
## Bust as a Noun

#### Definitions of "Bust" as a verb


According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "bust" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Separate or cause to separate abruptly.
- Go to pieces.
- Ruin completely.



- Search without warning, make a sudden surprise attack on.
- Break open or apart suddenly and forcefully.







## Synonyms of "Bust" as a verb (9 Words)

break	Undergo breaking. <i>The horse was tough to <b>break</b>.</i>
burst	Burst outward usually with noise. The dam <b>burst</b> after days of torrential rain.
fall apart	Touch or seem as if touching visually or audibly.
<u>raid</u>	Conduct a raid on. The police <b>raid</b> ed the crack house.
<u>rupture</u>	(especially of a pipe or container, or bodily part such as an organ or membrane) break or burst suddenly. <i>The impact <b>rupture</b>d both fuel tanks.</i>
snap	Move with a snapping sound. Bullets <b>snap</b> ped past us.
tear	Fill with tears or shed tears. The material wouldn t <b>tear</b> .
wear	Have in one s aspect wear an expression of one s attitude or personality. <i>Spinning long stories wear</i> ing half the day.
wear out	Exhaust or get tired through overuse or great strain or stress.

breach	A gap in a wall, barrier, or defence, especially one made by an attacking army. We saw whales <b>breach</b> ing in the distance.
break	Breaking of hard tissue such as bone. <b>Break</b> an alibi.
breaker	Any CB radio user. A rule <b>breaker</b> .
<u>broken</u>	Having been broken. <b>Broken</b> terrain.
cleave	Separate or cut with a tool, such as a sharp instrument. <i>Cleave</i> the bone.



cleft	Split or divided. The infant was born with a double harelip and <b>cleft</b> palate.
cracked	Used of skin roughened as a result of cold or exposure. The old pipes were <b>cracked</b> and leaking.
crush	Crush or bruise. <i>Lemon crush</i> .
destroy	Destroy completely damage irreparably. The room had been <b>destroy</b> ed by fire.
<u>detriment</u>	The state of being harmed or damaged. Light industry can be carried out in a residential area without <b>detriment</b> to its amenities.
disassemble	Take (something) to pieces. It is permissible for a lawful user to <b>disassemble</b> a computer program to determine its interfaces.
<u>disintegrate</u>	Break up into small parts as the result of impact or decay. <i>The material <b>disintegrate</b>d</i> .
<u>dismantle</u>	Take off or remove. <i>The old regime was <b>dismantle</b>d</i> .
dispersal	The act of dispersing or diffusing something. Colleges had made large <b>dispersal</b> s and the shops were filled with books.
divisible	Capable of being or liable to be divided or separated. Even numbers are <b>divisible</b> by two.
<u>fracture</u>	Sustain a fracture of a bone. This writer really <b>fracture</b> s the language.
intermission	The act of suspending activity temporarily. He was granted an <b>intermission</b> in his studies.
interruption	An act of delaying or interrupting the continuity. A chance to study without <b>interruption</b> .
partible	Involving or denoting a system of inheritance in which a deceased person's estate is divided equally among the heirs. <i>A partible estate.</i>
piece	Slowly make sense of something from separate pieces of evidence. An important <b>piece</b> of the evidence.
quash	Put down by force or intimidation. His conviction was <b>quash</b> ed on appeal.
recess	Put into a recess. Talks resumed after a month s <b>recess</b> .



<u>rupture</u>	State of being torn or burst open. The <b>rupture</b> with his father would never be healed.
shatter	Damage or destroy. The wine glass <b>shatter</b> ed.
<u>smash</u>	An act or sound of something smashing. A forearm <b>smash</b> .
snap	Take a snapshot of. A dog was <b>snap</b> ping at his heels.
<u>split</u>	A split level house. <b>Split</b> and toast the muffins.
sunder	Split apart. A universe <b>sunder</b> ed ages ago in a divine war.
