bacchanal	Used of riotously drunken merrymaking. <i>A night of bacchanalian revelry.</i>
bacchanalian	Characterized by or given to drunken revelry. <i>A bacchanalian orgy.</i>
bacchic	Used of riotously drunken merrymaking.
orgiastic	Used of riotously drunken merrymaking. <i>Orgiastic festivity.</i>

alcohol	A liquor or brew containing alcohol as the active agent. <i>He has not taken alcohol in twenty five years.</i>
alcoholic	Suffering from alcoholism. <i>Alcoholic liquor.</i>
beer	An alcoholic drink made from yeast-fermented malt flavoured with hops. <i>A beer bottle.</i>
bibulous	Given to or marked by the consumption of alcohol. <i>A bibulous fellow.</i>
carousal	Revelry in drinking; a merry drinking party.
cocktail	An alcoholic drink consisting of a spirit or spirits mixed with other ingredients, such as fruit juice or cream. <i>A cocktail bar.</i>
distiller	A person or company that manufactures spirits. <i>A family owned whisky distiller.</i>
drink	Drink excessive amounts of alcohol be an alcoholic. <i>Likes a drink before dinner.</i>
drinker	A container from which an animal can drink. <i>Coffee drinkers.</i>
drunken	Habitually or frequently drunk. <i>His violent drunken father.</i>
gin	Separate the seeds from cotton with a cotton gin. <i>Gin game.</i>
gulp	An act of gulping food or drink. <i>He gulped down the last of his coffee.</i>
inebriate	A chronic drinker. <i>He was inebriated by his phenomenal success.</i>
inebriated	Stupefied or excited by a chemical substance (especially alcohol). <i>Helplessly inebriated.</i>
inebriety	Drunkenness, especially habitual; intoxication. <i>The ravages of inebriety.</i>
intoxicant	A liquor or brew containing alcohol as the active agent. <i>Intoxicants and drugs are used by some to escape physical or psychological pain.</i>

intoxicate	(of alcoholic drink or a drug) cause (someone) to lose control of their faculties or behaviour. <i>Van Gogh went to Provence where he was intoxicated by the Mediterranean sunlight.</i>
liqueur	A chocolate with a liqueur filling. <i>An Italian almond flavoured liqueur.</i>
liquor	Alcoholic drink, especially distilled spirits. <i>Waste liquors.</i>
revel	Enjoy oneself in a lively and noisy way, especially with drinking and dancing. <i>Bill said he was secretly revelling in his new found fame.</i>
reveler	A celebrant who shares in a noisy party. <i>The clubs attract revelers as young as thirteen.</i>
revelry	Unrestrained merrymaking. <i>Sounds of revelry issued into the night.</i>
sip	Drink in sips. <i>She sipped at her tea.</i>
sober	Cause to become sober. <i>After thinking about the potential consequences of his plan he sobered up.</i>
spree	Take part in a spree. <i>They don't want work they're too busy spreeing.</i>
tipple	A serving of drink (usually alcoholic) drawn from a keg. <i>Those who liked to tipple and gamble.</i>
tipsy	Slightly drunk. <i>Tipsy revellers.</i>
