### Definitions of "Castle" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “castle” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A large building formerly occupied by a ruler and fortified against attack.*
- *A large and stately mansion.*
- *The piece that can move any number of unoccupied squares in a direction parallel to the sides of the chessboard.*
- *A magnificent and imposing old mansion.*
- *(chess) the piece that can move any number of unoccupied squares in a direction parallel to the sides of the chessboard.*
- *Interchanging the positions of the king and a rook.*
- *A large building, typically of the medieval period, fortified against attack with thick walls, battlements, towers, and in many cases a moat.*



## Synonyms of "Castle" as a noun (19 Words)

<b>castling</b>	Interchanging the positions of the king and a rook. <i><b>Castling</b> is more frequently a defensive than an attacking move.</i>
<b>chateau</b>	An impressive country house (or castle) in France. <i>Château Margaux.</i>
<b>citadel</b>	A meeting hall of the Salvation Army. <i><b>Citadels</b> of private economic power.</i>
<b>country house</b>	A politically organized body of people under a single government.
<b>donjon</b>	The main tower within the walls of a medieval castle or fortress.
<b>fastness</b>	A strongly fortified defensive structure. <i>A remote Himalayan mountain <b>fastness</b>.</i>
<b>fort</b>	A fortified defensive structure. <i>The city was guarded by a ring of <b>forts</b>.</i>
<b>fortification</b>	Defensive structure consisting of walls or mounds built around a stronghold to strengthen it. <i>A medieval <b>fortification</b>.</i>
<b>fortress</b>	A person or thing not susceptible to outside influence or disturbance. <i>He had proved himself to be a <b>fortress</b> of moral rectitude.</i>
<b>hall</b>	A large and imposing house. <i>Pool <b>hall</b>.</i>
<b>keep</b>	The strongest or central tower of a castle, acting as a final refuge. <i>The Society are paying for your <b>keep</b>.</i>
<b>manor</b>	The landed estate of a lord (including the house on it). <i>A Tudor <b>manor</b> house in the English countryside.</i>
<b>manor house</b>	The landed estate of a lord (including the house on it).

- mansion** A terrace or mansion block.  
*Carlyle **Mansions**.*
- palace** The governing group of a kingdom.  
*The **palace** issued an order binding on all subjects.*
- peel** An act of exfoliating dead skin in the cosmetic treatment of microdermabrasion.  
*Pieces of potato **peel**.*
- rook** (chess) the piece that can move any number of unoccupied squares in a direction parallel to the sides of the chessboard.
- stronghold** A place where a particular cause or belief is strongly defended or upheld.  
*A Labour **stronghold**.*
- tower** Anything that approximates the shape of a column or tower.  
*A CD **tower**.*

**cantonment** Temporary living quarters specially built by the army for soldiers.

<b><u>citadel</u></b>	A stronghold into which people could go for shelter during a battle. <i><b>Citadels</b> of private economic power.</i>
<b>diadem</b>	The authority or dignity symbolized by a crown. <i>He refused the <b>diadem</b> of all the Caesars.</i>
<b><u>emperor</u></b>	Large richly colored butterfly. <i>He became <b>emperor</b> in 1930.</i>
<b><u>empire</u></b>	A group of countries under a single authority. <i>The British created a great <b>empire</b>.</i>
<b><u>fort</u></b>	Station troops in a fort. <i>The city was guarded by a ring of <b>forts</b>.</i>
<b><u>fortress</u></b>	A military stronghold, especially a strongly fortified town. <i>He had proved himself to be a <b>fortress</b> of moral rectitude.</i>
<b><u>frontier</u></b>	An international boundary or the area (often fortified) immediately inside the boundary. <i>His novel of the American <b>frontier</b>.</i>
<b>garrison</b>	The building occupied by a garrison. <i>Forces from these <b>garrisons</b> have been used against governments.</i>
<b><u>imperial</u></b>	Belonging to or befitting a supreme ruler. <i>Golden age of <b>imperial</b> splendor.</i>
<b><u>kingdom</u></b>	A monarchy with a king or queen as head of state. <i>The <b>kingdom</b> of dreams.</i>
<b>legionary</b>	Of an ancient Roman legion. <i>The <b>legionary</b> fortress of Isca.</i>
<b>majestically</b>	In a majestic manner. <i>The steep slopes of the valley floor rise <b>majestically</b> skywards.</i>
<b>medieval</b>	As if belonging to the Middle Ages; old-fashioned and unenlightened. <i>Without other people around I would let my flat degenerate into <b>medieval</b> levels of squalor.</i>
<b><u>noble</u></b>	Especially in former times a person of noble rank or birth. <i>A <b>noble</b> gas such as helium or neon.</i>
<b>outpost</b>	A station in a remote or sparsely populated location. <i>A few scattered <b>outposts</b> along the west coast.</i>
<b><u>palace</u></b>	A large, splendid house or place of entertainment. <i>The royal <b>palace</b>.</i>
<b>pope</b>	The head of the Roman Catholic Church.
<b><u>protector</u></b>	A person who cares for persons or property. <i>A man who became her <b>protector</b> adviser and friend.</i>

<b>royal</b>	A sail set next above the topgallant on a royal mast. <i>The coalition obtained <b>royal</b> approval for the appointment.</i>
<b>siege</b>	A military operation in which enemy forces surround a town or building, cutting off essential supplies, with the aim of compelling those inside to surrender. <i>There is a <b>siege</b> of herons at the river.</i>
<b>sortie</b>	An attempt to participate in a new activity or sphere. <i>We ll soon know if they <b>sortie</b>.</i>
<b>stockade</b>	Surround with a stockade in order to fortify. <i>They built <b>stockades</b> around their towns.</i>
<b>stronghold</b>	A strongly fortified defensive structure. <i>A Labour <b>stronghold</b>.</i>
<b>temple</b>	A thing regarded as holy or likened to a temple especially a person s body. <i>The veins in his <b>temple</b> throbbed.</i>
<b>ukase</b>	An edict of the Russian tsar. <i>He was defying the publisher in the very building from which he had issued his <b>ukase</b>.</i>
<b>warrior</b>	(especially in former times) a brave or experienced soldier or fighter. <i>I really love the <b>warrior</b> pose it makes me feel centred and strong.</i>
