hurtful Harmful to living things. His **hurtful** remarks.

ill-natured Having an irritable and unpleasant disposition.

malevolent Having or exerting a malignant influence.

Failure made him **malevolent** toward those who were successful.

Having the nature of or resulting from malice.

malicious

The transmission of malicious software such as computer viruses.

Of a disease malignant.

malign

Believed in witches and malign spirits.

Dangerous to health; characterized by progressive and uncontrolled growth

malignant (especially of a tumor.

In the hands of **malignant** fate.

mean (used of sums of money) so small in amount as to deserve contempt.

Chok d with ambition of the **mean**er sort.

Characterized by obscenity.

Will he say **nasty** things at my funeral.

Having the qualities or effects of a poison.

poisonous Poisonous chemicals.

rancorous Showing deep-seated resentment- Aldous Huxley.

Sixteen miserable months of **rancorous** disputes.

snide Derogatory or mocking in an indirect way.

Makes many a sharp comparison but never a mean or **snide** one.

splenetic Bad-tempered; spiteful.

A **splenetic** rant.

unfriendly Not disposed to friendship or friendliness.

She shot him an **unfriendly** glance.

unkind Lacking kindness.

You were terribly **unkind** to her.

vengeful Disposed to seek revenge or intended for revenge- Shakespeare- M.R.Cohen.

A **vengeful** ex con.



venomous Marked by deep ill will; deliberately harmful.

The box jellyfish is earth s most **venomous** creature.

vicious Able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering.

Vicious gossip.

vindictive Having or showing a strong or unreasoning desire for revenge.

The criticism was both **vindictive** and personalized.

vitriolic Harsh or corrosive in tone.

Vitriolic outbursts.

wounding Causing physical injury.

Wounding and false charges of disloyalty.
