<u>affinity</u>	The force attracting atoms to each other and binding them together in a molecule. <i>The distinction between kinship and affinity is not always clear cut.</i>
<u>brotherhood</u>	A trade union. <i>The bonds of brotherhood.</i>
chumminess	The quality of affording easy familiarity and sociability.
<u>closeness</u>	The quality of affection or intimacy in a relationship. <i>The scoreline did not reflect the closeness of the contest.</i>
companionship	A feeling of fellowship or friendship. <i>The love and companionship of marriage.</i>
comradeliness	The quality of affording easy familiarity and sociability.
comradery	The quality of affording easy familiarity and sociability. <i>The project created a real sense of comradery among those involved.</i>

- comradeship** The quality of affording easy familiarity and sociability.
*His greatest joy came from **comradeship** with others in the team.*
- fellowship** A guild or corporation.
*They valued fun and good **fellowship** as the cement of the community.*
- friendship** The state of being friends (or friendly).
*Old ties of love and **friendship**.*
- good fellowship** Moral excellence or admirableness.
- sisterhood** The kinship relation between a female offspring and the siblings.
*Canadian feminists acknowledge their **sisterhood** with women around the globe.*
- solidarity** An independent trade union movement in Poland which developed into a mass campaign for political change and inspired popular opposition to Communist regimes across eastern Europe. Formed in 1980 under the leadership of Lech Wałęsa, it was banned in 1981 following the imposition of martial law. Legalized again in 1989, it won a majority in the elections of that year.
*Factory workers voiced **solidarity** with the striking students.*
- togetherness** Affectionate closeness.
*The sense of family **togetherness** was strong and excluded neighbours.*



Usage Examples of "Camaraderie" as a noun

- *The enforced camaraderie of office life.*



Associations of "Camaraderie" (30 Words)

- acquaintance** Acquaintances considered collectively.
*A wide circle of friends and **acquaintances**.*
- affinity** Kinship by marriage or adoption; not a blood relationship.
*Found a natural **affinity** with the immigrants.*
- amicability** Having a disposition characterized by warmth and friendliness.

brother	(Roman Catholic Church) a title given to a monk and used as form of address. <i>My brother still lives with our parents.</i>
brotherhood	The feeling of kinship with and closeness to a group of people or all people. <i>A gesture of solidarity and brotherhood.</i>
buddy	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>I m working on it buddy.</i>
classmate	A fellow member of a class at school, college, or university.
colleague	A person who is member of one's class or profession. <i>The surgeon consulted his colleagues.</i>
companion	Be a companion to somebody. <i>Fear became my constant companion.</i>
companionship	The state of being with someone. <i>The love and companionship of marriage.</i>
comrade	Used as a term of address for those male persons engaged in the same movement. <i>An old college comrade.</i>
comradeship	The company and friendship of others with common aims. <i>His greatest joy came from comradeship with others in the team.</i>
crony	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>He went gambling with his cronies.</i>
enjoy	Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i>I could never enjoy myself knowing you were in your room alone.</i>
fellow	An incorporated senior member of a college. <i>One eye was blue but its fellow was brown.</i>
folk	Relating to folk music. <i>A revival of interest in folk customs.</i>
fraternal	Like or characteristic of or befitting a brother. <i>Close fraternal ties.</i>
friend	Befriend someone. <i>She was unsure whether he was friend or foe.</i>
friendship	A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. <i>Old ties of love and friendship.</i>
grader	A pupil of a specified grade in a school. <i>A first grader.</i>

kinship	A sharing of characteristics or origins. <i>They felt a kinship with architects.</i>
kith	Your friends and acquaintances. <i>All his kith and kin.</i>
mate	South American tea like drink made from leaves of a South American holly called mate. <i>Birds mate in the Spring.</i>
neighbour	A person who lives (or is located) near another. <i>I chatted with my neighbour on the flight to New York.</i>
pal	A close friend who accompanies his buddies in their activities. <i>She palled up with some English chaps.</i>
partner	Be the partner of. <i>How you doing partner.</i>
relish	Make pleasant to the taste add relish to. <i>I have also a novel to relish my wine.</i>
reunion	A social gathering attended by members of a group of people who have not seen each other for some time. <i>She had a tearful reunion with her parents.</i>
socially	In a social manner. <i>A socially awkward teenager.</i>
workmate	A person with whom one works.
