<b>ringing</b>	An act or sound of ringing. <i>She was woken by the <b>ringing</b> of the phone.</i>
<b>rumour</b>	A currently circulating story or report of uncertain or doubtful truth. <i><b>Rumour</b> has it that he will take a year off.</i>
<b>signal</b>	An indication of a situation. <i>The champion's announcement that he was retiring was the <b>signal</b> for scores of journalists to gather at his last match.</i>
<b>singing</b>	The act of singing vocal music. <i>My mother had a beautiful <b>singing</b> voice.</i>
<b>speculation</b>	Investment in stocks, property, etc. in the hope of gain but with the risk of loss. <i><b>Speculations</b> about the outcome of the election.</i>
<b>stimulation</b>	The act of arousing an organism to action. <i>Lack of intellectual <b>stimulation</b>.</i>

<b>story</b>	A plot or storyline. <i>I m going to tell you a <b>story</b>.</i>
<b>suggestion</b>	Persuasion formulated as a suggestion. <i>The picnic was her <b>suggestion</b>.</i>
<b>telephone call</b>	Electronic equipment that converts sound into electrical signals that can be transmitted over distances and then converts received signals back into sounds.
<b>thrill</b>	An almost pleasurable sensation of fright. <i>The <b>thrills</b> of space travel.</i>
<b>tingle</b>	A slight prickling or stinging sensation. <i>A <b>tingle</b> of anticipation.</i>
<b>tone</b>	A basic interval in classical Western music equal to two semitones and separating for example the first and second notes of an ordinary scale such as C and D or E and F sharp a major second. <i>Vagal <b>tone</b>.</i>

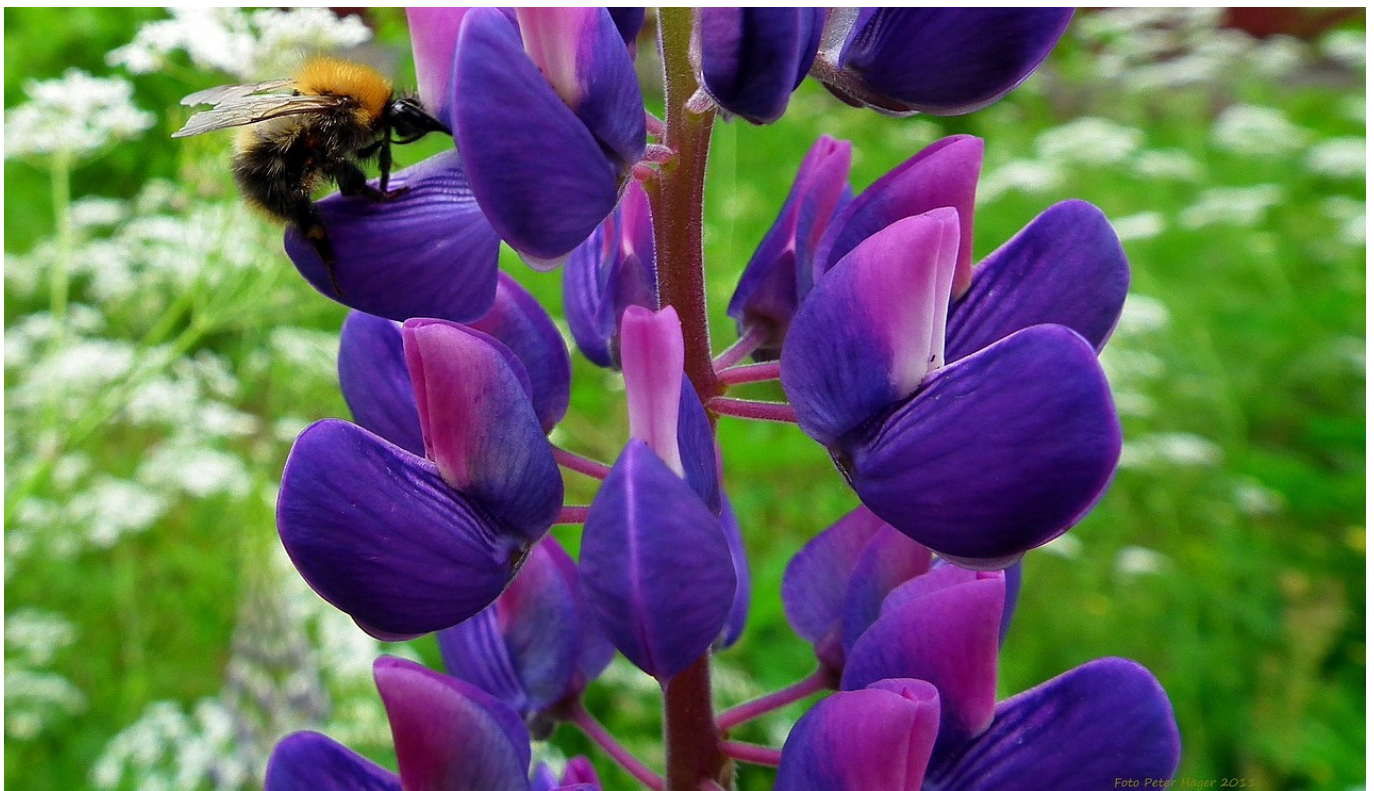

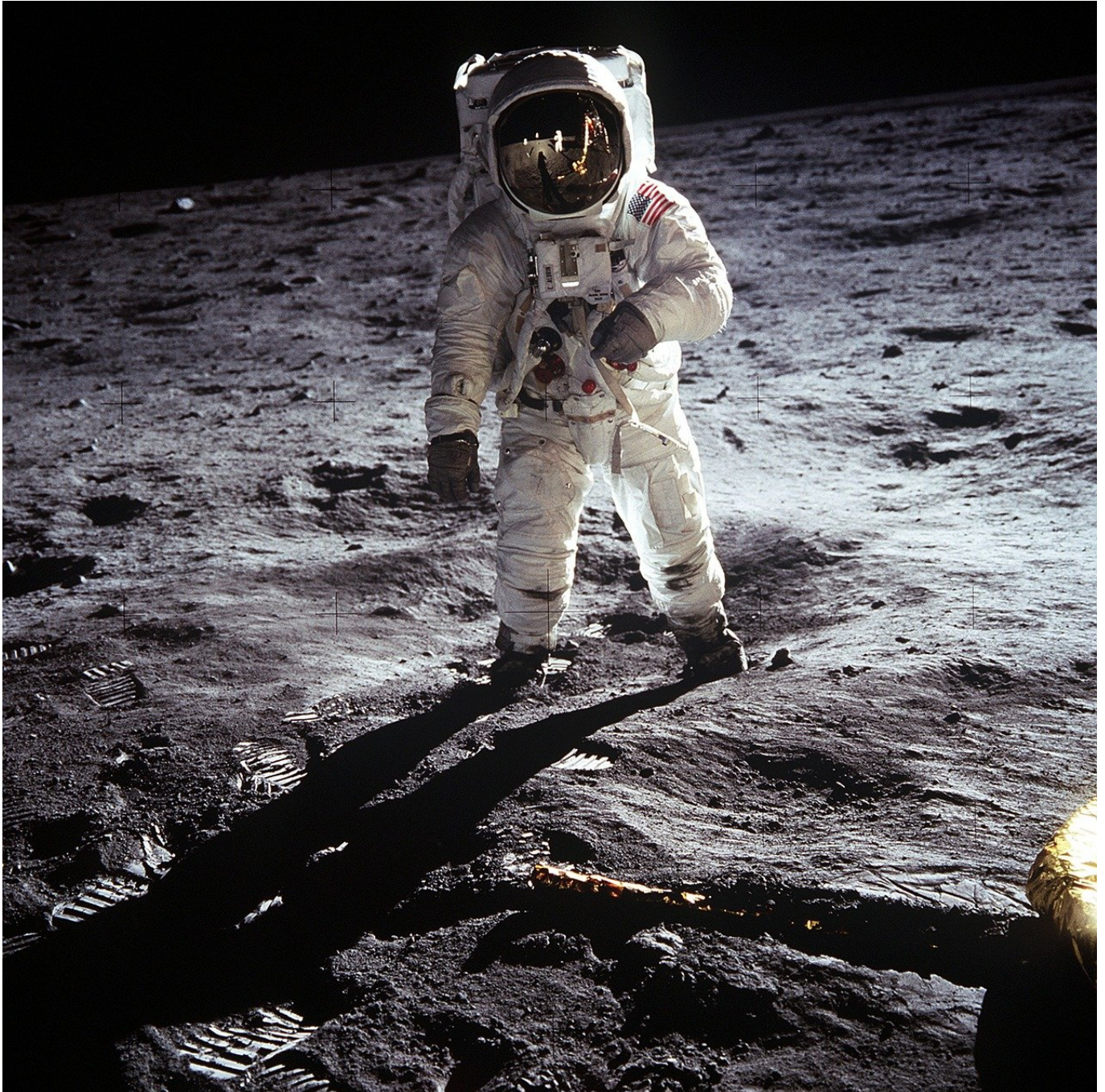
<b>fuzz</b>	(of hair) become frizzy. <i>Snow <b>fuzzes</b> the outlines of the signs.</i>
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>Celia went to the kitchen to start <b>getting</b> their dinner.</i>
<b>get on the phone to</b>	Reach by calculation.
<b>get someone on the phone</b>	Succeed in catching or seizing, especially after a chase.
<b>have an air of</b>	Cause to be born.
<b>hiss</b>	Make a sharp hissing sound as if to show disapproval. <i>The escaping gas was <b>hissing</b>.</i>
<b><u>hum</u></b>	Sound with a monotonous hum. <i>The house was <b>humming</b> with preparations for the dance.</i>

<b>scramble</b>	Climb awkwardly, as if by scrambling. <i>As the jet headed towards Italian airspace two F104 fighters <b>scrambled</b> from a base in Sicily to intercept it.</i>
<b>scurry</b>	To move about or proceed hurriedly. <i>Pedestrians scurried for cover.</i>
<b>scuttle</b>	To move about or proceed hurriedly.
<b>seethe</b>	Be noisy with activity. <i>The grey ocean <b>seethed</b>.</i>
<b>send</b>	Send a message or letter. <i><b>Send</b> me your latest results.</i>
<b>shy</b>	Throw quickly. <i>Don't <b>shy</b> away from saying what you think.</i>
<b><u>sing</u></b>	Deliver by singing. <i>The nightingale was <b>singing</b>.</i>
<b>sound</b>	Announce by means of a sound. <i><b>Sound</b> the alarm.</i>
<b>throw</b>	Throw a die out onto a flat surface. <i>These guys should be <b>thrown</b> in jail.</i>
<b>toss</b>	Throw or toss with a light motion. <i>I could demand her keys and <b>toss</b> her office.</i>

## Associations of "Buzz" (30 Words)

**ant**

A small insect typically having a sting and living in a complex social colony with one or more breeding queens. It is wingless except for fertile adults, which form large mating swarms, and is proverbial for its industriousness.

<b>badger</b>	Repeatedly ask (someone) to do something; pester. <i>His daughter was always <b>badgering</b> him to let her join.</i>
<b>bee</b>	An insect of a large group to which the honeybee belongs including many solitary as well as social kinds. <i>A sewing <b>bee</b>.</i>
<b>bug</b>	A harmful microorganism, typically a bacterium. <i>He d just recovered from a flu <b>bug</b>.</i>
<b>bustle</b>	A framework worn at the back below the waist for giving fullness to a woman's skirt. <i>The cheerleaders <b>bustled</b> about excitingly before their performance.</i>
<b>butterfly</b>	Having a two lobed shape resembling the spread wings of a butterfly. <i><b>Butterfly</b> the shrimp using a small sharp knife.</i>
<b>chirp</b>	(of a small bird or an insect) make a short, sharp, high-pitched sound. <i>Good morning <b>chirped</b> Alex.</i>
<b>cockroach</b>	A scavenging insect that resembles a beetle, having long antennae and legs and typically a broad, flattened body. Several tropical kinds have become established worldwide as household pests.
<b>croon</b>	A soft, low voice or tone. <i>Goodbye you lovely darling she <b>crooned</b>.</i>
<b>descant</b>	Sing in descant. <i>His <b>descant</b> of deprivation.</i>
<b>dragonfly</b>	A fast-flying long-bodied predatory insect with two pairs of large transparent wings which are spread out sideways at rest. The voracious aquatic larvae take up to five years to reach adulthood.
<b>ectoparasite</b>	Any external parasitic organism (as fleas.
<b>exterminator</b>	A person whose job is to eradicate pests from a building or area; a pest controller. <i>He became an <b>exterminator</b> of pumas tracking them down in dark caverns.</i>
<b>flea</b>	A small wingless jumping insect which feeds on the blood of mammals and birds. It sometimes transmits diseases through its bite, including plague and myxomatosis.
<b>fly</b>	Cause to fly or float. <i>All nations <b>fly</b> their flags in front of the U N.</i>
<b>fussy</b>	Full of unnecessary detail or decoration. <i>A <b>fussy</b> design.</i>
<b>housefly</b>	A common small fly occurring worldwide in and around human habitation. Its eggs are laid in decaying material, and the fly can be a health hazard due to its contamination of food.

<b>hum</b>	A humming noise. <i>The house was <b>humming</b> with preparations for the dance.</i>
<b>hustle</b>	Get by trying hard. <i>She <b>hustled</b> a free lunch from the waiter.</i>
<b>insectivorous</b>	(of animals and plants) feeding on insects.
<b>moth</b>	A clothes moth. <i>I store my sweaters in plastic bags to protect them from <b>moths</b>.</i>
<b>nit</b>	A luminance unit equal to 1 candle per square meter measured perpendicular to the rays from the source. <i>You stupid <b>nit</b>.</i>
<b>pest</b>	A serious sometimes fatal infection of rodents caused by Yersinia pestis and accidentally transmitted to humans by the bite of a flea that has bitten an infected animal. <i>The tomato plant attracts a <b>pest</b> called whitefly.</i>
<b>pester</b>	Annoy persistently. <i>She constantly <b>pestered</b> him with telephone calls.</i>
<b>squeak</b>	A single remark or communication. <i>The door opened with a slight <b>squeak</b>.</i>
<b>twitter</b>	Idle or ignorant talk. <i>Sparrows <b>twittered</b> under the eaves.</i>
<b>warble</b>	A lumpy abscess under the hide of domestic mammals caused by larvae of a botfly or warble fly. <i>The <b>warble</b> of the phone.</i>
<b>wasp</b>	A solitary winged insect with a narrow waist mostly distantly related to the social wasps and including many parasitic kinds.
<b>wiretap</b>	A listening device used to conduct surveillance, typically one connected to a phone line. <i>Secret <b>wiretap</b> recordings.</i>
<b>worm</b>	Used in names of other animals that resemble worms in some way e.g slow worm shipworm. <i>You <b>wormed</b> your way into their lives.</i>
