with other ingredients.*
- *United States jurist appointed chief justice of the United States Supreme Court by Richard Nixon (1907-1995).*

| baste | Pour fat or juices over (meat) during cooking in order to keep it moist. <i>Baste a roast.</i> |
| beef | The flesh of a cow, bull, or ox, used as food. <i>Getting caught with pot in the sixties was a narco beef.</i> |
| butter | Spread butter on. <i>Lily buttered a slice of toast.</i> |
| <u>cheese</u> | Wind onto a cheese. <i>A cheese sandwich.</i> |

| coke | Convert coal into coke. <i>Petroleum oils coke after distillation.</i> |
| creamery | A workplace where dairy products (butter and cheese etc.) are produced or sold. |
| dairy | A farm where dairy products are produced. <i>I rely on soya as a substitute for dairy.</i> |
| deli | A shop selling ready-to-eat food products. |
| fillet | A roller used to impress a fillet on the cover of a book. <i>Roast fillet of lamb.</i> |
| ham | Salted or smoked meat from the upper part of a pig's leg. <i>A honey baked ham.</i> |
| hamburger | A sandwich consisting of a fried cake of minced beef served on a bun, often with other ingredients. |
| livestock | Farm animals regarded as an asset. <i>Markets for the trading of livestock.</i> |
| <u>meat</u> | The inner and usually edible part of a seed or grain or nut or fruit stone. <i>Pieces of meat.</i> |
| milk | Take milk from female mammals. <i>Executives milked the health plan's funds for their personal use.</i> |
| mutton | Meat from a mature domestic sheep. <i>A leg of mutton.</i> |
| pizza | Italian open pie made of thin bread dough spread with a spiced mixture of e.g. tomato sauce and cheese. <i>A pizza restaurant.</i> |
| pork | Gorge oneself with food. <i>Pork chops.</i> |
| roast | Of food having been roasted. <i>This is the roast most likely to be used in espresso.</i> |
| <u>sandwich</u> | Something that is constructed like or has the form of a sandwich. <i>A ham sandwich.</i> |
| sausage | An object shaped like a sausage. <i>Her hair hung in glossy black sausage curls.</i> |
| sirloin | Good-quality beef cut from the loin. <i>Fresh sirloin steaks.</i> |
| smoked | (used especially of meats and fish) dried and cured by hanging in wood smoke. <i>A plate of smoked salmon.</i> |

| steak | A thick slice of steak or other high quality meat or fish. <i>A fillet steak.</i> |
| stew | Food prepared by stewing especially meat or fish with vegetables. <i>Sweaty clothes left to stew in a plastic bag.</i> |
| tenderloin | A city district known for its vice and high crime rate. <i>Every city has a tenderloin.</i> |
| toaster | A kitchen appliance (usually electric) for toasting bread. |
| veal | Meat from a calf. <i>Veal and ham pie.</i> |
| venison | Meat from a deer used as food. <i>Venison steaks.</i> |
