<b>assets</b>	Anything of material value or usefulness that is owned by a person or company.
<b>capital</b>	The federal government of the United States. <i>Rates of return on invested <b>capital</b> were high.</i>
<b><u>currency</u></b>	The metal or paper medium of exchange that is presently used. <i>The <b>currency</b> of a slang term.</i>
<b>finance</b>	The branch of economics that studies the management of money and other assets. <i>The clearing banks are important sources of <b>finance</b>.</i>
<b>funds</b>	Assets in the form of money.
<b>investment capital</b>	The act of investing; laying out money or capital in an enterprise with the expectation of profit.
<b>john cash</b>	United States country music singer and songwriter (1932-2003).

<b>johnny cash</b>	Prompt payment for goods or services in currency or by check.
<b>means</b>	An action or system by which a result is achieved; a method. <i>Technology seen as a <b>means</b> to bring about emancipation.</i>
<b>money</b>	Wealth reckoned in terms of money. <i>The main aim of a commercial organization is to make <b>money</b>.</i>
<b>ready cash</b>	Poised for action.
<b>ready money</b>	Poised for action.
<b>resources</b>	Available source of wealth; a new or reserve supply that can be drawn upon when needed. <i>A man of resource.</i>
<b><u>wherewithal</u></b>	The necessary means (especially financial means). <i>They lacked the <b>wherewithal</b> to pay.</i>

## Cash as a Verb

### Definitions of "Cash" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "cash" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Give or obtain notes or coins for (a cheque or money order).*
- *Lead (a high card) so as to take the opportunity to win a trick.*

- *Exchange for cash.*



### Synonyms of "Cash" as a verb (10 Words)

<b>cash in</b>	Exchange for cash.
<b>change</b>	Exchange a sum of money for the same sum in a different currency or denomination. <i>She <b>changed</b> completely as she grew older.</i>
<b>convert into cash</b>	Score an extra point or points after touchdown by kicking the ball through the uprights or advancing the ball into the end zone.
<b>convert into money</b>	Exchange a penalty for a less severe one.
<b>encash</b>	Convert (a cheque, money order, bond, etc.) into money. <i>After the payment of one year s contribution you may <b>encash</b> your bond at any time.</i>

**exchange** Exchange or replace with another usually of the same kind or category.

*He **exchanged** a concerned glance with Stephen.*

**liquidate** Wind up the affairs of (a business) by ascertaining liabilities and apportioning assets.

*I had to **liquidate** my holdings to pay off my ex husband.*

**realize** Achieve (something desired or anticipated); fulfil.

*He **realized** his mistake at once.*

**turn into cash** Accomplish by rotating.

**turn into money** Direct at someone.



## Usage Examples of "Cash" as a verb

- *I cashed the check as soon as it arrived in the mail.*
- *South cashed the ace, king, and queen of clubs.*
- *The bank cashed her cheque.*



## Associations of "Cash" (30 Words)

<b>annuitant</b>	The recipient of an annuity.
<b>bill</b>	A poster or handbill. <i>He had been <b>billed</b> 3 000 for his licence.</i>
<b><u>consumer</u></b>	A person or thing that eats or uses something. <i>Recession hit <b>consumers</b> are being lured by cheap prices.</i>
<b>cost</b>	The effort, loss, or sacrifice necessary to achieve or obtain something. <i>Healthcare <b>costs</b>.</i>
<b>cutback</b>	An act or instance of reducing something, especially expenditure. <i><b>Cutbacks</b> in defence spending.</i>
<b><u>deposit</u></b>	The natural process of laying down a deposit of something. <i>Beds where salt is <b>deposited</b> by the tide.</i>
<b>disbursement</b>	The act of spending or disbursing money. <i>They established a committee to supervise the <b>disbursement</b> of aid.</i>

<b>earnings</b>	Something that remunerates. <i>They saved a quarter of all their <b>earnings</b>.</i>
<b>emolument</b>	Compensation received by virtue of holding an office or having employment (usually in the form of wages or fees). <i>A clause in the U S constitution prevents sitting legislators from receiving <b>emoluments</b> from their own votes.</i>
<u><b>expenditure</b></u>	The use of energy, time, or other resources. <i>Cuts in public <b>expenditure</b>.</i>
<b>expense</b>	Offset an item of expenditure as an expense against taxable income. <i>His hotel and travel <b>expenses</b>.</i>
<b>honorarium</b>	A fee paid for a nominally free service.
<u><b>income</b></u>	The financial gain (earned or unearned) accruing over a given period of time. <i>He has a nice home and an adequate <b>income</b>.</i>
<b>outlay</b>	The act of spending or disbursing money. <i>A modest <b>outlay</b> on local advertising.</i>
<b>payment</b>	An amount paid or payable. <i>Three interest free monthly <b>payments</b>.</i>
<b>rates</b>	A local tax on property (usually used in the plural).
<u><b>receipt</b></u>	Report the receipt of. <i>Box office <b>receipts</b>.</i>
<b>refund</b>	Pay back money to. <i>If you re not delighted with your purchase we guarantee to <b>refund</b> your money in full.</i>
<b>reimbursement</b>	A sum paid to cover money that has been spent or lost. <i><b>Reimbursement</b> of everyday medical costs.</i>
<b>remuneration</b>	The act of paying for goods or services or to recompense for losses. <i>Adequate <b>remuneration</b> for his work.</i>
<u><b>reparation</b></u>	(usually plural) compensation exacted from a defeated nation by the victors. <i>The old hall was pulled down to avoid the cost of <b>reparation</b>.</i>
<b>repayment</b>	The action of paying back a loan. <i>Minimum monthly <b>repayments</b>.</i>
<u><b>revenue</b></u>	The department of the civil service collecting state revenue. <i>His priority was to raise government <b>revenue</b> and to lower expenditure.</i>
<b>reward</b>	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>The engineer who supervised the work was <b>rewarded</b> with the MBE.</i>



<b>spending</b>	The act of spending or disbursing money.
<b>spendthrift</b>	A person who spends money in an extravagant, irresponsible way. <i>Putt was a <b>spendthrift</b> and a heavy gambler.</i>
<b>spree</b>	Take part in a spree. <i>A shopping <b>spree</b>.</i>
<b>taxation</b>	Government income due to taxation. <i>A <b>taxation</b> system.</i>
<b>vat</b>	Place or treat in a vat. <i>A <b>vat</b> of hot tar.</i>
<b>wage</b>	Carry on (a war or campaign). <i>An income of less than half the average <b>wage</b>.</i>
