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## Associations of "Came" (30 Words)

<b>again</b>	Another time; once more. <i>I never saw any signs but then <b>again</b> maybe I wasn't looking.</i>
<b>along</b>	In line with a length or direction (often followed by `by' or `beside). <i>The horse trotted <b>along</b> at a steady pace.</i>
<b>arrive</b>	Reach a destination arrive by movement or progress. <i>We will be in touch with them when the time <b>arrives</b>.</i>
<b><a href="#">back</a></b>	Travel backward. <i>The wind had <b>backed</b> to the north west.</i>
<b>backslide</b>	Drop to a lower level, as in one's morals or standards. <i>There are many things that can cause slimmers to <b>backslide</b>.</i>
<b>get</b>	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>You don't want to <b>get</b> into debt.</i>
<b><a href="#">here</a></b>	Being here now. <i>Sign <b>here</b>.</i>
<b>immigrate</b>	Migrate to a new environment. <i>An Australian who <b>immigrated</b> to Britain in 1982.</i>
<b>landing</b>	A place where people and goods can be landed from a boat. <i>The <b>landing</b> of men on the moon.</i>
<b>occur</b>	Exist or be found to be present in a place or under a particular set of conditions. <i>Sexism <b>occurs</b> in many workplaces.</i>
<b>reach</b>	Reach a point in time or a certain state or level. <i>Can he <b>reach</b>.</i>
<b>recover</b>	Get or find back recover the use of. <i>Neil is still <b>recovering</b> from shock.</i>
<b>recovery</b>	An object or amount of money recovered. <i>The brace is used as a <b>recovery</b> stroke to avoid capsizes.</i>

<b>recuperate</b>	Get over an illness or shock. <i>Recuperate</i> one's losses.
<b>recurring</b>	Coming back. <i>They are haunted by a recurring image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>
<b>reelect</b>	Elect again.
<b>regain</b>	Reach (a place, position, or thing) again; get back to. <i>She regained control of herself.</i>
<b>repay</b>	Make repayment for or return something. <i>Most of his fortune had been spent repaying creditors.</i>
<b>resilience</b>	The ability of a substance or object to spring back into shape; elasticity. <i>The often remarkable resilience of so many British institutions.</i>
<b>restitution</b>	Getting something back again. <i>The ANC had demanded the restitution of land seized from black people.</i>
<b>restoration</b>	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The restoration of capital punishment.</i>
<b>restore</b>	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>Restore law and order.</i>
<b>retrace</b>	To go back over again. <i>I wanted to retrace a particular evolutionary pathway.</i>
<b>retrieval</b>	(computer science) the operation of accessing information from the computer's memory. <i>Online information retrieval.</i>
<b>retrieve</b>	Reel or bring in a fishing line. <i>I was sent to retrieve the balls from his garden.</i>
<b>return</b>	A key pressed on a computer keyboard to simulate a carriage return in a word processing program or to indicate the end of a command or data string. <i>The tape is ready to despatch to you on return of the documents.</i>
<b>revert</b>	Go back to a previous state. <i>In the event of the building ceasing to become a school ownership would revert to the Church.</i>
<b>staircase</b>	A set of stairs and the rooms leading off it in a large building, especially a school or college. <i>He descended the broad staircase.</i>
<b>trace</b>	Discover traces of. <i>Through the binoculars I traced the path I had taken the night before.</i>
