- *An indication of approved or superior status.*
- *A seal on a letter.*
- *A warrant formerly issued by a French king who could warrant imprisonment or death in a signed letter under his seal.*
- *The state of being respected or admired; prestige.*

<b><a href="#">distinction</a></b>	A discrimination between things as different and distinct. <i>There is a sharp <b>distinction</b> between domestic politics and international politics.</i>
<b>eminence</b>	A title or form of address given to a Roman Catholic cardinal. <i>A scholar of great <b>eminence</b>.</i>

<b>importance</b>	The state or fact of being of great significance or value. <i>An issue of great <b>importance</b>.</i>
<b>kudos</b>	An expression of approval and commendation. <i><b>Kudos</b> to everyone who put the event together.</i>
<b>lettre de cachet</b>	A seal on a letter.
<b>prestige</b>	Denoting something that arouses widespread respect or admiration. <i>The firm has recently gained considerable <b>prestige</b>.</i>
<b>prestigiousness</b>	A high standing achieved through success or influence or wealth etc.
<b>prominence</b>	Something that bulges out or is protuberant or projects from its surroundings. <i>She came to <b>prominence</b> as an artist in the 1960s.</i>
<b>seal</b>	An engraved device used for stamping a seal. <i>The monarchy is the <b>seal</b> of the unbroached integrity of the Isles.</i>
<b>seal of approval</b>	Fastener consisting of a resinous composition that is plastic when warm; used for sealing documents and parcels and letters.
<b>snob value</b>	A person regarded as arrogant and annoying.
<b>standing</b>	An ordered listing of scores or results showing the relative positions of competitors (individuals or teams) in a sporting event. <i>An inter departmental squabble of long <b>standing</b>.</i>
<b>stature</b>	Importance or reputation gained by ability or achievement. <i>A man of great <b>stature</b>.</i>
<b>status</b>	High rank or social standing. <i>An update on the <b>status</b> of the bill.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Cachet" as a noun

- *Special cachets are applied to cards sold at the stands.*
- *No other shipping company had quite the cachet of Cunard.*

<b>allure</b>	The power to entice or attract through personal charm. <i>People for whom gold holds no <b>allure</b>.</i>
<b>amulet</b>	A trinket or piece of jewelry usually hung about the neck and thought to be a magical protection against evil or disease.
<b>appealing</b>	Attractive or interesting. <i>An <b>appealing</b> look.</i>

<b>attract</b>	Be attractive to. <i>I was <b>attracted</b> to the idea of working for a ballet company.</i>
<b>attraction</b>	An entertainment that is offered to the public. <i>This reform has many <b>attractions</b> for those on the left.</i>
<b>attractive</b>	Having the properties of a magnet; the ability to draw or pull. <i>Foliage can be as <b>attractive</b> as flowers.</i>
<b>bewitchment</b>	A magical spell.
<b><u>charisma</u></b>	A personal attractiveness or interestingness that enables you to influence others. <i>He has tremendous <b>charisma</b> and stage presence.</i>
<b><u>charm</u></b>	Protect through supernatural powers or charms. <i>The <b>charm</b> begins with ritual instructions.</i>
<b><u>dazzle</u></b>	Amaze or overwhelm (someone) with a particular impressive quality. <i>She was <b>dazzled</b> by the bright headlights.</i>
<b>dote</b>	Be foolish or senile due to old age. <i>The parson is now old and <b>dotes</b>.</i>
<b><u>enchant</u></b>	Attract; cause to be enamored. <i>You have been <b>enchanted</b> by some spirits.</i>
<b><u>enchantment</u></b>	A feeling of great liking for something wonderful and unusual. <i>The <b>enchantment</b> of the mountains.</i>
<b>engaging</b>	Attracting or delighting. <i>An <b>engaging</b> smile.</i>
<b>enticing</b>	Highly attractive and able to arouse hope or desire. <i>An <b>enticing</b> prospect.</i>
<b><u>entrance</u></b>	Put into a trance. <i>The southern <b>entrance</b> of the palace.</i>
<b><u>fascinate</u></b>	(especially of a snake) deprive (prey) of the ability to resist or escape by the power of a gaze. <i>I've always been <b>fascinated</b> by computers.</i>
<b>glamorize</b>	Interpret romantically. <i>The lyrics <b>glamorize</b> drugs.</i>
<b>ingratiating</b>	Intended to gain approval or favour; sycophantic. <i>An <b>ingratiating</b> manner.</i>
<b><u>inviting</u></b>	Offering the promise of an attractive or enjoyable experience. <i>The sea down there looks so <b>inviting</b>.</i>
<b>mesmerize</b>	Attract strongly, as if with a magnet. <i>They were <b>mesmerized</b> by his story.</i>

<b><u>seduction</u></b>	An act of winning the love or sexual favor of someone. <i>The <b>seductions</b> of the mainland.</i>
<b><u>seductive</u></b>	Tempting and attractive; enticing. <i>A <b>seductive</b> voice.</i>
<b>spellbind</b>	Attract strongly, as if with a magnet. <i>The singer held the audience <b>spellbound</b>.</i>
<b><u>splendor</u></b>	The quality of being magnificent or splendid or grand. <i>It is the university that gives the scene its stately <b>splendor</b>.</i>
<b><u>suave</u></b>	Smoothly agreeable and courteous with a degree of sophistication. <i>All the waiters were <b>suave</b> and deferential.</i>
<b><u>superstition</u></b>	A widely held but irrational belief in supernatural influences, especially as leading to good or bad luck, or a practice based on such a belief. <i>She touched her locket for luck a <b>superstition</b> she had since childhood.</i>
<b><u>tempt</u></b>	Entice or try to entice (someone) to do something that they find attractive but know to be wrong or unwise. <i>Jobs which involve entertaining may <b>tempt</b> you to drink more than you intend.</i>
<b>winsome</b>	Attractive or appealing in a fresh, innocent way. <i>A <b>winsome</b> smile.</i>
