## Calendar as a Noun

### Definitions of "Calendar" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “calendar” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A book in which to note daily appointments.*
- *A chart or series of pages showing the days, weeks, and months of a particular year, or giving particular seasonal information.*
- *A list or register of events (appointments or social events or court cases etc.*
- *A system by which the beginning, length, and subdivisions of the year are fixed.*
- *A system of timekeeping that defines the beginning and length and divisions of the year.*
- *A list of days or events of a specified kind.*
- *A tabular array of the days (usually for one year).*



## Synonyms of "Calendar" as a noun (11 Words)

- almanac** An annual publication including weather forecasts and other miscellaneous information arranged according to the calendar of a given year.
- annals** A chronological account of events in successive years.  
*Eighth century Northumberland **annals**.*
- archive** A complete record of the data in part or all of a computer system, stored on an infrequently used medium.  
*Source materials in local **archives**.*
- archives** Collection of records especially about an institution.
- diary** A book in which one keeps a daily record of events and experiences.  
*The City **Diary**.*



- history** A record or narrative description of past events.  
*The dawn of recorded **history**.*
- programme** A system of projects or services intended to meet a public need.  
*A theatre **programme**.*
- record** A thin plastic disc carrying recorded sound in grooves on each surface for reproduction by a record player.  
*The prostitute had a **record** a mile long.*
- register** A cashbox with an adding machine to register transactions used in shops to add up the bill.  
*It was reproduced in full colour but unfortunately out of **register**.*
- schedule** A plan for carrying out a process or procedure, giving lists of intended events and times.  
*They need a clear **schedule** of fixtures and fittings.*
- timetable** A schedule listing events and the times at which they will take place.  
*The acceleration of the **timetable** for monetary union.*



## Usage Examples of "Calendar" as a noun

- *I have you on my calendar for next Monday.*
- *The social calendar.*



## Associations of "Calendar" (30 Words)

- almanac** An annual publication containing tabular information in a particular field or fields arranged according to the calendar of a given year.
- annual** An annual plant.  
*Annual weeds.*
- annually** Once a year; every year.  
*Sales are increasing by about 17 **annually**.*
- biannual** Occurring twice a year.  
*The **biannual** meeting of the planning committee.*
- biennial** Botany a plant having a life cycle that normally takes two seasons from germination to death to complete flowering biennials usually bloom and fruit in the second season.  
*A **biennial** life cycle.*
- bimonthly** Every two months.  
*The magazine appears **bimonthly**.*

| <b>regularly</b>  | On a habitual basis; usually.<br><i>The person who <b>regularly</b> cuts your hair.</i>   |
| <b>schedule</b>   | Make a schedule plan the time and place for events.<br><i>I <b>scheduled</b> an exam for this afternoon.</i>                    |
| <b>semiannual</b> | Occurring or payable twice each year.   |
| <b>triennial</b>  | A visitation of an Anglican diocese by its bishop every three years.<br><i>The <b>triennial</b> meeting of the Association.</i> |
| <b>week</b>       | Hours or days of work in a calendar week.<br><i>I work during the <b>week</b> so I can only get to this shop on Saturdays.</i>  |
| <b>weekday</b>    | Any day except Sunday (and sometimes except Saturday).<br><i>The <b>weekday</b> rush hour.</i>                                  |

- weekend** Spend a weekend somewhere.  
*She spent the **weekend** camping.*
- weekly** Once a week.  
*Interviews were given **weekly**.*
- workweek** The total number of hours or days worked in a week.  
*We need a shorter **workweek** and protected benefits for contract workers.*
- year** The period of 365 days or 366 days in leap years starting from the first of January used for reckoning time in ordinary circumstances.  
*A Martian **year** takes 687 of our days.*
- yearly** Once a year or every year.  
*Annual or **yearly** income.*
