<b>anatomical</b>	Of or relating to the branch of morphology that studies the structure of organisms. <i><b>Anatomical</b> research.</i>
<b><u>anatomy</u></b>	Alternative names for the body of a human being. <i>He studied the <b>anatomy</b> of crimes.</i>
<b>autopsy</b>	Perform an autopsy on a dead body do a post mortem. <i>On <b>autopsy</b> it was established that he had suffered from a rare brain condition.</i>
<b>bier</b>	A movable frame on which a coffin or a corpse is placed before burial or cremation or on which they are carried to the grave. <i>We followed the <b>bier</b> to the graveyard.</i>
<b>biochemical</b>	A biochemical substance.
<b>carcass</b>	A person's body, living or dead. <i>She saw the mud covered <b>carcass</b> of a sheep.</i>
<b>cleave</b>	Come or be in close contact with; stick or hold together and resist separation. <i><b>Cleave</b> the bone.</i>
<b>clinical</b>	Very efficient and without feeling; coldly detached. <i><b>Clinical</b> drug trials.</i>
<b>corpse</b>	The dead body of a human being. <i>The end of the police search was the discovery of a <b>corpse</b>.</i>
<b>disinter</b>	Dig up for reburial or for medical investigation; of dead bodies. <i>He has <b>disinterred</b> an important collection of writings.</i>
<b>dissatisfy</b>	Fail to satisfy (someone). <i>What is it about these words that <b>dissatisfies</b> you?</i>
<b><u>dissect</u></b>	Make a mathematical, chemical, or grammatical analysis of; break down into components or essential features. <i>He <b>dissected</b> the Prime Minister's statement and revealed the truth behind it.</i>
<b>dissection</b>	Very detailed analysis of a text or idea. <i>The <b>dissection</b> of animals for scientific research.</i>
<b>evaluate</b>	Evaluate or estimate the nature quality ability extent or significance of. <i>Substitute numbers in a simple formula and <b>evaluate</b> the answer.</i>
<b>examine</b>	Question or examine thoroughly and closely. <i>This forced us to <b>examine</b> every facet of our business.</i>
<b>gynecology</b>	The branch of medicine that deals with the diseases and hygiene of women.

<b>inquest</b>	An inquiry by a coroner's court into the cause of a death. <i>An <b>inquest</b> by New York newspapers into a subway fire.</i>
<b>laboratory</b>	A region resembling a laboratory inasmuch as it offers opportunities for observation and practice and experimentation. <i>Studies on <b>laboratory</b> rats.</i>
<b>morgue</b>	A mortuary. <i>She put us in that draughty <b>morgue</b> of a sitting room.</i>
<b>morphological</b>	Relating to or concerned with the formation of admissible words in a language. <i>Geomorphological features of the Black Hills.</i>
<b>mortician</b>	One whose business is the management of funerals.
<b>mortuary</b>	A building (or room) where dead bodies are kept before burial or cremation. <i>A <b>mortuary</b> temple.</i>
<b>otolaryngology</b>	The medical specialty that deals with diseases of the ear, nose and throat.
<b>pathology</b>	The science of the causes and effects of diseases, especially the branch of medicine that deals with the laboratory examination of samples of body tissue for diagnostic or forensic purposes. <i>Research people skilled in experimental <b>pathology</b>.</i>
<b>physiological</b>	Relating to the way in which a living organism or bodily part functions. <i><b>Physiological</b> processes.</i>
<b>physiology</b>	The way in which a living organism or bodily part functions. <i>The <b>physiology</b> of the brain.</i>
<b>postmortem</b>	An examination and dissection of a dead body to determine cause of death or the changes produced by disease. <i>A <b>postmortem</b> examination to determine the cause of death.</i>
<b>split</b>	The act of rending or ripping or splitting something. <i>After the band <b>split</b> up Tex became a railway clerk.</i>
<b>vivisection</b>	Ruthlessly sharp and detailed criticism or analysis. <i>The <b>vivisection</b> of America s seamy underbelly.</i>
