lyrical	Suitable for or suggestive of singing. <i>The lyrical content of his songs.</i>
madden	Cause to go crazy; cause to lose one's mind. <i>His behavior is maddening.</i>
maladjustment	The condition of being unable to adapt properly to your environment with resulting emotional instability. <i>Children of parents with chronic illness are at risk of psychological maladjustment.</i>
mawkish	Effusively or insincerely emotional. <i>The mawkish smell of warm beer.</i>
mental	Relating to the mind. <i>A quick mental calculation.</i>
moody	Giving an impression of melancholy or mystery. <i>His moody adolescent brother.</i>
pathos	A style that has the power to evoke feelings. <i>The actor injects his customary humour and pathos into the role.</i>
psychic	The study of psychic phenomena. <i>Psychic energy.</i>
psychological	Of or relating to or determined by psychology. <i>Psychological research.</i>
psychologist	A scientist trained in psychology. <i>A sports psychologist.</i>
psychology	The mental characteristics or attitude of a person or group. <i>The psychology of child killers.</i>
semiconscious	Partially conscious; not completely aware of sensations.
sensibility	The quality of being able to appreciate and respond to complex emotional or aesthetic influences; sensitivity. <i>Cruelty offended his sensibility.</i>

<u>sentiment</u>	Tender, romantic, or nostalgic feeling or emotion. <i>I agree with your sentiments regarding the road bridge.</i>
<u>sentimental</u>	Given to or marked by sentiment or sentimentality. Sentimental soap operas.
superego	(psychoanalysis) that part of the unconscious mind that acts as a conscience. <i>True schizophrenias lack the superego elements present in paranoia.</i>
telepathy	The supposed communication of thoughts or ideas by means other than the known senses.
thinking	Using thought or rational judgement; intelligent. Thinking always made him frown.
touched	Slightly insane. <i>You have to be a little touched to do my job.</i>
unsentimental	Facing facts or difficulties realistically and with determination. <i>The speeches were short and unsentimental.</i>
