## Cadence as a Noun

### Definitions of "Cadence" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “cadence” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The accent in a metrical foot of verse.*
- *Rhythm.*
- *A fall in pitch of the voice at the end of a phrase or sentence.*
- *A sequence of notes or chords comprising the close of a musical phrase.*
- *A rhythmical effect in written text.*
- *(prosody) the accent in a metrical foot of verse.*
- *A recurrent rhythmical series.*
- *The close of a musical section.*
- *A modulation or inflection of the voice.*

### Synonyms of "Cadence" as a noun (13 Words)

**beat**                      The rhythmic contraction and expansion of the arteries with each beat of the heart.  
*His **beat** is construction property and hotels.*

<b>cadency</b>	The status of a younger branch of a family. <i>The arms of younger sons are differenced by marks of <b>cadency</b>.</i>
<b>lilt</b>	A jaunty rhythm in music. <i>He spoke with a faint but recognizable Irish <b>lilt</b>.</i>
<b>measure</b>	Measuring instrument having a sequence of marks at regular intervals used as a reference in making measurements. <i>The <b>measurements</b> were carefully done.</i>
<b>meter</b>	The basic unit of length adopted under the Systeme International d'Unites (approximately 1.094 yards).
<b>metre</b>	A race over a specified number of metres. <i>Sit two <b>metres</b> away from the TV screen.</i>
<b>pulse</b>	A rhythmical throbbing of the arteries as blood is propelled through them, typically as felt in the wrists or neck. <i>Those close to the financial and economic <b>pulse</b> maintain that there have been fundamental changes.</i>
<b>rhythm</b>	A person's natural feeling for musical rhythm. <i>He made her count beats to the bar and clap the <b>rhythm</b>.</i>
<b>rhythmical flow</b>	Any uninterrupted stream or discharge.
<b>rhythmical pattern</b>	A customary way of operation or behavior.
<b>rise and fall</b>	The amount a salary is increased.
<b>swing</b>	An act of swinging. <i>It took time to get into the <b>swing</b> of things.</i>
<b>tempo</b>	The rate of some repeating event. <i>The <b>tempo</b> of life dictated by a heavy workload.</i>

- *The final cadences of the Prelude.*

## Associations of "Cadence" (30 Words)

**antiphon** A musical setting of an antiphon.

<b>canto</b>	A major division of a long poem. <i>Dante's Divine Comedy has 100 <b>cantos</b>.</i>
<b>couplet</b>	A pair of successive lines of verse, typically rhyming and of the same length.
<b>doggerel</b>	A comic verse of irregular measure. <i><b>Doggerel</b> verses.</i>
<b>drum</b>	The sound of a drum. <i>Snipe should now be <b>drumming</b> all round the reserve.</i>
<b>duet</b>	Perform a duet. <i>They <b>duetted</b> at the tribute concert.</i>
<b>ensemble</b>	The coordination between performers executing an ensemble passage. <i>We would have to adopt a picture in which there is an <b>ensemble</b> of all possible universes with some probability distribution.</i>
<b>euphony</b>	The tendency to make phonetic change for ease of pronunciation. <i>The poet put <b>euphony</b> before mere factuality.</i>
<b>guitar</b>	A stringed instrument usually having six strings; played by strumming or plucking.
<b>harp</b>	Play on a harp. <i>You need to stop <b>harping</b> on her age.</i>
<b>hymn</b>	Sing a hymn. <i>They <b>hymned</b> their love of God.</i>
<b>lied</b>	A type of German song, especially of the romantic period, typically for solo voice with piano accompaniment.
<b>lullaby</b>	The act of singing a quiet song to lull a child to sleep. <i>She lullabied us, she fed us.</i>
<b>mazurka</b>	Music composed for dancing the mazurka.
<b>melody</b>	The principal part in harmonized music. <i>He picked out an intricate <b>melody</b> on his guitar.</i>
<b>missive</b>	A letter, especially a long or official one. <i>Yet another <b>missive</b> from the Foreign Office.</i>
<b>opus</b>	A musical work that has been created. <i>He was writing an <b>opus</b> on Mexico.</i>
<b>poem</b>	A composition written in metrical feet forming rhythmical lines. <i>A <b>poem</b> in terza rima.</i>
<b>poetry</b>	Something regarded as comparable to poetry in its beauty. <i><b>Poetry</b> and fire are nicely balanced in the music.</i>
<b>psalm</b>	Sing or celebrate in psalms. <i>He <b>psalms</b> the works of God.</i>

- quatrain** A stanza of four lines.
- repertoire** A stock of plays, dances, or items that a company or a performer knows or is prepared to perform.  
*The mainstream concert **repertoire**.*
- rhyme** Compose rhymes.  
*Hat and cat **rhyme**.*
- rhythm** A person's natural feeling for musical rhythm.  
*The twice daily **rhythms** of the tides.*
- singing** The act of singing vocal music.  
*My mother had a beautiful **singing** voice.*
- song** A musical composition suggestive of a song.  
*He bought it for a **song**.*
- stanza** A group of four lines in some Greek and Latin metres.
- tremolo** A mechanism in an organ producing a tremolo effect.
- tune** The adjustment of a radio receiver or other circuit to a required frequency.  
*My piano needs to be **tuned**.*
- verse** Speak in or compose verse versify.  
*The second **verse**.*
