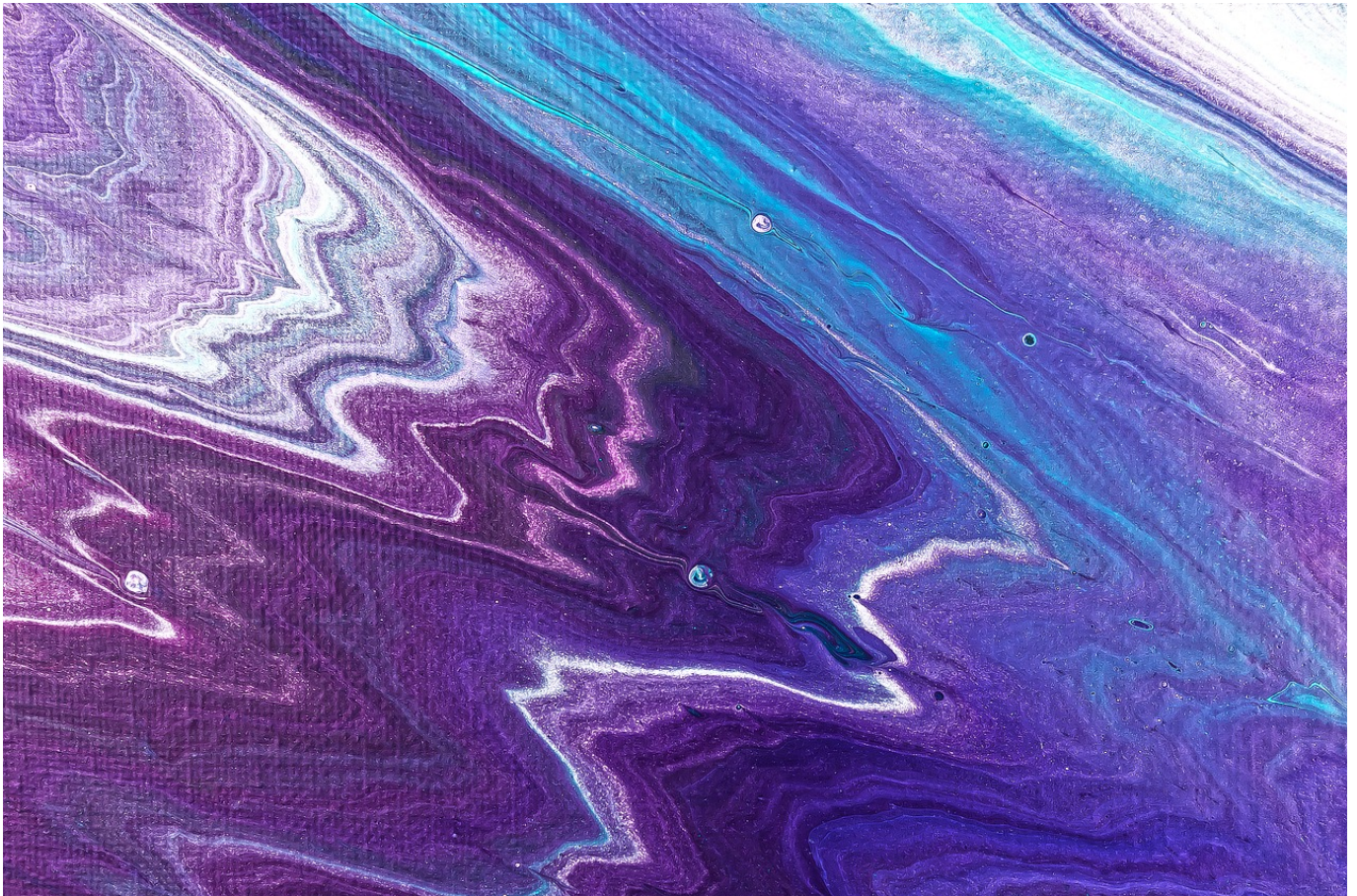

<b>nomadic</b>	Migratory. <i>The <b>nomadic</b> habits of the Bedouins.</i>
<b>ramble</b>	Continue talking or writing in a desultory manner. <i>This novel <b>rambles</b> on and jogs.</i>
<b><u>rambling</u></b>	Of a path e.g. <i>A <b>rambling</b> speech about this and that.</i>
<b>roam</b>	(of a person's mind or thoughts) drift along without dwelling on anything in particular. <i>Tigers once <b>roamed</b> over most of Asia.</i>
<b>rove</b>	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. <i>The policeman s eyes <b>roved</b> around the pub.</i>
<b>rudderless</b>	Lacking a clear sense of one's aims or principles. <i>Today s leadership is <b>rudderless</b>.</i>
<b><u>stray</u></b>	An animal that has strayed especially a domestic animal. <i>He pushed a few <b>stray</b> hairs from her face.</i>
<b>throw</b>	Throw a die out onto a flat surface. <i>I can <b>throw</b> my voice I could make a fortune as a medium.</i>
<b>truant</b>	Of a pupil being a truant. <i>If my daughter had been <b>truanting</b> from school I would have been informed.</i>
<b>trudge</b>	Walk slowly and with heavy steps, typically because of exhaustion or harsh conditions. <i>She <b>trudged</b> through blinding snow.</i>
<b>undirected</b>	Lacking direction; without a particular aim, purpose, or target. <i>She was full of ineffectual <b>undirected</b> anger.</i>

**vagabond** Anything that resembles a vagabond in having no fixed place.  
*He went **vagabonding** about the world.*

**vagrant** Relating to or living the life of a vagrant.  
***Vagrant** whales.*

**wander** An act or instance of wandering.  
*I **wandered** through the narrow streets.*

**wanderer** A computer program that prowls the internet looking for publicly accessible resources that can be added to a database; the database can then be searched with a search engine.  
*He is a longtime seaman a rootless **wanderer**.*

**wandering** Of a path e.g.  
*His life followed a **wandering** course.*
