- Attract; cause to be enamored.
- Attract and hold the interest and attention of; charm.





Synonyms of "Captivate" as a verb (19 Words)

allure	Powerfully attract or charm; tempt. Will sponsors really be allure d by such opportunities.
attract	Be attractive to. I was attract ed to the idea of working for a ballet company.
becharm	Attract; cause to be enamored.
beguile	Attract; cause to be enamored. To beguile some of the time they went to the cinema.
<u>beguiling</u>	Influence by slyness.
<u>bewitch</u>	Cast a spell over someone or something; put a hex on someone or something. A handsome prince who had been bewitch ed by a sorceress.
capture	Bring about the capture of an elementary particle or celestial body and causing it enter a new orbit. <i>This nucleus has captured the slow moving neutrons.</i>
catch	Discover or come upon accidentally suddenly or unexpectedly catch somebody doing something or in a certain state. <i>Catch fire.</i>



<u>charm</u>	Protect through supernatural powers or charms. The books have charm ed children the world over.
neunni	Take delight in. He delight s in his granddaughter.
enamor	Attract cause to be enamored.
onamour	Attract; cause to be enamored. She was truly enamour ed of New York.
	Put (someone or something) under a spell; bewitch. Marcia had enchant ed the rope so that it simply regenerated when any length was cut off.
enrapture	Give intense pleasure or joy to. Ruth was enrapture d by the sleeping child.
enthral	Capture the fascinated attention of. She had been so enthral led by the adventure that she had hardly noticed the cold.
<u>entrance</u>	Attract; cause to be enamored.
<u>fascinate</u>	Attract the strong attention and interest of (someone. <i>The serpent fascinates its prey.</i>
<u>lure</u>	Tempt (a person or animal) to do something or to go somewhere, especially by offering some form of reward. The child was lure d into a car but managed to escape.
<u>trance</u>	Put into a trance. She s been trance d and may need waking.







Usage Examples of "Captivate" as a verb

Associations of "Captivate" (30 Words)

allure	The quality of being powerfully and mysteriously attractive or fascinating. <i>Will sponsors really be allure</i> d by such opportunities.
attract	Be attractive to. <i>He hoped this strategy would attract foreign investment by multinationals.</i>
beguile	Influence by slyness. They were beguile d into signing a peace treaty.
<u>charisma</u>	A divinely conferred power or talent. He has tremendous charisma and stage presence.
<u>charm</u>	Protect through supernatural powers or charms. You re not going to charm me into changing my mind.



<u>coax</u>	A transmission line for high-frequency signals. The trainees were coax ed into doing boring work.
<u>decoy</u>	Lure or entrap with or as if with a decoy. We need a decoy to distract their attention.
delusive	Giving a false or misleading impression. <i>Delusive</i> expectations.
<u>enchant</u>	Hold spellbound. You have been enchant ed by some spirits.
<u>engage</u>	Engage or hire for work. He was engage d as a trainee copywriter.
<u>enthrall</u>	Hold spellbound.
<u>entice</u>	Attract or tempt by offering pleasure or advantage. A show which should entice a new audience into the theatre.
enticing	Attractive or tempting; alluring. An enticing prospect.
<u>entrance</u>	The right, means, or opportunity to enter somewhere or be a member of an institution, society, or other body. <i>At their abrupt entrance he rose to his feet.</i>
<u>fascinate</u>	Attract the strong attention and interest of (someone. <i>The snake charmer fascinates the cobra.</i>
glamorize	Make (something) seem glamorous or desirable, especially spuriously so. This new wallpaper really glamorize s the living room.
hypnotize	Induce hypnosis in. A witness had been hypnotize d to enhance his memory.
inducement	Act of bringing about a desired result. Companies were prepared to build only in return for massive inducement s.
<u>inviting</u>	Attractive and tempting. An inviting offer.
<u>lure</u>	Something used to lure fish or other animals into danger so they can be trapped or killed. <i>He</i> lure <i>d me into temptation</i> .
mesmerize	Attract strongly, as if with a magnet. They were mesmerize d by his story.
<u>seduction</u>	The action of seducing someone. The seduction s of the mainland.
<u>seductive</u>	Tempting and attractive; enticing. A seductive voice.



spellbind	Put into a trance. The singer held the audience spellbound.
<u>tempt</u>	Dispose or incline or entice to. He was tempt ed out of retirement to save the team from relegation.
tempter	A person who tempts others. Satan is the great tempter of mankind.
tempting	Highly attractive and able to arouse hope or desire. It is often tempting to bring about change rapidly.
trance	Put into a trance. The kind of trance he went into whenever illness was discussed.
wile	The use of tricks to deceive someone (usually to extract money from them. <i>She could be neither driven nor</i> wile <i>d into the parish kirk.</i>
