cotton	Textile fabric made from cotton fibre. <i>A cotton reel.</i>
drapery	Cloth gracefully draped and arranged in loose folds. <i>The hall of the school was hung with green drapery.</i>
experiment	A venture at something new or different. <i>The composer experimented with a new style.</i>
extra	Excessive or extravagant. <i>They offered him an extra thirty five cents an hour.</i>
felt	Cover with felt. <i>Felt the wool.</i>
fibrosis	Development of excess fibrous connective tissue in an organ.
filling	The act of filling something. <i>An informal British term for filling is stopping.</i>
freon	An aerosol propellant, refrigerant, or organic solvent consisting of one or more of a group of chlorofluorocarbons and related compounds.
interweave	Weave or become woven together. <i>Wordsworth's political ideas are often interwoven with his philosophical and religious beliefs.</i>
item	Used to introduce each item in a list. <i>Item two statute books item two drums.</i>
lined	Marked or covered with lines. <i>He had kind eyes and a deeply lined face.</i>
material	Having material or physical form or substance. <i>He was university material.</i>
matter	That which has mass and occupies space. <i>We can do nothing to change matters.</i>
qualitative	(of an adjective) describing the quality of something in size, appearance, value, etc. Such adjectives can be submodified by words such as very and have comparative and superlative forms. <i>Qualitative analysis determines the chemical constituents of a substance or mixture.</i>

qualitatively	In a qualitative manner. <i>Security levels can be qualitatively assessed.</i>
resource	The ability to find clever ways to overcome difficulties resourcefulness. <i>Japan s exploitation of commercially important marine resources.</i>
secondary	A secondary school. <i>A secondary school.</i>
stratum	Any stratum or layer lying underneath another. <i>There is a broad stratum of truth in her story.</i>
supplementary	A supplementary person or thing. <i>Produced supplementary volumes.</i>
textile	The branch of industry involved in the manufacture of cloth. <i>Textile beaches.</i>
thing	Used to express one s disapproval of or contempt for something. <i>How does this thing work.</i>
valance	A sheet with a deep pleated or gathered border that is designed to hang down over the mattress and sides of a bed.
vinyl	Vinyl used as the standard material for records. <i>Fans had to wait almost a year before the song eventually appeared on vinyl.</i>
weft	(in weaving) the crosswise threads on a loom that are passed over and under the warp threads to make cloth. <i>Weft threads.</i>
