Associations of "Cast out" (30 Words)

<u>aside</u>	A remark not intended to be heard by everyone present. <i>Does that make him a murderer whispered Alice in an aside to Fred.</i>
<u>astray</u>	Away from the correct path or direction. <i>We went astray but a man redirected us.</i>
<u>away</u>	Out of the way especially away from one's thoughts. <i>The Museum has shifted its emphasis away from research towards exhibitions.</i>
beggar	Reduce to beggary. <i>This beggars description.</i>
<u>deviate</u>	A person whose behavior deviates from what is acceptable especially in sexual behavior. <i>You must not deviate from the agreed route.</i>
<u>digress</u>	Leave the main subject temporarily in speech or writing. <i>Don't digress when you give a lecture.</i>
divagation	A message that departs from the main subject.
<u>drift</u>	Be subject to fluctuation. <i>Sand drifting like snow.</i>
err	To make a mistake or be incorrect. <i>The judge had erred in ruling that the evidence was inadmissible.</i>
excursive	Tending to depart from the main point or cover a wide range of subjects. <i>His excursive remarks.</i>
<u>exhale</u>	Give off (vapour or fumes). <i>The chimney exhales a thick smoke.</i>
gad	An anxiety disorder characterized by chronic free-floating anxiety and such symptoms as tension or sweating or trembling or lightheadedness or irritability etc that has lasted for more than six months. <i>He had heard that I was gadding about with an airline stewardess.</i>

going	Advancing toward a goal. <i>The going was ideal here with short turf and a level surface.</i>
hurl	A ride in a vehicle; a lift. <i>He hurled himself into the job with enthusiasm.</i>
hurtle	Throw forcefully. <i>The trucks hurtled them through the grassland to the construction sites.</i>
isolated	Marked by separation of or from usually contiguous elements. <i>Isolated instances of rebellion.</i>
itinerant	A person who travels from place to place. <i>Itinerant labor.</i>
lunge	An exercise or gymnastic movement resembling the lunge of a fencer. <i>Billy lunged his spear at the fish.</i>
ramble	Continue talking or writing in a desultory manner. <i>As a boy I rambled the fells around Dent.</i>
rambling	Spreading out in different directions or distributed irregularly. <i>A rambling man.</i>
roam	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. <i>He let his mind roam as he walked.</i>
rove	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. <i>A new exhibit will electrify campuses on its national rove.</i>
sidetrack	A well or borehole which runs partly to one side of the original line of drilling. <i>His monologue launches into too many rambling sidetracks.</i>
stray	A stray person or thing especially a domestic animal. <i>A few stray crumbs.</i>
throw	An act of throwing one's opponent in wrestling judo or a similar sport. <i>Occasionally a small child will throw a tantrum when denied something.</i>
truant	Of a pupil being a truant. <i>If my daughter had been truanting from school I would have been informed.</i>
vagabond	Anything that resembles a vagabond in having no fixed place. <i>Pirate ships were vagabonds of the sea.</i>
wander	An act or instance of wandering. <i>His attention had wandered.</i>
