biochemical	A biochemical substance.
catalyst	A person or thing that precipitates an event. The invasion acted as a catalyst to unite the country.
elate	In high spirits; exultant or proud. Their elate and animated faces.



encourage	Contribute to the progress or growth of. <i>Pupils are encouraged to be creative</i> .
<u>enliven</u>	Make (something) more entertaining, interesting, or appealing. The visit had clearly enliven ed my mother.
<u>exhort</u>	Force or impel in an indicated direction. Come on you guys exhort ed Linda.
<u>experimentation</u>	The action or process of trying out new ideas, methods, or activities. <i>Experimentation</i> on the brain and the nerves.
facilitative	Freeing from difficulty or impediment. <i>Facilitative</i> changes in the economic structure.
hearten	Give encouragement to. She was hearten ed to observe that the effect was faintly comic.
<u>incite</u>	Give an incentive for action. <i>He</i> incite d loyal subjects to rebellion.
inflame	Become inflamed get sore. <i>His throat inflamed</i> .
influence	Shape or influence give direction to. Used her parents influence to get the job.
infuse	(of tea, herbs, etc.) release flavour or healing properties while being soaked. Some physiologists infuse s sugar solutions into the veins of animals.
inspire	Fill with revolutionary ideas. Their past record does not inspire confidence.
<u>inspiring</u>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. <i>The scenery is not very inspiring</i> .
<u>instigate</u>	Incite someone to do something, especially something bad. They instigate d a reign of terror.
<u>instill</u>	Produce or try to produce a vivid impression of. Her presence instill ed faith into the children.
<u>invigorate</u>	Impart vigor, strength, or vitality to. The cold water invigorate d him.
<u>invoke</u>	Summon into action or bring into existence, often as if by magic. The antiquated defence of insanity is rarely invoke d in England.
<u>motivate</u>	Give an incentive for action. <i>He was primarily motivated by the desire for profit.</i>
motivation	Desire or willingness to do something; enthusiasm. <i>Keep staff up to date and maintain interest and motivation.</i>



provocation	Action or speech held to be likely to prompt physical retaliation. <i>Twenty patients had a high increase of serum gastrin after</i> provocation <i>with secretin.</i>
<u>provoke</u>	Evoke or provoke to appear or occur. The decision provoke d a storm of protest from civil rights organizations.
spur	Strike with a spur. <i>Spur</i> horses.
stimulate	Stir the feelings, emotions, or peace of. The women are given fertility drugs to stimulate their ovaries.
stimulating	Making lively and cheerful. A rich and stimulating working environment.
stimulation	The action of arousing interest, enthusiasm, or excitement. Lack of intellectual stimulation .
<u>titillate</u>	Touch (a body part) lightly so as to excite the surface nerves and cause uneasiness, laughter, or spasmodic movements. <i>The press are paid to titillate the public.</i>
urge	Encourage someone to continue or succeed. <i>He urged her to come and stay with us.</i>
