### Synonyms of "Carousing" as an adjective (4 Words)

<b>bacchanal</b>	Used of riotously drunken merrymaking. <i>A night of <b>bacchanalian</b> revelry.</i>
<b>bacchanalian</b>	Characterized by or given to drunken revelry. <i>A <b>bacchanalian</b> orgy.</i>
<b>bacchic</b>	Used of riotously drunken merrymaking.
<b>orgiastic</b>	Used of riotously drunken merrymaking. <i><b>Orgiastic</b> festivity.</i>

## Associations of "Carousing" (30 Words)

<b>alcohol</b>	A liquor or brew containing alcohol as the active agent. <i>He has not taken <b>alcohol</b> in twenty five years.</i>
<b>alcoholic</b>	Suffering from alcoholism. <i><b>Alcoholic</b> liquor.</i>
<b>beer</b>	An alcoholic drink made from yeast-fermented malt flavoured with hops. <i>A <b>beer</b> bottle.</i>
<b>bibulous</b>	Given to or marked by the consumption of alcohol. <i>A <b>bibulous</b> fellow.</i>
<b>carousal</b>	Revelry in drinking; a merry drinking party.
<b>cocktail</b>	An alcoholic drink consisting of a spirit or spirits mixed with other ingredients, such as fruit juice or cream. <i>A <b>cocktail</b> bar.</i>
<b>distiller</b>	A person or company that manufactures spirits. <i>A family owned whisky <b>distiller</b>.</i>
<b>drink</b>	Drink excessive amounts of alcohol be an alcoholic. <i>Likes a <b>drink</b> before dinner.</i>
<b>drinker</b>	A container from which an animal can drink. <i>Coffee <b>drinkers</b>.</i>
<b>drunken</b>	Habitually or frequently drunk. <i>His violent <b>drunken</b> father.</i>
<b>gin</b>	Separate the seeds from cotton with a cotton gin. <i><b>Gin</b> game.</i>
<b>gulp</b>	An act of gulping food or drink. <i>He <b>gulled</b> down the last of his coffee.</i>
<b>inebriate</b>	A chronic drinker. <i>He was <b>inebriated</b> by his phenomenal success.</i>
<b>inebriated</b>	Stupefied or excited by a chemical substance (especially alcohol). <i>Helplessly <b>inebriated</b>.</i>
<b>inebriety</b>	Drunkenness, especially habitual; intoxication. <i>The ravages of <b>inebriety</b>.</i>
<b>intoxicant</b>	A liquor or brew containing alcohol as the active agent. <i><b>Intoxicants</b> and drugs are used by some to escape physical or psychological pain.</i>

<b>intoxicate</b>	(of alcoholic drink or a drug) cause (someone) to lose control of their faculties or behaviour. <i>Van Gogh went to Provence where he was <b>intoxicated</b> by the Mediterranean sunlight.</i>
<b>liqueur</b>	A chocolate with a liqueur filling. <i>An Italian almond flavoured <b>liqueur</b>.</i>
<b>liquor</b>	Alcoholic drink, especially distilled spirits. <i>Waste <b>liquors</b>.</i>
<b>revel</b>	Enjoy oneself in a lively and noisy way, especially with drinking and dancing. <i>Bill said he was secretly <b>revelling</b> in his new found fame.</i>
<b>reveler</b>	A celebrant who shares in a noisy party. <i>The clubs attract <b>revelers</b> as young as thirteen.</i>
<b>revelry</b>	Unrestrained merrymaking. <i>Sounds of <b>revelry</b> issued into the night.</i>
<b>sip</b>	Drink in sips. <i>She <b>sipped</b> at her tea.</i>
<b>sober</b>	Cause to become sober. <i>After thinking about the potential consequences of his plan he <b>sobered</b> up.</i>
<b>spree</b>	Take part in a spree. <i>They don't want work they're too busy <b>spreeing</b>.</i>
<b>tipple</b>	A serving of drink (usually alcoholic) drawn from a keg. <i>Those who liked to <b>tipple</b> and gamble.</i>
<b>tipsy</b>	Slightly drunk. <i><b>Tipsy</b> revellers.</i>
