### Definitions of "Careless" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “careless” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Showing no interest or effort; casual.*
- *Without due thought or consideration.*
- *(of an action or its result) showing or caused by a lack of attention.*
- *Not concerned or worried about.*
- *Effortless and unstudied.*
- *Marked by lack of attention or consideration or forethought or thoroughness; not careful.*
- *Marked by lack of attention or consideration or forethought or thoroughness; not careful.*

- (usually followed by `of') without due thought or consideration.
- Not giving sufficient attention or thought to avoiding harm or errors.

<b>amateurish</b>	Lacking professional skill or expertise. <i>A very <b>amateurish</b> job.</i>
<b>apathetic about</b>	Showing little or no emotion or animation.
<b>apathetic towards</b>	Marked by a lack of interest.
<b>artless</b>	Without guile or deception. <i><b>Artless</b> sincerity.</i>
<b><u>casual</u></b>	Happening by chance; accidental. <i>A <b>casual</b> meeting.</i>
<b>casual about</b>	Characterized by a feeling of irresponsibility.
<b><u>disorganized</u></b>	Unable to plan one's activities efficiently. <i>A <b>disorganized</b> enterprise.</i>
<b>effortless</b>	Requiring no physical or mental exertion. <i>I went up the steps in two <b>effortless</b> bounds.</i>

<b>foolhardy</b>	Marked by defiant disregard for danger or consequences. <i><b>Foolhardy</b> enough to try to seize the gun from the hijacker.</i>
<b>heedless of</b>	Marked by or paying little heed or attention-Franklin D. Roosevelt.
<b>ill-advised</b>	Without careful prior deliberation or counsel.
<b>ill-considered</b>	Not given careful consideration.
<b>ill-thought-out</b>	Excluded from use or mention.
<b>improvident about</b>	Not provident; not providing for the future.
<b>inadvertent</b>	Not resulting from or achieved through deliberate planning. <i>He was pardoned for <b>inadvertent</b> manslaughter.</i>
<b>inattentive</b>	Showing a lack of attention or care. <i>I was disappointed by the food and the <b>inattentive</b> service.</i>
<b>incautious</b>	Carelessly failing to exercise proper caution. <i>An <b>incautious</b> remark.</i>
<b>indifferent to</b>	Neither too great nor too little.
<b>indiscreet</b>	Lacking discretion; injudicious. <i>They have been embarrassed by <b>indiscreet</b> friends.</i>
<b>informal</b>	Having or fostering a warm or friendly and informal atmosphere. <i>An <b>informal</b> free and easy manner.</i>
<u><b>insensitive</b></u>	Not responsive to physical stimuli. <i><b>Insensitive</b> to radiation.</i>
<b>insouciant</b>	Marked by blithe unconcern. <i>An utterly <b>insouciant</b> financial policy.</i>
<u><b>languid</b></u>	(of a person, manner, or gesture) having or showing a disinclination for physical exertion or effort. <i>A <b>languid</b> mood.</i>
<u><b>lax</b></u>	Of a speech sound especially a vowel pronounced with the vocal muscles relaxed. <i>Muscles have more potential energy when they are stretched than when they are <b>lax</b>.</i>
<u><b>leisurely</b></u>	Not hurried or forced. <i>A <b>leisurely</b> breakfast at our hotel.</i>
<b>misguided</b>	Having or showing faulty judgement or reasoning. <i>Well meaning but <b>misguided</b> teachers.</i>
<b>negligent</b>	Failing to take proper care over something. <i><b>Negligent</b> in his correspondence.</i>
<b>negligent in</b>	Characterized by neglect and undue lack of concern.

<b><u>nonchalant</u></b>	Marked by blithe unconcern. <i>Was polite in a teasing <b>nonchalant</b> manner.</i>
<b>nonchalant about</b>	Marked by blithe unconcern.
<b>oblivious to</b>	Failing to keep in mind.
<b>offhand about</b>	With little or no preparation or forethought.
<b>rash</b>	Imprudently incurring risk. <i>It would be extremely <b>rash</b> to make such an assumption.</i>
<b><u>regardless</u></b>	Without due thought or consideration. <i>Crushing the blooms with <b>regardless</b> tread.</i>
<b><u>remiss</u></b>	Failing in what duty requires. <i>It would be very <b>remiss</b> of me not to pass on that information.</i>
<b>scrappy</b>	Determined, argumentative, or pugnacious. <i>A <b>scrappy</b> admiral.</i>
<b><u>shoddy</u></b>	Cheap and shoddy Judith Crist. <i>A <b>shoddy</b> misuse of the honours system.</i>
<b>slack</b>	Not taut or held tightly in position; loose. <i><b>Slack</b> tides.</i>
<b>slapdash</b>	Marked by great carelessness. <i>He gave a <b>slapdash</b> performance.</i>
<b>slipshod</b>	Characterized by a lack of care, thought, or organization. <i>His <b>slipshod</b> heels.</i>
<b>slovenly</b>	(especially of a person or action) careless; excessively casual. <i><b>Slovenly</b> appearance.</i>
<b><u>thoughtless</u></b>	Showing lack of careful thought. <i>The debate turned into <b>thoughtless</b> bickering.</i>
<b>uncaring about</b>	On the move.
<b><u>unconcerned</u></b>	Showing a lack of worry or interest, especially when this is surprising or callous. <i>Scott seemed <b>unconcerned</b> by his companion's problem.</i>
<b>unconcerned about</b>	Not occupied or engaged with.
<b>unconsidered</b>	Without proper consideration or reflection. <i>I realize that my <b>unconsidered</b> remarks were dangerously indiscreet.</i>
<b>unguarded</b>	Displaying or feeling no wariness. <i>The museum was <b>unguarded</b> at night.</i>
<b>uninterested in</b>	Not having or showing interest.

<b>uninvolved in</b>	Currently fashionable.
<b>unstudied</b>	Not laboured or artificial; natural. <i>Is <b>unstudied</b> in Latin as he is in many other matters.</i>
<b>unthinking</b>	Without care or thought for others. <i>She was at pains to correct <b>unthinking</b> prejudices.</i>
<b><u>unwise</u></b>	Not appropriate to the purpose. <i>It is <b>unwise</b> to rely on hearsay evidence.</i>
<b>wild</b>	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <b>Wild</b> shouts.

<b>abandonment</b>	The action or fact of abandoning or being abandoned. <i>His <b>abandonment</b> of his wife and children left them penniless.</i>
<b><u>absentminded</u></b>	Lost in thought; showing preoccupation. <i>An <b>absentminded</b> professor.</i>
<b>carelessness</b>	The quality of not being careful or taking pains. <i>Most road accidents are caused by <b>carelessness</b> on the part of motorists.</i>
<b>cursorry</b>	Hasty and without attention to detail; not thorough. <i>A casual or <b>cursorry</b> inspection failed to reveal the house's structural flaws.</i>
<b><u>haste</u></b>	Excessive speed or urgency of movement or action; hurry. <i>Working with feverish <b>haste</b>.</i>
<b>hasty</b>	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare- Arthur Geddes. <i>Rejected what was regarded as an over<b>hasty</b> plan for reconversion.</i>

<b>headlong</b>	In a rush; with reckless haste. <i>He fell <b>headlong</b> in love with his cousin.</i>
<b>heedless</b>	Marked by or paying little heed or attention-Franklin D. Roosevelt. <i>Elaine she shouted <b>heedless</b> of attracting unwanted attention.</i>
<b>hurried</b>	Moving rapidly or performed quickly or in great haste. <i>A <b>hurried</b> job.</i>
<b>inadvertent</b>	Not resulting from or achieved through deliberate planning. <i>An <b>inadvertent</b> administrative error occurred that resulted in an overpayment.</i>
<b>inattention</b>	Lack of attention. <i>His <b>inattention</b> to duty.</i>
<b>inattentive</b>	Not paying attention to something. <i>A particularly dull and <b>inattentive</b> pupil.</i>
<b><u>inconsiderate</u></b>	Thoughtlessly causing hurt or inconvenience to others. <i>Slovenly <b>inconsiderate</b> reasoning.</i>
<b>indifference</b>	Unimportance. <i>It cannot be regarded as a matter of <b>indifference</b>.</i>
<b><u>lax</u></b>	Of a speech sound especially a vowel pronounced with the vocal muscles relaxed. <i>The merger of tense and <b>lax</b> vowels before l.</i>
<b><u>negligence</u></b>	Breach of a duty of care which results in damage. <i>His injury was due to the <b>negligence</b> of his employers.</i>
<b>negligent</b>	Failing to take proper care over something. <i><b>Negligent</b> of detail.</i>
<b>overhasty</b>	Done with very great haste and without due deliberation- Shakespeare-Arthur Geddes. <i>Rejected what was regarded as an <b>overhasty</b> plan for reconversion.</i>
<b><u>perfunctory</u></b>	(of an action) carried out without real interest, feeling, or effort. <i><b>Perfunctory</b> courtesy.</i>
<b>rashly</b>	In a hasty and foolhardy manner. <i>He <b>rashly</b> promised crime would fall sharply by September.</i>
<b><u>reckless</u></b>	Characterized by careless unconcern. <i>A <b>reckless</b> driver.</i>
<b><u>remiss</u></b>	Failing in what duty requires. <i>It would be very <b>remiss</b> of me not to pass on that information.</i>
<b>rush</b>	Cause to move fast or to rush or race. <i>Shoppers <b>rushed</b> to buy computers.</i>

<b>rushed</b>	Done under pressure. <i>A <b>rushed</b> job.</i>
<b>slapdash</b>	Directly. <i><b>Slapdash</b> work.</i>
<b>slipshod</b>	Marked by great carelessness. <i><b>Slipshod</b> spelling.</i>
<u>sloppy</u>	(of semi-fluid matter) containing too much liquid; watery. <i>Do not make the concrete too <b>sloppy</b>.</i>
<b>unconcern</b>	A lack of worry or interest, especially when surprising or callous. <i>He is famed for his laid back attitude his apparent <b>unconcern</b> about his actions.</i>
<u>unconcerned</u>	Lacking in interest or care or feeling. <i>Readers <b>unconcerned</b> with style.</i>
<b>unwary</b>	Not alert to danger or deception. <i>The shrieks of <b>unwary</b> animals taken by surprise.</i>
