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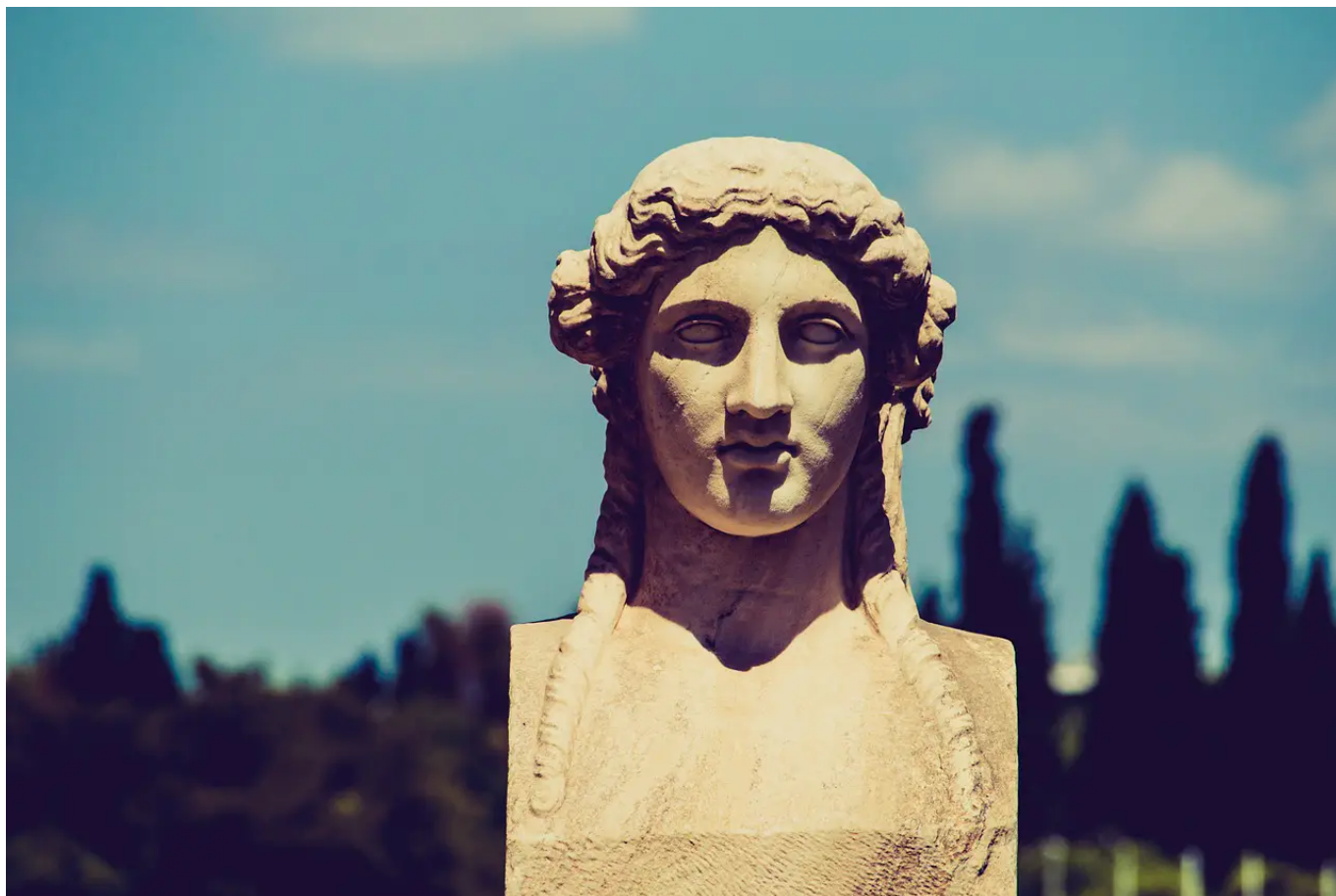

Definitions of "Busted" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “busted” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Lacking funds.*
- *Out of working order ('busted' is an informal substitute for 'broken).*



Synonyms of "Busted" as an adjective (1 Word)

broken Having been broken.
*The coke machine is **broken**.*



Usage Examples of "Busted" as an adjective

- *The coke machine is busted.*



Associations of "Busted" (30 Words)

bout

A wrestling or boxing match.

*A drinking **bout**.*

breach

A personal or social separation (as between opposing factions).

*A **breach** of confidence.*

break

Dance music featuring breakbeats.

*The management are out to **break** the union.*

breaker

Any CB radio user.

*A rule **breaker**.*

broken

Out of working order busted is an informal substitute for broken.

*A **broken** note.*

cleave

Come or be in close contact with; stick or hold together and resist separation.

*The egg **cleaves** to form a mulberry shaped cluster of cells.*

cleft

Split, divided, or partially divided into two.

*He had a **cleft** chin and strong jaw.*

cracked

Informal or slang terms for mentally irregular.

*The old pipes were **cracked** and leaking.*

crush

The act of crushing.

*It turns out she thought you were flirting with her **crush**.*

destroy	Destroy completely damage irreparably. <i>He has been determined to destroy her.</i>
detriment	A cause of harm or damage. <i>Such tests are a detriment to good education.</i>
disassemble	Take (something) to pieces. <i>The piston can be disassembled for transport.</i>
disintegrate	Break into parts or components or lose cohesion or unity. <i>Our shoes had to last until they disintegrated on our feet.</i>
dismantle	Take off or remove. <i>The old regime was dismantled.</i>
dispersal	The action or process of distributing or spreading things or people over a wide area. <i>Dispersals of archaic populations.</i>
divisible	Capable of being divided. <i>24 is divisible by 4.</i>
fracture	Fracture a bone of. <i>Obsidian shows a conchoidal fracture.</i>
intermission	A pause or break. <i>The daily work goes on without intermission.</i>
interruption	An act of delaying or interrupting the continuity. <i>The telephone is an annoying interruption.</i>
partible	(of e.g. property) capable of being parted or divided. <i>The entire family lost status as a consequence of partible inheritance.</i>
piece	Repair by adding pieces. <i>Each employee owns a piece of the company.</i>
quash	Reject as invalid, especially by legal procedure. <i>A hospital executive quashed rumours that nursing staff will lose jobs.</i>
recess	Put into a recess. <i>A table set into a recess.</i>
rupture	State of being torn or burst open. <i>Once trust and confidence has been ruptured it can be difficult to regain.</i>
shatter	Damage or destroy. <i>Bullets riddled the bar top glasses shattered bottles exploded.</i>
smash	An act or sound of something smashing. <i>The window smashed.</i>
snap	Move with a snapping sound. <i>A cold snap.</i>

split

An instance or act of splitting or being split a division.

*The river had **split** into a number of channels.*

sunder

Break apart or in two, using violence.

*A universe **sundered** ages ago in a divine war.*
