Synonyms of "Cadaver" as a noun (8 Words)

body	A woman's close fitting stretch garment for the upper body fastening at the crotch. <i>The student body.</i>
carcass	The dead body of an animal. <i>The carcass has a high proportion of meat to bone.</i>
clay	A hardened clay surface for a tennis court. <i>A clay tile.</i>
corpse	The dead body of a human being. <i>The end of the police search was the discovery of a corpse.</i>
dead body	A time when coldness (or some other quality associated with death) is intense.
remains	Historical or archaeological relics. <i>The remains of a sandwich lunch were on the table.</i>

skeleton

A sport in which a competitor races down a frozen track on a skeleton sled.
The **skeleton** s runners make a terrifying rumbling sound as they slide down the ice.

stiff

The dead body of a human being.
A lucky **stiff**.

analyze

Make a mathematical, chemical, or grammatical analysis of; break down into components or essential features.
Analyze your real motives.

anatomical	Of or relating to the branch of morphology that studies the structure of organisms. Anatomical research.
<u>anatomy</u>	Alternative names for the body of a human being. <i>He studied the anatomy of crimes.</i>
autopsy	Perform an autopsy on a dead body do a post mortem. <i>On autopsy it was established that he had suffered from a rare brain condition.</i>
bier	A movable frame on which a coffin or a corpse is placed before burial or cremation or on which they are carried to the grave. <i>We followed the bier to the graveyard.</i>
biochemical	A biochemical substance.
carcass	A person's body, living or dead. <i>She saw the mud covered carcass of a sheep.</i>
cleave	Come or be in close contact with; stick or hold together and resist separation. Cleave the bone.
clinical	Very efficient and without feeling; coldly detached. Clinical drug trials.
corpse	The dead body of a human being. <i>The end of the police search was the discovery of a corpse.</i>
disinter	Dig up for reburial or for medical investigation; of dead bodies. <i>He has disinterred an important collection of writings.</i>
dissatisfy	Fail to satisfy (someone). <i>What is it about these words that dissatisfies you?</i>
<u>dissect</u>	Make a mathematical, chemical, or grammatical analysis of; break down into components or essential features. <i>He dissected the Prime Minister's statement and revealed the truth behind it.</i>
dissection	Very detailed analysis of a text or idea. <i>The dissection of animals for scientific research.</i>
evaluate	Evaluate or estimate the nature quality ability extent or significance of. <i>Substitute numbers in a simple formula and evaluate the answer.</i>
examine	Question or examine thoroughly and closely. <i>This forced us to examine every facet of our business.</i>
gynecology	The branch of medicine that deals with the diseases and hygiene of women.

inquest	An inquiry by a coroner's court into the cause of a death. <i>An inquest by New York newspapers into a subway fire.</i>
laboratory	A region resembling a laboratory inasmuch as it offers opportunities for observation and practice and experimentation. <i>Studies on laboratory rats.</i>
morgue	A mortuary. <i>She put us in that draughty morgue of a sitting room.</i>
morphological	Relating to or concerned with the formation of admissible words in a language. <i>Geomorphological features of the Black Hills.</i>
mortician	One whose business is the management of funerals.
mortuary	A building (or room) where dead bodies are kept before burial or cremation. <i>A mortuary temple.</i>
otolaryngology	The medical specialty that deals with diseases of the ear, nose and throat.
pathology	The science of the causes and effects of diseases, especially the branch of medicine that deals with the laboratory examination of samples of body tissue for diagnostic or forensic purposes. <i>Research people skilled in experimental pathology.</i>
physiological	Relating to the way in which a living organism or bodily part functions. <i>Physiological processes.</i>
physiology	The way in which a living organism or bodily part functions. <i>The physiology of the brain.</i>
postmortem	An examination and dissection of a dead body to determine cause of death or the changes produced by disease. <i>A postmortem examination to determine the cause of death.</i>
split	The act of rending or ripping or splitting something. <i>After the band split up Tex became a railway clerk.</i>
vivisection	Ruthlessly sharp and detailed criticism or analysis. <i>The vivisection of America s seamy underbelly.</i>
