again	Another time; once more. <i>I never saw any signs but then again maybe I wasn't looking.</i>
along	In line with a length or direction (often followed by `by' or `beside). <i>The horse trotted along at a steady pace.</i>
arrive	Reach a destination arrive by movement or progress. <i>We will be in touch with them when the time arrives.</i>
back	Travel backward. <i>The wind had backed to the north west.</i>
backslide	Drop to a lower level, as in one's morals or standards. <i>There are many things that can cause slimmers to backslide.</i>
get	Take vengeance on or get even. <i>You don't want to get into debt.</i>
here	Being here now. <i>Sign here.</i>
immigrate	Migrate to a new environment. <i>An Australian who immigrated to Britain in 1982.</i>
landing	A place where people and goods can be landed from a boat. <i>The landing of men on the moon.</i>
occur	Exist or be found to be present in a place or under a particular set of conditions. <i>Sexism occurs in many workplaces.</i>
reach	Reach a point in time or a certain state or level. <i>Can he reach.</i>
recover	Get or find back recover the use of. <i>Neil is still recovering from shock.</i>
recovery	An object or amount of money recovered. <i>The brace is used as a recovery stroke to avoid capsizes.</i>

recuperate	Get over an illness or shock. <i>Recuperate</i> one's losses.
recurring	Coming back. <i>They are haunted by a recurring image of their daughter on the night she died.</i>
reelect	Elect again.
regain	Reach (a place, position, or thing) again; get back to. <i>She regained control of herself.</i>
repay	Make repayment for or return something. <i>Most of his fortune had been spent repaying creditors.</i>
resilience	The ability of a substance or object to spring back into shape; elasticity. <i>The often remarkable resilience of so many British institutions.</i>
restitution	Getting something back again. <i>The ANC had demanded the restitution of land seized from black people.</i>
restoration	The restoration of the Bourbon monarchy in France in 1814 following the fall of Napoleon Louis XVIII was recalled from exile by Talleyrand. <i>The restoration of capital punishment.</i>
restore	Restore by replacing a part or putting together what is torn or broken. <i>Restore law and order.</i>
retrace	To go back over again. <i>I wanted to retrace a particular evolutionary pathway.</i>
retrieval	(computer science) the operation of accessing information from the computer's memory. <i>Online information retrieval.</i>
retrieve	Reel or bring in a fishing line. <i>I was sent to retrieve the balls from his garden.</i>
return	A key pressed on a computer keyboard to simulate a carriage return in a word processing program or to indicate the end of a command or data string. <i>The tape is ready to despatch to you on return of the documents.</i>
revert	Go back to a previous state. <i>In the event of the building ceasing to become a school ownership would revert to the Church.</i>
staircase	A set of stairs and the rooms leading off it in a large building, especially a school or college. <i>He descended the broad staircase.</i>
trace	Discover traces of. <i>Through the binoculars I traced the path I had taken the night before.</i>

The act of participating in an athletic competition involving running on a track.

*Follow the **track** to the farm.*
