Definitions of "Cajole" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “cajole” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Influence or urge by gentle urging, caressing, or flattering.*
- *Persuade (someone) to do something by sustained coaxing or flattery.*

Synonyms of "Cajole" as a verb (18 Words)

beguile	Charm or enchant (someone), often in a deceptive way. <i>He beguiled the voters with his good looks.</i>
blarney	Influence or persuade (someone) using charm and pleasant flattery. <i>He went overboard in blarneying him into thinking that Joe considered him a nice guy.</i>
coax	Arrange (something) carefully into a particular shape or position. <i>Coaxing more speed from the car.</i>
entice	Provoke someone to do something through (often false or exaggerated) promises or persuasion. <i>A show which should entice a new audience into the theatre.</i>

flatter	(of a colour or a style of clothing) cause (someone) to appear to the best advantage. <i>She was flattering him in order to avoid doing what he wanted.</i>
get round	Take the first step or steps in carrying out an action.
inveigle	Influence or urge by gentle urging, caressing, or flattering. <i>Jones had inveigled himself into her house.</i>
lure	Provoke someone to do something through (often false or exaggerated) promises or persuasion. <i>He lured me into temptation.</i>
manoeuvre	Direct the course; determine the direction of travelling. <i>She tried to manoeuvre her trolley round people.</i>
palaver	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>It s too hot for palavering.</i>
persuade	Win approval or support for. <i>You can t persuade me to buy this ugly vase.</i>
prevail on	Use persuasion successfully.
sweet-talk	Influence or urge by gentle urging, caressing, or flattering.
talk into	Deliver a lecture or talk.
tempt	Dispose or incline or entice to. <i>Jobs which involve entertaining may tempt you to drink more than you intend.</i>
wheedle	Influence or urge by gentle urging, caressing, or flattering. <i>Please for my sake he wheedled.</i>
woo	Make amorous advances towards. <i>China is wooing Russia.</i>

Usage Examples of "Cajole" as a verb

- *She pleaded and cajoled as she tried to win his support.*
- *He hoped to cajole her into selling the house.*

Associations of "Cajole" (30 Words)

attract	Be attractive to. <i>I did not want to attract attention.</i>
bribe	A sum of money or other inducement offered or given to bribe someone. <i>Lawmakers were caught accepting bribes to bring in legalized gambling.</i>

<u>charm</u>	Induce into action by using one's charm. <i>She will charm your warts away.</i>
<u>coax</u>	Influence or urge by gentle urging, caressing, or flattering. <i>He was coaxing me to walk a bit further.</i>
<u>convince</u>	Persuade (someone) to do something. <i>Robert's expression had obviously convinced her of his innocence.</i>
corrupt	Corrupt morally or by intemperance or sensuality. <i>The corrupting smell of death.</i>
<u>deceptive</u>	Giving an appearance or impression different from the true one; misleading. <i>Deliberately deceptive packaging.</i>
<u>entice</u>	Provoke someone to do something through (often false or exaggerated) promises or persuasion. <i>A show which should entice a new audience into the theatre.</i>
fawning	Attempting to win favor from influential people by flattery. <i>Fawning adoration.</i>
<u>flattery</u>	Excessive or insincere praise. <i>She allowed no hint of flattery to enter her voice.</i>
fraudulent	Intended to deceive – S.T. Coleridge. <i>Fraudulent psychics.</i>
incorruptible	Not susceptible to corruption, especially by bribery. <i>Incorruptible judges are the backbone of the society.</i>
<u>induce</u>	Bring about or give rise to. <i>The pickets induced many workers to stay away.</i>
inducement	A bribe. <i>Inducement of sleep.</i>
ingratiate	Bring oneself into favour with someone by flattering or trying to please them. <i>A sycophantic attempt to ingratiate herself with the local aristocracy.</i>
ingratiating	Calculated to please or gain favor. <i>An ingratiating manner.</i>
inveigle	Persuade (someone) to do something by means of deception or flattery. <i>We cannot inveigle him into putting pen to paper.</i>
licensee	The holder of a licence, especially to sell alcoholic drinks.
<u>obsequious</u>	Attempting to win favor from influential people by flattery. <i>Obsequious shop assistants.</i>

persuadable	Being susceptible to persuasion. <i>They need to identify the most persuadable voters.</i>
persuade	(of a situation or event) provide a sound reason for (someone) to do something. <i>The cost of the manor s restoration persuaded them to take in guests.</i>
prompting	Persuasion formulated as a suggestion. <i>The audience could hear his prompting.</i>
relent	Abandon or mitigate a severe or harsh attitude, especially by finally yielding to a request. <i>The rain relented.</i>
salesmanship	The skills and methods used in selling or promoting commercial products. <i>He read a book on salesmanship but it didn t help.</i>
smarmy	Ingratiating and wheedling in a way that is regarded as insincere or excessive. <i>Smarmy self importance.</i>
suasion	Persuasion as opposed to force or compulsion. <i>The clearing banks found the use of both moral suasion and direct controls particularly irksome.</i>
tempt	Try to seduce. <i>The window displays tempted the shoppers.</i>
unreported	Not reported. <i>Many human rights abuses went unreported.</i>
venal	Capable of being corrupted. <i>A venal police officer.</i>
wheedle	Use flattery or coaxing in order to persuade someone to do something or give one something. <i>She had wheedled us into employing her brother.</i>
